### LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 22.—The Industrial World says. Three thousand tons of Bessemer pig iron, the product of a Milwaukee mill, has been sold for export to Germany. Many other foreign enquiries are at hand in this market.

SEBURY, Ont., July 22.—Samples of coal, brought yesterday from the Citizens Mine, show a decided improvement over previous ones. Public tests were made in a blacksmith's shop, which were entirely satisfactory. Every foot the shaft deepens the carbon increases, and experts say they are only a short distance from the pure anthracite.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., July 22.—Marcus G. Nicols, an aged and wealthy farmer residing on Daniels' farm in the town of Trumbull, was foully murdered by two masked burglars at his residence early this morning. His sister, Mary who lived with him, was seriously, perhaps fatally shot, and the murderers and thieves abandoned the scene after ransacking the house and securing money thought to be about \$200.

LONDON, July 22.—The Daily Mail has received an anonymous letter with reference to the probability of a war between England and the United States, in which the writer says: "England ought to take the opportunity of rectifying the frontier by annexing Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire, and a part of New York state, thus giving Canada a seaport—Portland, to which navigation is open all the year. She is also to annex Alaska and the Sandwich Islands. The writer also declares that the talk of the United States helping England in the event of a war with a combination of European powers is all twaddle, and says that it is far more likely the Americans would fight against England."

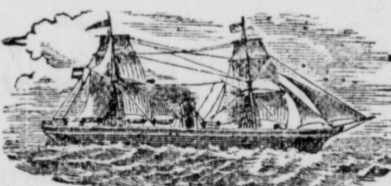
