ATTENTION LIVE STOCK BREEDERS

The following information pertaining to the Veterinary Policy in effect in this Province may help to eliminate some misunderstandings that exist re the status of Government subsidized Veterinarians practicing throughout the Province.

1. These Veterinarians are paid a subsidy by the Provincial Government through the Department of Agriculture and are not employees of the Government.
2. The subsidies they receive are for a twofold purpose: First, to provide the live stock breeder professional services at a uniform low fee regardless of distance travelled. Second, to compensate the Veterinarians for long mileages driven, and very high depreciation on their cars.
3. They own their own cars, and receive no mileage allowance for operating same. The average yearly mileage for each Veterinarian is approximately 32,000 miles. A great deal of this driving is done in spring and fall months when road conditions are not good.
4. The Veterinarians purchase from wholesale drug houses and keep on hand all drugs and supplies necessary for the treatment of live stock, and are responsible for all collections for professional services and medicines supplied.
5. This Department believes that our "Veterinary Policy" is one of great value to our farmers, and solicits your wholehearted co-operation by prompt payment for services rendered, and eliminating as far as possible the necessity of night and Sunday calls unless the case is an emergency. Thank you.

Timely Notes On Fur Farming

Mayor Jean Drapeau of Montreal in a proclamation last week declared May 9th through 14th Fur Fashion Week and all Fur Stores will be asked to support it. Co-operation by local stores would be in the form of special window displays and other means to emphasize the importance of Montreal as a fur marketing, processing and garment producing centre.

EMBA mink mutation selling resumed at New York Auction Company premises last week, after a months lay-off and continued to command very firm prices as these reports show:

A fair collection of raw EMBA mutations was reported 94 per cent sold during the morning and most of the afternoon portion of the sale. Dressed Autumn Haze (formerly Royal pastel) was selling up to 8 p.m. last night to a crowded salesroom. Turnover for this mutation was reported to be 100 per cent for the first 15 pages of the catalog.

AUCTION REPORT

The report on the raw collection follows:

Autumn Haze, 16,500 pelts, 94 per cent sold at a top of \$41.50 for males and 24 for females. Some 2,550 Stewart Autumn Haze was 92 per cent sold at top prices of \$48.50 and \$27.50.

An offering of 1,000 Cercuans was 98 per cent sold at a top of \$54 for males and \$27.50 for females. The offering of 6,500 Argenta (formerly Silverblue) was 95 per cent sold, bringing up to \$28.50 for males and \$16.25 for females. Some 500 Stewart Argentas were 80 per cent sold at tops of \$32.50 and \$17.75. And 900 breath of spring Argentas were 95 per cent sold at \$36 and \$20 highs for males and females respectively.

LONDON, April 22.—Profits of the Hudson's Bay Co. fur department, before taxation, increased from \$320,000 in 1953 to \$585,000 in 1954, according to the firms annual report.

Fur trade sales of HBC increased from \$7,318,000 in 1953 to \$7,716,000, and consignment sales advanced from \$14,358,000 to \$19,759,000.

"A record quantity of ranch mink consigned recently for auction in New York and Montreal, and a sharp upsurge in demand in ranch mink account for the large increase in consignment sales and in profits reported," it is stated. "These two circumstances combined to produce what must be regarded as an exceptional year."

"Sales of Persian lamb and Scandinavian mink in London contributed materially to the large turnover. In the last two months of the financial year, there was a revival in price and demand for many Canadian wild furs, some varieties of which have been almost unobtainable in recent years."

Autumn Haze the new soubrquet applied to mutation mink has "caught on as the following will show":

A collection of approximately 40,000 dressed EMBA Autumn Haze mink was 98 per cent sold yesterday at prices unchanged to 5 per cent higher, compared to February. A jammed New York Auction Co. salesroom sent males 5 per cent above previous levels while females remained very steady.

A seasonal high for the pastel shade was set for males when Evans Fur Co., Chicago, paid \$88 for a lot shipped by Sheldon H. Fisher, Columbia Station, O. Females, from the same shipper, went for \$35.

The auction firm hoped to complete the Stewart Autumn Haze session late last night. The sale resumed at 9 a.m. today.

The salesroom yesterday reflected the sharp interest in pastel mink. One buyer held his head in jest and quipped: "EMBA should have kept the Royal pastel name: I like pastel prices better than these Autumn Haze prices."

The consensus was the small-size males and had climbed about 10 per cent over February, that other males were very firm, and that females were unchanged to

ranch, and practically the whole kit crop was wiped out. Despite these setbacks, the Thompson ranch is believed to be the largest mink ranch in Ontario. Dr. Russell helped to organize the present Provincial Association in the early 30's under the leadership of Jack Patte of Peterborough. He and Jack McCague are the only two of the original directors still active in the industry. In those early days the Association was composed chiefly of fox ranchers, and the mink ranchers at any meetings or on any decisions invariably got the short end of the stick. The growth of the mink industry and the decline of the fox industry has been an eye opener to all those engaged in any branch of fur farming, and while Dr. Russell is an optimist on the mink industry, he finds that the mink ranchers are asking the same questions that were asked by the fox men many years ago regarding the volume of pelts at the Sales—"Where are all these pelts going?"

Next meeting to be held at Mrs. Deacons when roll call will be an exchange of flower slips or bulbs. The meeting closed with the Queen.

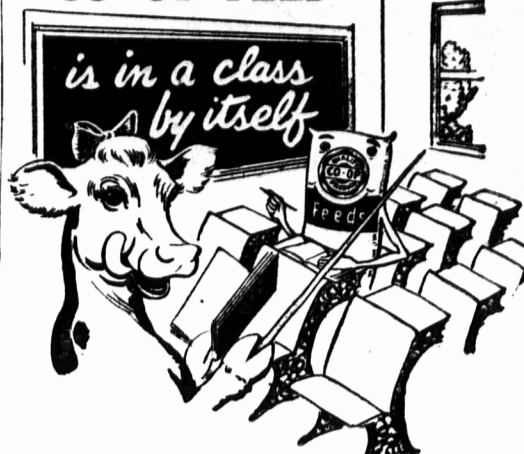
MILITARY DOGSLEDS
