P.E.I. Growers Lose Revenue

Lack of marketing facilities in the major Canadian centres cost Island potato growers \$200,000 in lost revenue on 10-pound bags alone last season, Leo P. McIsaac told the SDU Country Caucus Friday.

During February, March and April brokers were paying 22 to 25 cents each for the 10-pound packages in carload lots and selling them for 39 cents, an excess of nine cents over the normal mark-up.

As the price increased a similar excess was charged the surcharge thus averaging \$400 on each of 500 carlots of this type exported from the province during the season, Mr. McIsaac said.
