ASHANTI SACRED LAKE.

A Returned African Traveller Tells of a Peculiar Lake.

LIVERPOOL, March 2.—Mr. P. P. McCann, who has had nineteen years actual residence in West Africa, of which two years were passed in Sierra Leone, seven in French Gaboon and six in the Niger territory, has returned from a photographic expedition in the Gold Coast, Hinterland, extending over four years.

Mr. McCann penetrated a country which had hitherto never been visited by a white man. He gives a description of a most remarkable lake, which, although only thirty five miles from Coomassie, has only been visited by one or two white men. It is called Bosomshwi, meaning "God water," and is held sacred by the Ashantees. "When my guide told me of the wonders of this lake," said Mr. McCann, "I resolved to visit it and get some pictures. In this I was very successful. It is twelve miles in diameter, but its depth no one knows. The Ashantee King every year drowned 100 of his slaves in the lake as a sacrifice to the water god. The bodies were never cast up again, and I think they must have been eaten by fish. In the breeding season shoals of dead fish are thrown up and collected by the natives. No canoe is allowed on it, and the Ashantees keep it sacred from any kind of pollution. There are logs or poles on it, and the natives get astride these and paddle with their hands. I believe I am the only white man who ever went on the lake but it nearly cost me my life. My inquiries about the lake led me to conclude that it is really a volcanic crater, and as such would be the largest known. Runtlings of earthquakes were still often heard, and this the natives believed that it was the god of water giving expression to his anger. The crater must have been thousands of feet deep, and the tropical rains of years had filled it. The natives use the water for drinking and other purposes, but no washing or any kind of pollution is permitted in the Lake itself. In mid-day the sun is so hot that the greatest evaporation takes place. In fact, there is a thick mist on the Lake all day, so that you can see but a short distance over the water. A big chief offered Mr. McCann the smoked thigh of a native. This was considered a gracious act, and to refuse it would be unfriendly. Mr. McCann was thus in a dilemma, but he feigned illness, and said he was not eating just then. The chief eventually put the matter off good-naturedly by saying he supposed "white men preferred white man to eat instead of black man."

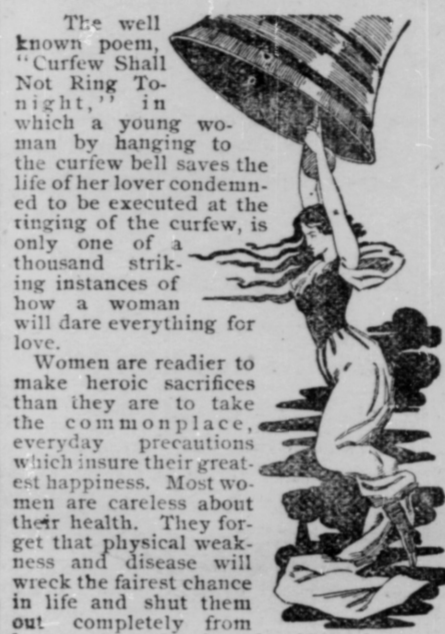
SPANIARDS NOT THERE

Failure to Invite Them to a Banquet Displeased Gomez

MATANZAS, March 2.—The banquet tendered here to Gen. Maximo Gomez was a brilliant affair and well attended, although the Spaniards were not invited. The Junta patrioica, the organization which had charge of the entertainment, purposely refrained from inviting Spaniards, which displeased the Cuban commander. Several speeches were delivered by the guests, and the audience did not respond in the manner expected, by reason of the absence of the Spanish element. The banquet was given in the theatre, the guests numbered 200, and 4,000 spectators were present.

The boxes were crowded with ladies belonging to the best circles of society, and the public generally crowded the four tiers of galleries. Gen. Wilson sat on the right of Gen. Gomez, and the Cuban general Betancourt was seated on his left. A picture of Geo. Washington was prominently displayed on the wall. The speeches began at 10 o'clock. Senor Labastida, during the course of his remarks, said the authorities at Washington would never govern the country against its will, a remark which was loudly cheered. The house also cheered President McKinley.

Senor Riviera referred glowingly to Washington, and was loudly cheered. Senor Sulio Ortiz, president of the Junta welcomed Gen. Gomez to Matanzas. The Cuban Commander answered, thanked his hosts and referred feelingly to the dark days of the revolution.
