City Jr. Trade Board Enters 1st Parade Float

The Charlottetown Junior Board of Trade under President Earl Beaton has thrown its full support behind the Gold Cup and Saucer Parade which will be one of the highlights of Old Home Week of 1962. The board not only decided to give its support to the idea but at a meeting Thursday night decided it will enter a float, thus becoming the first organization on the island to do so.

John Mummy was appointed chairman of the float committee and two or three more members will be added within 10 days.

Last night Mr. Mummy said the board's decision was made in view of the potential of the parade as a prime tourist attraction. "Coming as it does during Old Home Week it will make this week a bigger attraction than ever."

"I feel it will be greatly beneficial to the entire city, if the Junior and Senior Boards of Trade together with merchants and other organizations give their full support to it."

The idea of expanding the parade which was inaugurated last year as part of The Evening Patriot Gold Cup and Saucer Race held on the Friday evening of Old Home Week before

a crowd of some 8,000, was touched off some time ago by several observers who felt the parade should be expanded.

At a meeting of a steering committee last week it was decided that floats and a number of bands would add greatly to the parade. Negotiations are going on at present on the possibility of several mainland bands entering.

Argument Completed In Case Of N.S. Driver

Argument by both counsels was completed in the case of John Wren Ballantyne, New Glasgow, N.S. in Queen's County magistrate's court before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, yesterday afternoon.

Ballantyne, who was counselled by John P. Nicholson, is charged with driving while intoxicated, to which he had earlier pleaded not guilty. Crown counsel is Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGulgan.

Charged with possession of stolen goods, an automobile battery valued under \$50, Edison Damerell McKenna, Toronto, Ont., who stated that he wished to obtain counsel, was remanded until Jan. 8.

Two persons charged with obstructing a peace officer in his duties, Douglas Gallant and Joseph Arnold Gallant, both of North Rustico, were remanded until Jan. 16 at 7:30 p.m. The long remands were given by consent of the crown counsel and defence counsel John J. Holmes.

Patrick Jerome Murphy, Bellevue, was remanded also until Jan. 23 at 7:30 p.m., on the charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident.

UIC CASE ADJOURNED
The case of the North Rustico Canning Company, charged with violating the Unemployment In-

urance Act, was adjourned until Jan. 12. Adjourned to the same date was the case of Joseph Thomas McNally, Bedford, charged with fishing lobster during the closed season.

Pleading guilty to the possession of intoxicating liquor not purchased from a vendor's store, Keith Wellington Bell, Belle River, was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Of three persons charged with possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences, two were fined \$20 and costs or 30 days and the case against the third was adjourned until Jan. 12.

TRAFFIC CASES
Pleading guilty to a charge of speeding at the rate of 75 m.p.h. in a 50 m.p.h. zone, John Leo Peters, Mayfield, was fined \$25 and costs or five days.

Fines of \$5 and costs or two days were imposed on persons charged with failing to stop for a 'stop' sign, and failing to take his motor vehicle in for regular inspection by the RCMP. For parking a motor vehicle on the highway another person was given a reprimand.

Of two St. Dunstan's University students charged with walking on the wrong side of the highway, one had his case dismissed while the charge against the other was withdrawn.

Cold Storage Facilities Here Said Inadequate

The provincial government is studying at least two proposals that could lead to the establishment of additional storage facilities for frozen produce, particularly strawberries and blueberries.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said yesterday that the present government-owned cold storage plant on Esheby Street in Charlottetown did not have enough space to store last year's available supply of berries.

"With larger yields of berries expected in the coming season," said Mr. MacRae, "larger storage facilities will be needed. Also needed are more and better facilities for the storage of butter and cheese."

It has been the custom, Mr. MacRae pointed out, at the Esheby Street plant to store berries ungraded. "Once the crop was in," he said, "I believe that as many as 30 persons were employed for about 16 weeks grading the produce."

Commenting on proposals put forth to the government regarding establishment of new storage facilities, Mr. MacRae said "personally, I feel that the best system would be for the government to guarantee a loan for the construction of a plant, then have an individual run the business as a private enterprise."

SITE SUGGESTED
Mr. MacRae suggested that the site of the old Horne Warehouse at the corner of Kent and Edward Streets in Charlottetown would be a good location for a plant. This site is government-owned, and at one time the government was considering it as a location for a new liquor store.

