

# Western Races To Go Tonight

Onaway the "winningest horse" of the year met his first defeat of the season in Fredericton last week when he was photo finished out in 2:06. Up to that time Onaway has never been defeated in an early closing event. He has won events at every track in the Maritime. Doc Wilson has been getting better every time out and was never extended in his last outing when he won 2:09 Borderville Eric and Adios Shyster will likely be the long shots but in a five horse race the stretch will mean the difference and the faster two horses can really come home like scalded dogs. All in all it looks as though it will be one of the best races of the season.

As usual, Boots' Frame has lined up a bang-up supporting card. Five other classes will go, headed by an Invitational with seven evenly matched pacers. The luck of the draw saw the so-called weaker sex draw positions 5, 6 and 7 but Mountain Marie, Runway and Paddyland Girl will give plenty of opposition to the 4 males who drew the first four spots.

## BIS Shamrocks Nio Juniors

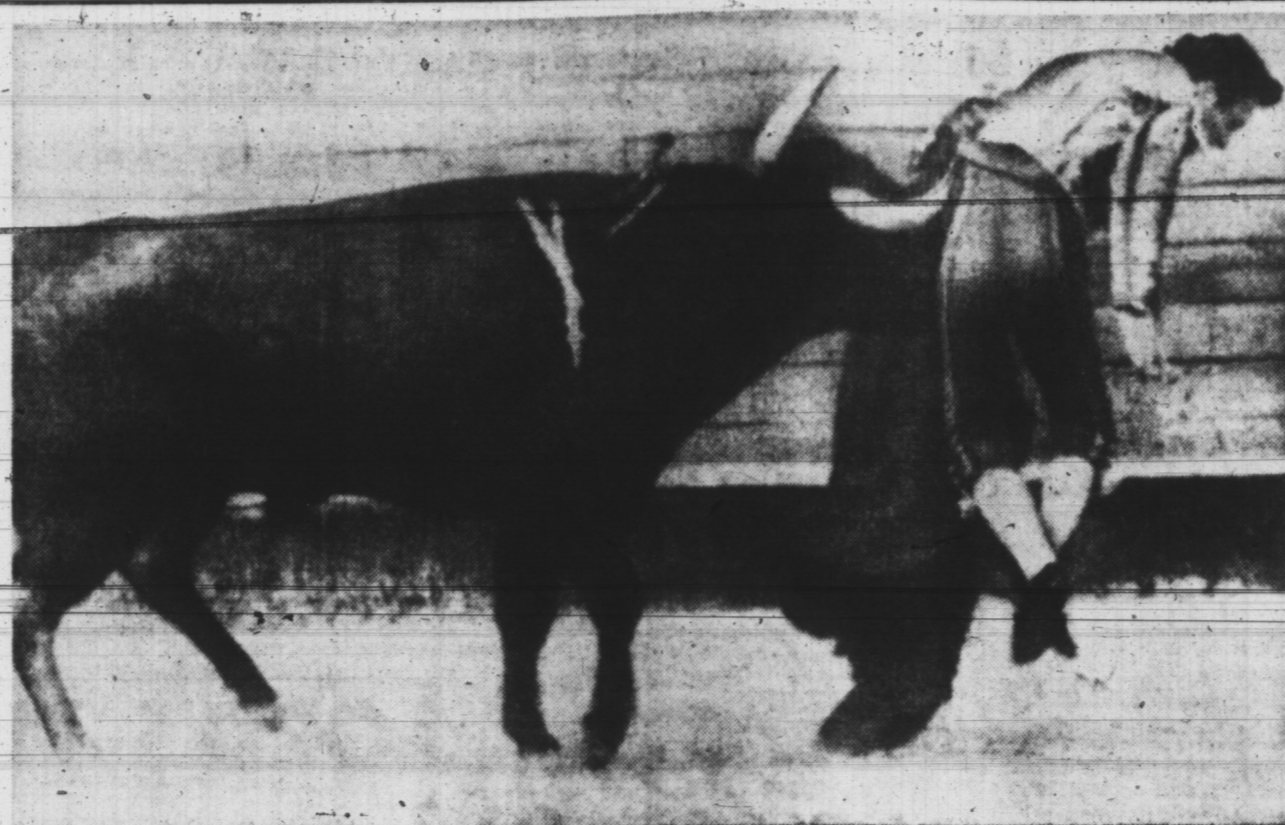

# England Defeats Portugal And Enters Cup Playoff

LONDON (CP)—England defeated Portugal 2-1 in a magnificent semi-final match Tuesday night and qualified to meet West Germany Saturday for the World Cup soccer title.

Both England goals came from the lethal right foot of centre forward Bobby Charlton. Portugal's reply was scored by the great Portuguese star from Mozambique, Eusebio Ferreira.

England, where football was founded, will play in the World Cup final for the first time when it clashes at Wembley Stadium Saturday against the Soviet Union in the semi-final played in Liverpool Monday night.

Portugal's hopes were dashed on the rock of England's magnificent defence which withstood intense pressure until seven minutes from the end. The goal by Eusebio, from the penalty spot, was the first yielded by England in the championships.

The goals by Charlton in the 30th and 79th minutes roused the crowd of 90,000 in Wembley Stadium to a fever pitch of excitement.

After Eusebio, Portugal's Black Panther, finally beat England goalkeeper Gordon Banks in the 82nd minute, there was pandemonium in the stadium as the highly-regarded Portugal side battled for the equalizer.

But not one serious foul marred this match which set high standards for skill and sportsmanship in a world tournament that has been tarnished by accusations of brutal tackling and unfair refereeing.

Eusebio's goal was his eighth of the tournament but he was outshone by Charlton, the English sharpshooter who plays for Manchester United.

