CASTILIAN WILL BE A TOTAL LOSS She is Now Practically Abandoned

MAY SLIDE INTO DEEP WATER ANY MOMENT.

The Compass is Thought to have been at fault.

HALIFAX, Mar. 14.—Capt. Barrett and the first and second officers of the Castilian remained on the steamer. All the rest of the officers and crew are in Yarmouth.

The steamer has not yet been abandoned, but must be as she is now in hourly danger of breaking up.

Tug-boats brought up the cabin fittings, plate, and other moveables; but no attempt could be made to get the cargo.

The steamer will be a total loss and no cargo can be saved.

Most of the live stock are still standing, though at times, the water is about their feet.

The tide rises and falls in the steamer from the engine room forward coming up as high as the main deck and she remains on firmly without pounding, but she has a list which shows the danger of her slipping off into deep water.

A tug remains by the steamer, and it is expected that the captain will leave her some time to-day.

There is no official statement yet as to the cause of the disaster, but it is believed that the compass was at fault.

BELFAST RAILWAY

AND HILLSBOROUGH BRIDGE

Strong Resolutions Passed at the Meeting

The meeting at Pownal yesterday afternoon was organized by calling Hon. Geo. Forbes to the chair and appointing Mr. F. J. Nash secretary. The attendance was not so large as was expected on account of the storm.

Premier Farquharson, Attorney-General Macdonald, Alexander Martin, M. P., D. A. McKinnon, M. L. A., Messrs Horace Hazard, Robert Jenkins and Robert Stewart, addressed the meeting in the order named. All were favorable to the railway and bridge; and with one exception—that of Mr. McKinnon—the speeches were of a non-political character.

The following resolution was moved by John McEachern, Cherry Valley, and seconded by Robert Stewart, Southport, Lot 48:

Whereas, the route of the southern branch railway and the site of the bridge across the Hillsborough River have already been surveyed, and the present Government committed to their construction,

Therefore resolved that this meeting request the Dominion Government to place in the estimates a sufficient sum for the next meeting of parliament to build and equip the southern branch railway and also to construct a bridge across the Hillsborough river.

Further resolved that this meeting request our Provincial Government to cooperate with the Dominion Government in the construction of the proposed bridge across the Hillsborough, the object of such cooperation being to secure a track for foot and carriage passengers in connection with the railway track.

And further resolved, that we request the Local Government to place a sum in the estimates for this purpose.

This resolution was unanimously adopted. The following resolution was then submitted by the same gentlemen and adopted:

Resolved, that we recognize the valuable results of the energy and well directed labors of the Board of Trade in removing obstacles to trade and opening new avenues; and we respectfully request that they use their valuable influence to secure the construction of the Southern Railway and bridge over the Hillsborough.

A short discussion regarding roads followed, and Premier Farquharson promised, at the forthcoming session, to introduce legislation amending the Road Act with a view to the betterment of the road system.

CLOVER HAY.

We know of no plant that has advanced so much in the estimation of farmers as that which has lately been highly recommended by Professor Robertson, viz, clover. The increasing necessity of doing something to restore and maintain the fertility of the soil, the faith and energy of a few leading agriculturists, and the increasing confidence of the farmers in the teachings of science with regard to the collection of nitrogen from the air by means of clover and other leguminous crops have combined to work a great change in favor of clover. Besides, it has been found invaluable as fodder for cows, horses, pigs, hens, etc. The difficulty with respect to the successful growth of clover crops in this Province, heretofore, has resulted from winter killing. But we believe that experiment has proved that clover is not liable to winter killing if the "after grass" is not allowed to be eaten off in the autumn, or if a light mulch of seaweed spread over the ground late in the fall.
