Artists Have Own Gallery In Winnipeg Successful Festival Concluded

WINNIPEG (CP) — Winnipeg artists are establishing their own art gallery.

"We waited long enough," said Bill Mays, one of the gallery's administrators. "No one ventured out to establish a commercial gallery in Winnipeg, so we decided to go to it."

To be known as the Yellow Door Gallery, the centre is located in a former dance hall.

"We're doing all the rewalling ourselves," Mays said.

Membership in the gallery will cost \$5 a month and must be taken out for at least one year. Membership entitles the holder to participate in the "fine drawing workshop" under which modelling expenses are pooled.

The gallery has a 10-member board of directors, including two women.

Galleries are usually set up by a businessman or woman as a commercial enterprise," said Jack MacDonald, the gallery's other administrator. "This gallery will be a commercial operation, but it will be run by the artists."

"Other galleries run by groups of artists exhibit only their own work," said Mays. "but we'll exhibit any artist approved by the board of directors. The gallery will charge a 15-per-cent commission on members' work sold and a 35-per-cent commission on non-member sales."

The gallery will be the only outlet in Winnipeg where work currently being done by local artists may be seen. "We feel it's something that's been needed for a long time."

There will be shows for a "selected group of interested citizens—those with money and a possible inclination to buy," said Mr. MacDonald.