British bookies immediately made England favorite to defeat West Germany and capture the Jules Rimet Trophy. The odds on England winning were 13 to 8, while West Germany was 11 to 8 against.

Team manager Alf Ramsey praised his team's performance as "the greatest since the beginning of the competition."

Ramsey said he did not think West Germany will be any tougher than Portugal, but added: "The West Germans have a well-balanced side and should be an extremely good final."

Ramsey's knuckles had been rapped Monday by a World Soccer Federation (FIFA) committee which recommended that the manager be disciplined by the English Football Association for remarks he made on television after England beat Argentina 1-0 in the rough quarter-final.

Ramsey was quoted as saying England's best football will be played against "the team who comes out to play football, not act as animals."

And good football was just what the Wembley fans saw Tuesday.

There wasn't a single serious foul. The final summary showed eight fouls called on England and three on Portugal, compared with previous World Cup games from which five players in all were expelled and several set down for a number of future games.

England wing half Nobby Stiles, who has a reputation as an iron tackler although only five feet, five inches tall and 150 pounds, followed Eusebio all over the field in performing heroically his assigned defensive job.

Eusebio did get free for seven shots that had the fans gasping. Banks stopped his drives four times; two others were diverted for corners and the seventh flashed dangerously past the England post — on the outside.

The penalty that allowed Eusebio to put Portugal on the score sheet occurred when Jackie Charlton used his hand to stop a sure goal by Jose Torres, a star for Portugal. Banks was out of his goal at the time.

The two goals by Bobby Charlton came on his specialty — first-time shots which caught Portugal's goalkeeper Jose Pereira out of position.

**SYDNEY, Australia (AP)**—Darrell Welsh got an eagle at the same hole in five consecutive rounds.

Welsh had the run on the par-5 18th hole at the Australian Club course, where he is club professional.

The hole is 462 yards and Welsh had his string of 3s during the weekend.

**GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP)**—Veteran defensive end Lloyd Voss and rookie Tony Jeter of Green Bay Packers were traded Tuesday to Pittsburgh Steelers for an undisclosed high draft choice.

Voss was a first-round choice from Nebraska in the 1964 National Football League draft. Jeter is from Nebraska and was a third-round draft choice last year.

