Two Fined \$75 In Driving Cases

SUMMERSIDE — Two accused, Joseph Hermet Cote, RCMP Station Summerside and Hermet Joseph Arsenault, Richmond, entered guilty pleas to separate charges of impaired driving and were each fined \$75 and costs by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court yesterday.

A Tryon man, Francis Patrick MacKinnon, entered a plea of guilty on a charge of assault and his case was adjourned for one week for sentence.

Two persons, William MacDonald, Kinkora, and James Donald Dowse, Carleton; were each fined \$10 and costs for failing to return a register plate which had been cancelled.

Arthur Alan MacDonald of Kinkora was fined \$25 and costs for failing to surrender a cancelled driver's license.

The case of a Charlottetown resident, Davis Enman MacNeil charged with failing to support

his family, was adjourned without plea to Jan. 11. The accused was represented by G. Bruce MacDonald.

Traffic, Liquor Control Cases Dominate Court At Alberton

ALBERTON — Twenty-six cases, mostly under the Highway Traffic Act and the Liquor Control Act, were disposed of by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton yesterday.

Harvey Joseph Gallant, Ebbesfleet, was fined \$75 and costs for driving while impaired, while Albert Sylvang Gaillant, Rosbury, represented by Melville Campbell, was given a similar fine for having care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired.

For driving while his license was suspended, Joseph Carl Powers, Alberton South, was fined \$50 and costs.

Arnold Joseph Gaudet, Tignish, pleaded not guilty to a charge, under the criminal code of unlawful possession of a tool chest, containing tools, knowing it was obtained by committing an indictable offense and the case was adjourned to Jan. 12.

Ira Williams Ellis, O'Leary, represented by Melville Campbell, entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of backing a motor

vehicle when such movement could not be made with safety and the case was adjourned to Jan. 12. Alvin James Shea, Waterford, pleaded guilty to the same charge and was fined \$10 and costs.

Loman Murphy, Campbellton, John William Inman, Alberton and Clarence Joseph Griffin, Elmsdale, were each fined \$10 and costs for operating insufficiently equipped vehicles.

Water Authority Head Named By Government

Early action on the important problem of water pollution was indicated yesterday when Hon.

Leo Rossiter announced the appointment of Doctor John Seaman Bates as chairman of the Prince Edward Island "Water Authority".

Mr. Rossiter has been designated as the minister responsible for the administration of the P.E.I. Water Authority Act which was passed at the last session of the legislature.

The minister observed that this appointment is unique in at least one respect. It is the first time that such an important post has been filled with the co-operation, and participation by the three Maritime governments Dr. Bates set up the "Water Authority" organizations in both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and when he has set in motion the "authority" organization here, he will be the chairman of the water authority in all three provinces.

Messages of appreciation for

this degree of co-operation have been sent to the responsible ministers in the sister provinces. They are Hon. I. W. Akerley, N.S. minister of agriculture and marketing, and Hon. Norbert Theriault, minister of municipal affairs who is the responsible minister in New Brunswick.

In releasing information concerning the appointment of the chairman, Mr. Rossiter stressed some of the problems which would be dealt with by the Water Authority. These would include the procurement of water supplies and the treatment of effluent from our large modern food plants. The establishment of controls for facilities provided for industrial water supply and for treatments such effluent treatment. The assessment and the improvement of our ground water potential. The abatement of pollution from the sewage outfalls of towns and villages.

"With all this wealth of experience and technical knowledge," Mr. Rossiter stated "Dr. Bates brings to us the kind of technical know-how needed to deal with the problem of conserving and increasing our most valuable mineral, water, and to deal with the problems of pollution which are beginning to present themselves our industrial development."

Mr. Rossiter stated that he was not at this time naming the other four members of the board since he wished to study further the qualifications of various nominees and to discuss some of these points with the newly ap-

pointed chairman of the Authority. He hoped to make this announcement within the next few days and to see work begun on the organization of the Authority early in January.

In 1958 Dr. Bates was commissioned to form the first New Brunswick Water Authority and has remained Chairman of that Authority until this date. In 1963 Dr. Bates was commissioned to organize and launch the Nova Scotia Water Authority and has remained Chairman of that body until the present time. In 1965 he was granted the distinguished Service Award by the Ontario Water Resources Commission. Dr. Bates was the first Chairman of the Technical Session of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association in 1915, in a honorary life member, and received the John S. Bates Award from that organization in 1964.
