

Islanders Handed 6-0 Shutout By Millionaires

SYDNEY, (CP)—Sydney Millionaires stilled Charlottetown Islanders' bid for first place in the Maritime Major Hockey League Tuesday as they whipped Murphy Chamberlain's Islanders 6-0.

The Islanders went into the game only six points back of the front-running Halifax Atlantics but they ran into a Sydney machine that was going wide open in the first frame and whipped home four goals.

Goalie Nick Pidsodny, tested only three times in the first period, made up for it with 26 saves in the last two for his second shutout over the Islanders this season.

Lorne Pirie led the Sydney attack netting a pair of goals while singles went to playing coach Johnny Horeck, Johnny Morrow, Ronnie Rowe and Alex Birukow.

Sydney led 4-0 in the first period and added singles in the last two. The Islanders did not have Buck Whitlock, Steve Briskach, out with a fractured bone in the hand, and Larry Travis, injured in a game last Saturday night.

The Millionaires started with 14 players, ended up with 11. George Robertson left the game in the first period with an aggravated injury, Morrow cracked into the Island goal in the second period and left with a wrenched knee and in the last period Freddie Hildebrand suffered a gash on the chin.

Seek Curling Championship



The Halifax Atlantics are still attempting to have the first and second place teams meet in the semi-finals of the M.M.H.L. It has been learned by the Islanders are having no part of the proposals. "Pressure is being brought to bear on us but as far as we are concerned we will stand by the constitution," stated Islanders Club President last night. Saturday afternoon's M.M.H.L. meeting in Halifax may be one of the hottest in the history of the League and by the way things are shaping up it may be the most important. The Glace Bay Miners are reported ready to use four juniors tonight in their game against the Halifax Atlantics. Islanders officials feel their three against one in the M.M.H.L.

"The suspension of Ted Powers by Eddy Shore of the Syracuse Warriors will not affect the Islanders in any way." Club President Frank MacDonald told this corner last night. "Powers picked up his transportation as soon as it was forwarded here and immediately left for Hartford, Conn." continued the Islanders' President. "Actually the suspension of Powers came as no surprise to either Murphy Chamberlain or the Islanders executive."

Mr. MacDonald stated that the Islanders felt Shore never intended to use Powers at Syracuse. For one thing the Syracuse team had no chance of making the American League play-offs. It was felt that Shore intended to use Powers at either Troy or Springfield but to do so would have to re-instate Powers as an amateur and Teddy was unwilling to go through with the deal. Before leaving here Powers stated he would not be re-instated unless he was promised his release at the end of the season. It appears as though he stood by his earlier decision and as a result has been suspended.

It looked very much yesterday as though the series between the Maritime Major Champions and the Q.S.H.L. winner would be a dead lock. Last Friday night the Q.S.-H.L. went on record as wholeheartedly supporting the Q.A.H.A. in its dispute with the C.A.H.A. In addition George Skater, President of the Q.S.H.L. was commissioned to arrange a play-off between the champions of his League and the winners of either the Pacific Coast League or the American League.

The break between the C.A.H.A. and the Q.A.H.A. is possibly the move that the Q.S.H.L. has been waiting for in order to compete against the pro teams. A play-off with either the American League winner or the W.H.L. champions would be a much more attractive financial viewpoint for the Quebec teams. In addition they would gain much more esteem should they win the series and also much more publicity on a National scale.

Clarence Campbell, the president of the N.H.L. is said to have personally endorsed the stand of the Q.A.H.A. against the C.A.H.A. If this is so then Campbell may not have any objection towards a play-off between Quebec and the pro teams. Should such a play-off be arranged the winners of the M.M.H.L. might hope to arrange a series with the winners of the Allan Cup. But this is unlikely as the Allan Cup winners are rarely declared much before May 1.

As it stands now it looks as though the Maritime teams will confine their hockey playing to the Maritimes for this season. And if this is the case, the Maritimes are watching their last season of Major League hockey. Before coming to any definite conclusions about these possible developments we might point out that there is always the chance of a reconciliation between the C.A.H.A. and Q.A.H.A. If some form of arbitration is reached in the dispute then the playoffs will likely go on as scheduled.

Max Bentley, the dipsy-doodle star of the Toronto Maple Leafs and the best stickhandler in the game, apparently has slipped out of the N. H. L. in a very anticlimactic fashion. The little centeman, who sparked the Leafs to three straight Stanley Cup championships following the five for one trade by which he came to Toronto, has been one of the truly great players in modern hockey. It is regrettable that illness should force him to call it a career at this stage of the season.

Early last week Bentley told Haf Day, Leafs G. M. that he would like to play if he could be of any help to his team-mates. He was used sparingly in last Wednesday's game against Montreal Canadiens but looked pitifully out of condition. In fact he looked so bad that coach Dick Irvin of the Canadiens later told a Toronto sports writer that he was hoping against hope the Canadiens would not hit the little centeman. This exhibition likely convinced Bentley that he was through for at least this season.

British Columbia, defeated 11-10 by Alberta in dramatic fourth-round play, is in third place with three wins and one loss. Saskatchewan and Northern Ontario are fourth with 2-2 records.

Alberta's victory over B.C. came in the final end and highlighted the day's play. The score was tied 10-10. Alberta laid in two stones and skip Len Haw placed a perfect guard. Then Reg Stone, skip of the Trail rink, attempted a triple raise and missed with the Calgary rink counting one—the margin of victory.

An all Maritime bout was also decided in the final end. Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, both trailing in the standing, kept up a battle that saw the score tied several times. But a two-end in the 12th for Nova Scotia gave the Bridgewater rink its 17-10 win over the Charlottetown crew.

Shantz Says He'll Be Lucky To Win Twenty

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Bobby Shantz, the American League's most valuable player of 1952, doesn't expect to have a season as good as that of last year and says he will be fortunate to win 20 games.

The tiny left-hander of Philadelphia Athletics is a picture of modesty as he attempted to explain how lucky he was to register 24 triumphs last season while losing only seven.

Bobby said the left wrist broken last September, which for a time threatened to curtail his pitching career, was completely healed. Also on the completely recovered list was his left elbow, hurt only a week ago when he was cracked with the end of the bat in missing a swing.

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