**TORONTO (CP)**—CTV television network filed a writ here Monday for an injunction to prohibit the NBC and CBC from televising in Canada Saturday's World Cup soccer championship final game.

A spokesman for CTV said his network bought Canadian English-language rights to the game and a contract was signed with the Federation of International Football Associations in the spring.

He said NBC bought right to the game after CTV had signed its contract.

NBC claims it has North

American English language rights, but the CTV spokesman said the FIFA board of directors has stated that NBC does not have Canadian English-language rights.

NBC will be receiving the game live via satellite and plans to feed the broadcast live to the CBC.

The CTV spokesman said his network had hoped to receive live feed of the game from NBC, but now intends to tape the game in England and show it on the network Sunday afternoon.

**KANSAS CITY (AP)**—Kansas City Athletics of the American League announced Tuesday the reinstatement of pitcher Ralph Terry from the disabled list and the recall of pitcher Joe Grzenda from the Mobile club of the Southern League.

Terry had been out for more than two weeks with a sprained ankle.

**MONTREAL (CP)**—Frank Curotte, coach of Coughnauaga Indians of the Quebec Lacrosse League, was banned from the game for life Tuesday by Jean-Paul Massicotte, league president.

Curotte was alleged to have attacked referee Leo Theoret Sunday night after the Indians dropped a 16-13 decision to Ville St. Pierre Saints at the suburban Lachine arena.

Curotte will never again have anything to do with lacrosse," Massicotte said.

There was no indication whether Curotte's expulsion will apply across Canada. The OLL operates outside the jurisdiction of the Canadian Lacrosse Association, the national governing body.

**LANSING, Mich. (AP)**—A fuel shortage was suspected Tuesday by federal aviation experts in the twin-engine plane crash which killed golfer Tony Lema, his wife and two crew members Sunday night.

Investigation has shown that neither engine of the plane, carrying Lema and the others from the PGA tournament in Akron, Ohio, was operating when it crashed on a golf course near the Illinois-Indiana state line.

"It's very unusual for both engines of a twin-engine aircraft to quit together. We suspect a fuel shortage," said a Civil Aeronautics Board team headed by Noel Lawson.

Meanwhile, Lake County, Ind., officials held for safekeeping nearly \$23,000 in cheques and British pound notes found in Lema's ledger case.

The bodies of Lema and his wife, Betty, were shipped Monday to San Leandro, Calif.

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—Frank Howard's pinch single with the bases loaded and Ken McMullen's two-run triple helped Washington Senators to a 6-2 victory over California Angels Tuesday night.

Howard batted for Willie Kirkland when the Angels switched to left-hander Marcelino Lopez in the third inning and singled to left, scoring Bob Savering and McMullen. Don Lock's single drove in the third run of the inning.

**CASSIUS CLAY To Retire**  
 LONDON (AP)—Cassius Clay said Tuesday he expects to retire in two years and will become a Black Muslim preacher.

"I have five defences of the world heavyweight title left, at the most," Clay told reporters. "Of course, if I get beaten I'll retire immediately."

Clay meets Brian London of Britain here Aug. 6. If Clay defeats London, as predicted, he takes on Karl Mildenberger of Germany at Frankfurt Sept. 10.

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)**—Jim Hart snapped an 0-for-18 slump with a three-run homer Tuesday as San Francisco Giants beat Pittsburgh Pirates 8-3 and moved past the Pirates into first place in the National League by a full game.

Hart hit his 22nd homer of the year after Pirate starter Steve Blass walked Willie Mays and Willie McCovey on eight pitches with two-out in the first inning. The Pirates never caught up.

Hart also batted in a run with a bases-loaded sacrifice fly in the seventh, during which the Giants scored twice.

Gaylord Perry, who left in the seventh with two-outs and a run in, posted his 15th victory against two losses and fourth over the Pirates without a defeat this season.

Roberto Clemente, to-u.e.h.e.d. Perry for a two-run homer in the sixth.
