**Saddler 2-1 Choice
To Retain His Title In
Bout With Pep Tonight**

NEW YORK, Sept. 25—(AP)—Chapter four of the Sandy Saddler-Willie Pep featherweight title series, scheduled for tomorrow night, is fighting an uphill battle against rain, baseball talk and Louis-Marciano.

Showers put the damper on the International Boxing Club's hopes for a good wind-up sale. Plenty of choice seats remained at \$20. Best estimate is a house of 15,000 and a gate of \$75,000.

Despite a ban on home television and radio the 15-round fight failed to whip up the enthusiasm of the third meeting last September, when 37,781 paid \$232,150 to see Pep retire after seven rounds, claiming a dislocated left shoulder.

There will be theatre TV, with New York blacked out, in 17 theatres in 13 cities, and movies of the fight the next day in the theatres. This package will bring in \$130,000, or more than the I. B. C. expects at the gate.

Saddler, defending champion and 2 to 1 favorite, takes a 37-1-2 per cent cut of the gate. Pep, trying to become the first to hold the same title three times, gets 22-1-2 per cent.

The heavy fight schedule for late summer and early fall had its effect on the gate appeal of the 126-pounders. Just as Ray Robinson-Randy Turpin eclipsed the Kid Gavilan-Billy Graham show, the shadow of Joe Louis-Rocky Marciano on Oct. 11 dimmed this match.

Saddler, a lean spindle-shanked 25-year-old Negro from New York's Harlem, is the puncher.

A switch-over southpaw, he packs his real wallop in his left hand. Pep, 29, and a boxing master, is an artist at the stick-and-spin school. If it goes the route, Willie almost certainly will outstare Sandy.

**Little World
Series Opening
Scheduled Tonight**

MONTREAL, Sept. 25—(CP)—Milwaukee Brewers probably will have to look at a lot of lefthanded pitching when they meet Montreal Royals in the Little World Series opening here tomorrow night.

The first three games of the best-of-seven series will be played here, the remainder in Milwaukee. Manager Wally Alston of the International League champions let it be known today he expects to start with Chris Van Cuyk, big southpaw with an 11-4 season record.

Since the American Association representatives are reported to pack plenty of left-handed hitting power, Alston may follow with two more persiders. They are Mal Mallette (10-2) and Tommy LaSorda (12-8).

"The Brewers shouldn't trouble us too much in our park," said Alston. "But over there it might be a different matter. We've got to use our lefties and this is the place for that."

Alston's top righthanders are Bob Alexander, with a 15-8 mark for the season; Jim Hughes, 10-4, and Hamp Coleman 9-4. Manager Charlie Grimm and his Brewers weren't expected until late tonight and his pitching selection wasn't known here. Grimm used his ace righthander, Ernie Johnson, against St. Paul Monday night in the game that gave Milwaukee the playoff. Johnson has a 16-4 record.

Grimm also has Murray Wall, 15-6, Maynard Thiel 14-9, Virgil Jester 13-6 and Charlie Gorin, his best southpaw 12-9.

**British Like Soccer
Game Under Lights**

LONDON, Sept. 25—(AP)—They played a soccer game at night here recently and the critics were amazed to discover that almost everybody liked the idea. The game, between Arsenal of London and the Hopsel Amateur Club of Tel Aviv, was one of the first major soccer contests ever played entirely under the lights in England.

Some 45,000 fans showed up at Arsenal's modern Highbury Stadium, and as one man put it: "The darker it got the more you could see."

BROOKLYN, Sept. 24—(AP)—Manager Chuck Dressen of Brooklyn Dodgers said today Preacher Roe would start no more games until the opener of the World Series—unless he's needed to help clinch the pennant. Roe, with a record of 22 games won and only two lost, has a percentage of .917. If he loses no more games, or finished 22-2, Preach will set a National League record.
