Province is Reported First With RCMP Auxiliary Force

At a ceremony yesterday afternoon on board HMCS Queen Charlotte, Prince Edward Island became the first province in Canada to have an auxiliary police force fully trained and administered by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The 14-man graduating squad are also the proud possessors of the first RCMP auxiliary force in the island. They are the only such police force to be turned out in complete uniform. Of the same color and material as the RCMP uniform, the dress is modelled on the battle dress style. It is crew-neck with the regular RCMP peaked cap bearing a badge inscribed "Auxiliary Police."
The graduating ceremony

opened by the squad being inspected by Inspector A. S. McNeil, commanding officer "L" division for the rest of Canada. They were presented with certificates and official identification cards by Acting Premier and Attorney General M.A. Farmer, QC.
CONGRATULATED
In congratulating them, Mr. Farmer hoped that some would ever regret taking up police work. He said that the business of law and order is something that comes easily but is something that has to be worked at.
Mr. Farmer urged them to do their duty in such a manner as to encourage respect for the law among those they have to deal with in the course of

their work, and not do anything to create antagonism to the law. He said that the RCMP is a force of the emergency measures organization of civil defence, and that the course they had just undergone was watched very closely by civil defence and police officials in Ottawa who considered it to be a pilot course for the rest of Canada. He informed them that during a recent visit to Ottawa he received expressions of envy from several representatives of other provinces, particularly for the fact that little P.E.I. was way out in the lead in establishing an RCMP trained auxiliary force.

Birmingham Has Limited Racial Truce

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—A limited agreement on Negro demands for desegregation in Birmingham has been reached by a biracial committee, Dr. Martin Luther King announced Thursday.
The Negro leader said the agreement embraced two of the four points the Negroes have been demonstrating for during the past month.
They are for desegregation of some facilities in the downtown stores and improving job opportunities for Negroes.
"But I am not at liberty to reveal details of the agreement," King said.

British Vote Gives Victory To Labor Party

LONDON (Reuters)—The opposition Labor party today won a landslide victory over the ruling Conservative party and independents at nationwide municipal elections held Thursday.
The Labor party more than recouped from heavy losses it suffered three years ago and wrested control from Conservatives and other anti-socialists in a large number of important towns and cities.
With some results still to come, Labor gained 509 municipal council seats for only 22 losses. Conservatives, losing a control of council after control, showed a loss of 461 seats and only 16 gains.
The Liberal party made some headway with 106 gains against 41 losses.
But independents shared Conservatives' poor fortune and had 120 losses against 51 gains.
Communists have lost 10 among the important city councils where Labor captured control, were Liverpool, Bristol, Bradford, Walsall, Leicester, Dover, Ipswich, Peterborough, Newcastle, Rochdale, Colchester and Lancaster.

Pearson, JFK Meeting Heavy Agenda Sated



OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson leaves this morning for an intensive familiarization session with President Kennedy that will span the globe while bearing hardest on multiple Canada-United States problems.
Mr. Pearson was leaving at 10:55 a.m. by RCMP Comet jet for the president's summer home at Hyannis Port, Mass. There the two men will hold a working session today starting at 1:30 p.m. and nine tomorrow. They will dine together three times before the prime minister leaves about 3 p.m. Saturday for Ottawa.
The Canadian leader was accompanied by a small but high-powered staff group. Mr. Pearson, putting the prime ministerial real estate to rights, stayed home.
Mr. Kennedy's first trip abroad after his election in 1960 was to Ottawa. Mr. Pearson, in office less than three weeks, picked quick visits to London and Washington during the campaign for the April 8 election and he was in Britain last week.

Yanks Fear Missiles Are Hidden

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate investigators say U.S. intelligence chiefs admit "there is reason for grave concern" that Soviet long-range missiles and bombers may be hidden in Cuban caves.
"Even though the intelligence community believes that all have been withdrawn," the investigators said Thursday, "it is of the greatest urgency to determine whether or not strategic missiles now are concealed in Cuba."
The Senate assurance can come only from "penetrating and continuing on-site inspection by reliable observers," they told the Senate. Premier Castro has refused to permit such inspection.
The United States relies mostly on air surveillance of the island.
The Senate prearranged subcommittee also said that, despite President Kennedy's belief that the total of Soviet troops may have dropped to about 12,000, the intelligence community still uses 17,500 as the current estimate.

Criminal Hand Feared Behind School Illness

BROSSARDVILLE, Que. (CP)—Police Chief Albert Richard said Thursday he is convinced "a criminal hand" is responsible for an epidemic of mysterious illness at a Brossardville elementary school.
The school, which has 52 pupils, was closed Thursday for the third time since April 22. Its two classrooms were vacated immediately when 15 pupils began complaining, almost simultaneously, of nausea and headaches.
Eight of them had to be taken to St. Lambert General Hospital and five of the eight were kept there for examination.
The chief said the mysterious repetition of the ailment, which has had the effect of drugging the children, has convinced him that there is criminal action behind it. No motive was immediately evident.
He said the school should remain shut for the rest of the school year.