While the nature of the proposals before the government regarding the cold storage facilities is not known, it was learned that \$300,000 is one of the figures mentioned as being the cost of a new plant.

Trade Board Getting Farm Information

MONTAGUE — Farmers in the Montague area are showing considerable interest in the recent request made by the Montague Regional Board of Trade to list with their farms available for sale.

The board is endeavouring to compile a list of such farms with pertinent data so that when buyers and tobacco growers seek information it will be readily available through the board.

G. Arnold Wightman, president of the board, stated that he was very pleased with response and with co-operation shown by farmers, growers and the provincial government and that it was the opinion of the board that all information possible should be available locally.

That is why it is our intention he said to have such information available at Montague and to make sure that the possibilities of tobacco growing in this area are fully known.

2 Collisions Occur In City

Two motor vehicle accidents occurred in the city yesterday. At 1:45 a 1959 Volkswagen, driven by Anson MacLaughlin of Goodwill Avenue was in collision with a 1959 Zephyr driven by John D. MacLeod, Jr., of Charlottetown. The Volkswagen was travelling north on Cumberland Street and the Zephyr was going west on Grafton Street when the collision occurred.

The other accident occurred at the intersection of Prince and Water streets at 6 p.m. when a vehicle driven by Bruce Peppy of Hazelbrook collided with another vehicle driven by Earl MacLean of Sherwood. Mr. Peppy was in the process of making a left hand turn from Prince Street on to Water when the accident occurred.

No one was injured in either accident.

City Council will hold its regular January meeting at 4 p.m. next Monday afternoon. It is the last regular session of the present Council and the only matter to come before the brief session will be the paying of the monthly bills.

The annual meeting of City Council is scheduled for later in the month with a strong possibility of it being held January 29. At this time annual reports of all city departments will be presented.

The coming civic election, at which time the Mayor and all 10 Councillors, are to be elected, or re-elected as the case may be, will be held February 14.

City Applies For Property Sales

The City filed applications for sale of 10 properties by the sheriff for non-payment of city taxes when City Court presided over by Judge K.M. Martin met on Wednesday of this week.

It was not possible to have all applications prepared in time and the remainder will be filed next Wednesday when the City Court meets again, City Clerk John Butler said yesterday.

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A low temperature of five below was forecast for the day but the lowest reached was 11 degrees above zero at 4 p.m. The mercury rose gradually and at midnight it was reported to be 18 above with the rise in temperature expected to continue throughout the night. At the same time winds were being recorded at 18 m.p.h. with gusts to 24 m.p.h.

A 50 m.p.h. gale accompanied the cold snap on Thursday resulting in many of the province's highways being blocked by the light snowfall which fell a few days earlier, which was swirled into heavy drifts by the high wind. However, last night all main roads in the province were reported open.

Many motorists had difficulty starting their cars yesterday morning and a Southport service station operator said he had as many calls for help in starting vehicles as he has had on any cold winter's morning.

W.B. Hogan Dies At 78

The death occurred at the home of his son, John W. Hogan, in Parkdale on Jan. 5, 1962, of William B. Hogan of Charlottetown, in his 78th year.

The late Mr. Hogan was born in South Shore, and moved to Charlottetown at an early age where he was employed by Hogan's lumber factory prior to joining the Canadian National Railway in 1925. He retired from the CNR in 1948.

He had been ill for several months, and was discharged from hospital shortly before Christmas. He is survived by three sons: John, with the provincial government; Richard, with Canada Packers Ltd., and Edgar, with the post office department.

Also surviving are four daughters: Lillian, Mrs. Lyndon Colclough, and Irene, Mrs. Irene Smith, both of Lynn, Mass.; Mary, Mrs. Gerald Mantes of Charlottetown, and Estelle, Mrs. Ivan Walsh, of Ottawa, Ont.

A sister, Mrs. Josephine Johnson, lives in Everett, Mass. Mr. Hogan also had a large number of grandchildren as well as four great-grandchildren.

His wife predeceased him in 1950, as did a son James in 1950. A son Ernest and two daughters, Catherine and Ella, died in infancy. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

Norman MacLeod and Mrs. Bruce MacLaren conducted sessions on bandaging and splinting. Sister Mary Monica, instructor of nurses at the Charlottetown Hospital, taught roller bandaging, and sessions on taking temperatures, pulse and respiration.
