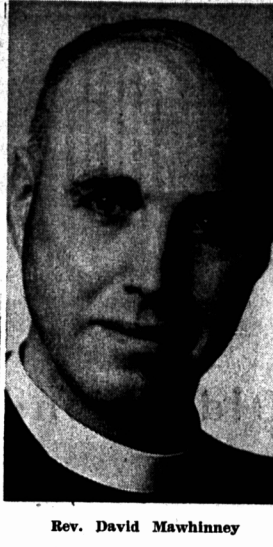

ORDINATION LAST EVENING AT TYNE VALLEY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Last Tuesday evening in Tyne Valley Presbyterian Church, Mr. David Mawhinney was licensed and ordained in the Christian Ministry by the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island.

The service was presided over by the Moderator of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, the Rev. J. Donald Mackay, Summerside. The Old Testament Lesson, Isaiah 55, and the New Testament Lesson, Titus Chapter 2, was read by the Rev. Lawrence Blaikie, Brookfield. The Offertory prayer was given by the Moderator. The sermon was preached by the Rev. George Killen, the newly inducted minister to the Presbyterian Churches in Alberton and West Point. The anthem, "If We Will," was sung by the choir of Tyne Valley Presbyterian Church with Mrs. Miller as organist.

The rite of ordination was presided over by the Moderator who asked the questions prescribed by the Church. With the laying on of hands Mr. David Mawhinney was ordained and set apart to the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments. Following the laying on of hands the right hand of fellowship was given by the various members of Presbytery.

The Charge to the newly ordained minister was given by the Rev. Everett Bean, Kensington, Clerk of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces. The service closed with the singing of a hymn for ministers of the church, "Pour out Thy Spirit from on high." The benediction was given by the newly ordained minister the Rev. David Mawhinney.

Native Of Ireland  
Rev. David Mawhinney was born in Templepatrick, Co. Antrim, Northern Ireland. In 1937 he relinquished a promising business to take up an appointment under the Belfast City Mission. He served the Mission until 1948, when with his wife and son sailed to Canada to serve the Canadian Presbyterian Church. He was appointed Student Minister to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Rose Bay, N. S., and St. Paul's Presbyterian Church East La Have. In 1951 Rev. Mr. Mawhinney to further his studies entered the Presbyterian College, Montreal. While pursuing his studies at the college, he served as Student Minister to the Aethelstan and Elgin Presbyterian Churches, in the Presbytery of Montreal.

At the convocation exercises of the Presbyterian College held in May Rev. Mr. Mawhinney was the recipient of the Pastoral Theology Prize, given to the student in third year with the highest standing in Pastoral Theology.

Rev. Mr. Mawhinney has been appointed by the General Board of Missions of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to serve his ordained mission year in the Richmond Bay Congregation. He along with Mrs. Mawhinney, son Laurence and daughter Elizabeth Dorothea arrived in Prince Edward Island early in June and have taken up residence in the Tyne Valley Presbyterian Manse.

Following the ordination service the members of Presbytery and the friends of the Church were guests at a reception held in the Community Hall for Rev. and Mrs. Mawhinney and family. Delicious refreshments were served by the ladies of the Richmond Bay Congregation. The ladies were thanked for the refreshments by the Moderator, Rev. J. Donald Mackay. Rev. Mr. Mawhinney on behalf of himself and family thanked all those who had made the evening such a memorable one. The reception closed with the singing of "Blest be the tie that binds" and the benediction given by the newly ordained minister.

Charged With Murdering Wife Two Hours After Her Arrival From Italy  
ST. CATHARINES, Ont. (CP)—Police said a young Italian housewife was strangled Tuesday two hours after she arrived here from her native Italy.

They charged her husband, Nunziato Tripodi, 32, with murder. Investigators quoted him as telling "I have just killed my wife. She has been unfaithful to me."

Police reported finding Mrs. Tripodi, 30, clad in stockings and a white slip, on the floor in a bedroom of a downtown apartment. She was pronounced dead on arrival at hospital.

The attractive, dark-skinned woman was the former Scaramozia Donnicola from Bagaladi in the Italian province of Reggio Calabria.

She landed in Halifax a few days ago with her children, Carmelo, 4, and Antonio, 2. Her husband, who since his arrival in Canada two months ago has been working as a casual laborer, met her and the children in Halifax and brought them here by train.

MONTREAL (CP)—Hector Roland Parady, 43, now serving a two-year sentence for false pretences, Tuesday pleaded guilty to receiving \$6,000 worth of \$10,000 in bonds stolen in 1953 from safety deposit boxes in the Bank of Nova Scotia at Grenville, about 60 miles northwest of here. Sentence will be passed Thursday.

COMMONWEALTH GREATER  
GLOUCESTER, Eng. (Reuters) Viscount Bruce of Melbourne, pre-war prime minister of Australia, said here Monday the British Commonwealth is greater than either Russia or the United States. He rejected the suggestion that Britain had become a second-class nation dominated by these two "giants."