Orbital Flight Expected To Provide Medical Data

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Astronaut Gordon Cooper's scheduled 34-hour journey through space next week should reap a harvest of medical data on man's ability to perform during extended weightless flight.
In outlining plans for Cooper's planned 34-hour mission, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration has listed a number of medical checks and experiments in the flight profile.
Several scientific studies also are planned.
The space agency set next Tuesday as the earliest possible launching date.
If the 36-year-old air force major takes the full route, he will land in the Pacific Ocean 80 miles southeast of Midway Island 34 hours and 19 minutes after liftoff.
Officials said a major objective of the flight will be "verification that man can function in space as a primary system aboard the spacecraft for an extended period of time."
The medical checks will evaluate the adequacy of the life-support system.
Medical monitors at 23 ground- and ship-based tracking stations will keep close watch for signs of stress. They will collect data on blood pressure, temperature, respiration and a heart beat.
Several eating, water-drinking and rest periods are scheduled to maintain the astronaut's energy reserves for the demanding flight. Cooper is in sleep for eight hours on the 13th orbit.
After waking, he may take a stimulant to make him alert. He will eat the remainder of the mission.
A rectal thermometer, installed in the helmet, will be used for the first time on a space flight. It will replace a rectal thermometer.
The astronaut will tote four cameras into space. One of them is a television camera to relay live pictures of Cooper in action from seven ground stations: Cape Canaveral, Canary Islands and the U.S. West Coast. The other three in the Pacific. Cape Canaveral has conversion equipment to receive transmission of some pictures to commercial television networks.

Montgomery's Double Dies

WORTHING, England (Reuters)—M. E. Clifton James, 65, an actor who during the Second World War played the role of Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery's "double" in order to fool the Germans into thinking the British general was in Africa, died here Wednesday night.

Hoffa Six Others Indicted On Juror Influencing Charge

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—A federal grand jury indicted Teamster President James R. Hoffa and six others Thursday on charges of conspiring and attempting to influence a juror in his trial here last winter on charges of accepting illegal payments from a Detroit truck firm.
Hoffa, 48, was charged with "aiding, commanding and influencing" specific attempts to influence two jurors and a prospective juror to vote for his acquittal in exchange for money or favors.
The nine-week trial ended Dec. 28 in a mistrial, with the jury reporting it was hopelessly deadlocked.
Also indicted Thursday were Ewing King, president of Teamsters Local 227 in Nashville.
Allen Dorfman, Chicago insurance broker who has received large amounts of insurance for the Teamsters Union.
Larry Campbell, of Inskler, Mich., a business agent for Teamsters Local 299 at Detroit.
Hoffa is president of local 299, as well as of the international union.
Thomas Ewing Parks, Nashville, Campbell's uncle.
Nicholas J. Twell, Huntington, W. Va., president of Central Tobacco Company of New York.
Lawrence W. Meekin, a Nashville merchant.
Hoffa was named a defendant in five counts and the others were named in one count each in the all-volunteer grand jury made its report, on an investigation that began Jan. 17, to federal judge Frank Gray Jr. Gray issued bench warrants for the seven men.
Government lawyers said they would recommend that \$10,000 be set aside for each defendant.
The grand jury probe was started on orders of district Judge Justice William G. Miller, who presided at the Hoffa trial last year.
At the time Miller declared a mistrial, he announced that two jurors had been dismissed because of what he termed "bias" to influence the trial.

\$140,000 In Bogus Bills Taken in Montreal Raid

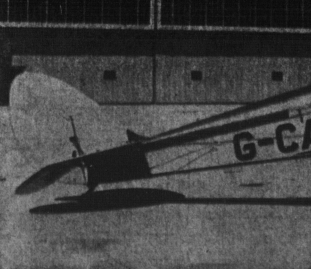
MONTREAL (CP)—RCMP arrested two men, picked up several other persons for questioning and seized about \$140,000 in counterfeit United States bills in a series of raids Thursday.
The men arrested were identified as Bonat Dozios and Marcel Dozios, both charged with possession of counterfeit money.
A high-ranking RCMP officer said 31 raids carried out in Montreal followed a lengthy investigation into a counterfeit money racket.
He said there may be more raids and arrests later. All in all, the bogus U.S. bills, all in \$100 and \$50 denominations, were in a briefcase found in a raid on a north-end apartment.
In the raids police also found 300 bogus U.S. passes, a number of C.N.S. Security cards, some firearms and ammunition, dynamite, and a number of forgeries.
The apartment was empty but the owner said it had been rented by a man named M. Drosko for a United States wife

man who was to occupy it, police said.
FOUND NEGATIVES
In addition to the bills, police found two numbering machines and negatives to be used in the offset printing of \$100, \$50 and \$1 bills.
The RCMP officer said that the finding of a 14-bill negative "was a revelation." This was something new in the counterfeit racket, which usually concentrates on larger denominations.
In the same apartment, the officer said, police found a quantity of dynamite and wire capable of setting off an explosion.

The officer said the opinion of investigators is that this is the kind of equipment safe-crackers would use.
He said police arrested J. Drosko at his East Montreal home, where about 1,000 counterfeit Canadian press money orders in denominations of \$10 to \$100 were found.
He said that police officers found counterfeit American bills being burned when they arrived.
The woman—Mrs. Raymond Quinlan—was picked up at her home in possession of bogus train passes and turned over to city police for questioning.
Another man—Tony Lasaroz—was picked up in his north Montreal home where a police found three fur coats described as "suspicious."
Leo Charonit was found in possession of a loaded Brownings.
In other raids, RCMP found another revolver and 100 counterfeit unemployment insurance cards.
