Thompson Takes Up Reputation

ERROL THOMPSON seems to be carrying well the Summerside torch thrown to him by PAUL MacWILLIAMS, who starred with Halifax Canadiens last year and is now playing with Saint Dunstan's. Errol scored two goals and got an assist for the Junior Canadiens against Sorel recently. He is only 16 years old but apparently cannot be pushed around, and gets his share of penalties. This is not exactly a poor showing, but it could be that Paul will take a little while fitting in to the Saints' patterns of play, which most of the other boys are familiar with. RICK O'DONNELL, an RCAF boy, potted five goals. This fellow must really have it. We expect, however, that MacWILLIAMS will score his full quota of goals before the season is over.

PWC Meets PVI In Junior Game

Tonight Prince of Wales University facts the Provincial Vocational Institute at the Charlottetown Forum at 8.30 in the second game of the Charlottetown Junior Hockey season. This will be the first time these two clubs meet and the first time that Prince of Wales plays a game.

PVI has seen action already in the season opener against the Rangers; in that game, the Institute showed itself to be a scrappy come-from-behind team as they fought the Rangers to a 6-all tie. They have a powerful scoring punch in forwards Paul Stanley while the team as a whole displays tenacious checking to keep the opposition disorganized.

An apparent weakness in coach Heins' club, perhaps due to lack of ice experience at this early date, is the defensive corps which didn't seem to get as the forwards did in the later periods of the game.

The defending champions of the 1965-66 season, Prince of Wales, enter this initial encounter a considerably changed club. Although they are icing essentially the same defense as last year led by last year's most valuable player Lincoln MacKenzie, the forward lines have many new faces. High scoring

Jamie Kennedy is playing with Sherbrooke this year and other stalwarts such as Joey Brown are away with various Junior and University clubs throughout the Maritimes.

The university will nevertheless ice a powerful team of forwards having picked up new players with the fall enrollment, including Colin Campbell, and the fast skating Brian Thompson, a graduate of Englewood High, Crapaud. They will probably start with the line of Don Ellis, Angus Houston and Neil Anderson, an import from Shawinigan Falls, Quebec. This line promises to be tough and fast.

Coach Ready has the added advantage this season of going with two goalies, both of whom will see action tonight alternately. Along with last year veteran Ellis, the PWC club has another Shawinigan man on the club, goalie Brian MacIntosh.

Only Sun Bowl Entries Remain To Be Selected

Associated Press sports writer The Sugar Bowl lined up Alabama and Nebraska as expected Monday for what might be the only major post-season bowl game matching teams with perfect records, but the Pacific 8 Conference sprang a small surprise by naming Southern California to meet Purdue in the Rose Bowl.

In all, 11 of the 16 spots in the major bowl games were filled after Monday's selections. But until the announcement of the Trojans' selection after a poll of Pacific 8 members there hadn't been an eyebrow raised. Southern California finished the conference race with a 7-1 record to 3-1 for UCLA and Oregon State, but the Trojans were beaten by UCLA 14-7 last Saturday and it had been thought that would throw the vote to the Bruins.

UCLA represented the Pacific 8 last year, defeating Big Ten champion Michigan State. The Spartans again won the Big Ten crown this season, but are barred from returning by conference rules and Purdue was tapped to make its first Rose Bowl appearance.

The new entries made the bowl picture look like this: Sugar Bowl at New Orleans — Alabama, 8-0, vs. Nebraska, 8-0, Jan. 2. Rose Bowl at Pasadena, how about this statistic? Eleven accidents while playing pool or billiards? Trojans And Purdue Meet

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Southern California's Trojans, champions of the Pacific-8 Conference, were named by the conference today to meet Purdue of the Big Ten Conference in the Rose Bowl football game at Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 2.

Executive director Tom Hamilton announced the result of the balloting of the eight conference members which sends the Trojans for their 14th appearance at the post-season classic. USC finished the season with a 4-1 league record. Over-all the USC record stands at 7-2.

Everything Except The Field Prepared For Grey Cup Week

VANCOUVER (CP) — Grey Cup week activities got under way Monday. But everyone was keeping a wary eye on the weather for the day of the East-West football clash.

The weatherman said there's a 50 per cent chance of "appreciable" rain on the day of the game Saturday, based on meteorologists' records.

It rained all day Monday, and the five-day forecast issued by the U.S. weather office called for below-normal temperatures and near-normal precipitation for the rest of the week.

"Given the present weather the field will probably be a little soft for the game," said the stadium manager Bud Evans. Field drains were running at capacity and by late Monday afternoon a tarpaulin had been put over the field. A two-day break in the rain, however, should mean a good field by Saturday, said Evans.

Harry McBrien of Toronto, Grey Cup co-ordinator, said he hoped the 1966 game wouldn't be a repeat of the 1963 mud bowl at Empire Stadium.

Meanwhile, the Grey Cup Bonspiel—first event of Grey Cup week—started Monday as the first of the out-of-town football fans began to arrive. WILL INJECT HOOPLA Tuesday the arrival of a host of Regina fans — including Premier Ross Thatcher of Saskatchewan, who will join Lt. Gov. Robert Hanbridge—is expected to inject some of the hoopla associated with Grey Cup week.

Others to arrive during the week include Prime Minister Pearson, who will handle the traditional kickoff, Mayors Henry Baker of Regina and Don Reid of Ottawa, and thousands of football fans.

Ottawa Dominates All-Stars With 11 Players

TORONTO (CP)—Russ Jackson, Gene Gaines and Ken Lehmann led the way as Ottawa Rough Riders dominated both the offensive and defensive squads of the 1966 all-star team in the Eastern Football Conference.

Jackson, the Ottawa quarterback who was named this year's top Canadian and outstanding performer in the Canadian Football League, was the only unanimous choice for the offensive team.

Gaines, a defensive halfback and key figure in the Rough Riders' success this year, also made everybody's ballot as did Lehmann, chosen as the middle linebacker on the defensive squad.

The team, chosen by sportswriters and broadcasters making up the Football Reporters of Canada in the four EPC cities, was announced today.

The Riders, who represent the East in the Grey Cup game at Vancouver Saturday, placed 11 men on the team, six on offence and five on defence.

Hamilton Tiger-Cats, second to the Riders in the regular schedule, were awarded six places, four of them on defence. The third-place Montreal Alouettes had four selected, two each way, and the last-place Toronto Argonauts landed three men on the team, two on offence.
