THE GOVERNORSHIP.

SIR,—The position of Lieutenant Governor will very soon be vacant, and consequently a considerable amount of discussion is taking place as to who will be honored with the gubernatorial chair for the next five years. Several names have been put forward, the friends of whom are advocating the claims of the different gentlemen named to the press and otherwise. Now while I have nothing to say as to the merits or demerits of the gentlemen whose claims are advocated by their friends, still I would strongly recommend, that the position of Lieutenant Governor should be filled by a man of talent and acknowledged ability and true as possible from those strong political proclivities that are apt to cling so tenaciously to an old politician, and a man who would have a thorough knowledge of politics as well as statesmanship. While I have nothing to say against any of the gentlemen whose names have been put forward I would suggest that the government should be careful, and appoint a man who would do credit not only to the Government but to the position; and I trust I may be pardoned if I should suggest a gentleman that I think is well qualified I would therefore strongly recommend David Montgomery, Esq., of Summersdale, who is known to be a man of acknowledged ability, whose knowledge of the political affairs of the country are known and acknowledged. Although never having occupied a seat in the Legislature, or Commons both of which he is eminently qualified to fill, he has occupied many positions with marked ability. His opinions have always been looked upon as beyond question, and his decisions on public questions have been characterized by an almost prophetic knowledge, and I have no doubt that he would fill the Gubernatorial chair with credit to the position and satisfaction to himself.

He is not an extreme party man, having been educated in the Old Liberal School. Still he has adapted himself with wonderful expertness to the New Liberalism, now in vogue. He is consequently not wedded too closely to party and never allows his opinions to be influenced by party prejudice. He may, therefore, be looked upon as a gentleman, who would decide all matters on their merits irrespective of political bias.

I would therefore recommend that his elevation to the Lieutenant Governorship be seriously and favorably considered.

Echoes From the East.

During the winter months debating societies have been established in different sections throughout the Island for the development of any mental and oratorical talent, for the cultivation of a taste for literature among the young, and also for the purpose of disposing of the surplus of long winter hours pleasantly and profitably. Through the medium of the press we learn of their establishment, and there is scarcely any other way in which the long winter evenings can be utilized with so much profit and pleasure.

Selkirk too has had its storms and calms not only with relation to the elements, but also in debate. A debating and literary society was organized on December 19th, 1898, which has been continued weekly since that time, and subjects of a social, moral and educational nature were discussed. At these debates it might be said the watchword was, "Strive mightily but eat and drink as friends." These weekly meetings were brought to a close on the 21st inst., by the discussion of the subject, "Should the colonies of Great Britain contribute to the support of the British navy?" This was perhaps the best debate of the season we have had. A large audience was present, and quite a number were strangers, some of whom took a lively part in the debate, which was begun (after the appointment of John McDonald (Borneo) to the chair) by Mr. P. J. McLellan, who maintained the affirmative side of the argument. He was supported by Messrs. Hugo A. McPhee, Arch. McPhee and Mr. Kennedy. The negative was supported by Messrs. Stephen J. McDonald, Angus J. McDonald, Peter McLure and J. A. McDonald. Space does not permit of comment upon the several speeches made; they were eloquent and brimful of patriotic sentiments. They would do credit to our Legislative halls and some of the young men displayed talent that leads us to believe they may some day attain the utmost position on the ladder of fame. Some of the arguments were; (1) That if Great Britain became involved in a great war she might have to withdraw her protection from the Colonies; (2) That if the colonies were paying a proportionate rate for that purpose their protection would be assured; (3) That when any great question springs up, such as boundary disputes, we seek the aid of the Imperial Government. That owing to the insular position of Great Britain and her comparatively small sailing army, she would have to rely mainly on her fleet for protection. Arguments for the negative: That supposing Great Britain were compelled to withdraw her protection of the colonies: they could defend themselves. Could not Canada, for example, raise an army sufficient for the purpose as she has done in her younger days, "For where's the coward that would not dare to fight for such a land." That already we pay largely in tribute towards the support of the British Navy; if the colonies wish to support it let them build cruisers occasionally which could be utilized as auxiliaries in case of war; that England must protect the colonies because it is in her own interests so do, for her defence, and she is proud to have them to protect.

The subject was fully discussed and at the close of the debate the vote of the

members present gave majority for the affirmative.

Several vocal solos were then given, after which a most orderly meeting was brought to a close.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Government has a bad case and Sir Wilfrid Laurier has begun to abuse the Leader of the Opposition.

—It has been remarked that from the first item to the last of the tariff there is scarcely one item which is not modelled and based on the principle of protection, instead of the principle of either free trade or a revenue tariff.

—Special significance is supposed to attach to the appointment of Commodore D'Almeida to the command of the British squadron in Newfoundland waters during the coming fishing season. No officer so far advanced in the British navy list was ever before appointed to this command, he being the senior of every officer in the British North American fleet except Admiral Fisher. His selection is regarded as indicating a determination on the part of Great Britain to enforce a settlement of disputed questions in this quarter by strengthening the squadron.

—A bill has been passed by the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia which provides that henceforth no one shall have the right to obtain from a judge an injunction against any manufacturing concern on the ground of real or alleged nuisance. The statute under which a judge could grant an injunction in such cases is thus repealed. An aggrieved party must content himself with the usual appeal to the courts for damages. If such a suit is won and the damages be not paid, an injunction may then be obtained. The bill is yet to be sanctioned by the Legislative Council.

Sir Richard Cartwright has said so, and his opinion is based upon the teachings of history and upon the dictates of common sense. "This," he said in pronouncing for free trade in this country, "is not a case for half measures, and you have in the late of the Democratic party in the United States a warning and an example of the doom which must overtake a party which palters with its convictions, and, having placed itself at the head of a great movement, will offer the people a stone instead of bread."

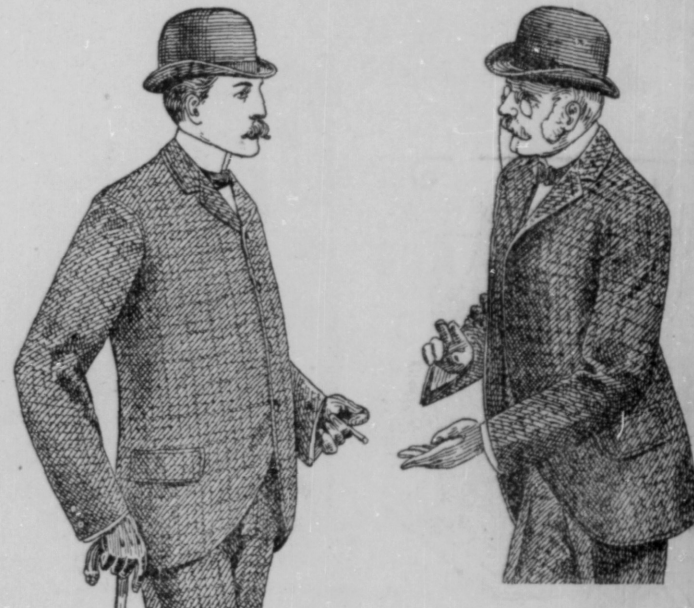

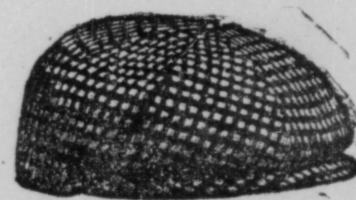
