**Princess Margaret Presides As Jamaica's House Opens**

KINGSTON (Reuters)—Princess Margaret presided Tuesday at the state opening of Jamaica's first Parliament as an independent country following 307 years of British rule.

The solemn ceremony at the legislature was a simplified version of the state opening of British parliaments.

The Princess, in a white full-length gown which had diamonds, walked through to the members of the Senate and House of Representatives hand-in-hand with her husband, the Earl of Snowdon.

In a small, clear voice, she read the four-page speech from the throne which had been handed to her by Prime Minister Sir Alexander Bustamante.

### Inquiry Ordered In Plague Death

LONDON (Reuters)—The war office set up a board of inquiry Tuesday to investigate the bubonic plague death last week of a germ-warfare scientist at a secret research establishment.

The 10-man board will be headed by Professor Sir Charles Dadds, president of the Royal College of Physicians.

An inquest into the death of the 46-year-old scientist, Geoffrey Bacon, will be held today, while many of his contacts are still in quarantine.

Five vacancies were created in the 24-member cabinet by the June 18 general election defections of Solicitor-General Browne from Newfoundland, Postmaster-General William Hamilton, Mines Minister Flynn and State Secretary Doris from Quebec, and Works Minister Walker from Ontario.

No indication has been given as to the nature of Thursday's cabinet changes. It is not known whether all five ministers will be replaced or whether other changes are being considered.

The last general election shuffle was in October, 1960.

However, speculation persists that the changes might include both appointment of new ministers and some important switches of present ministers.
