## That Body Of Yours

### SOME INFORMATION ABOUT POLIO

As it is in the late summer and early autumn that polio (infantile paralysis) usually occurs, parents are naturally anxious about their youngsters as they thus call in the family doctor with the slightest symptom such as a slight rise in temperature.

While it so happens that most of these illnesses are of a mild nature, nevertheless polio often starts with the same symptoms as other diseases of children, such as measles or scarlet fever. It is thus better to call the family physician even if the parent only describes the symptoms over the telephone; it is always better to be sure than sorry.

Among the symptoms that are as much like other ailments as polio described by Drs. A. B. Baker and Fae E. Tichy, Professor and Assistant Professor, respectively of Neurology, University of Minnesota, in Medical Clinics of North America are mild headaches, weakness, nausea and vomiting, and fever for twenty-four hours.

These symptoms may become more intense and may be followed by the more characteristic involvement of the nervous system. Stiffness and pain in the neck and back, and nervous irritability are common. In some cases the pains in shoulder and neck do not appear immediately and polio is not suspected, but the paralytic symptoms appear a little later.

Paralysis usually begins within two to six days and may gradually progress for several more days. Generally, as the temperature goes

### Cook's Corner

#### SOFT STRAWBERRY JAM

8 cups strawberries (app. 2 qts.)  
8 cups sugar  
1/2 cup lemon juice.  
Wash berries, hull. Put in alternate layers with sugar in preserving kettle or bowl. Let stand 2 or 3 hours. Bring to boil, and boil uncovered, for 5 minutes. Add lemon juice, boil about 5 more minutes, until jam stage is reached. When done, remove from heat. Skim and stir for 5 minutes to prevent berries from floating. Pour into hot sterilized jars, and cool slightly. Seal with paraffin. Makes about 9, 6-oz. glasses of jam.

#### Strawberry Jam with Added Pectin

3 1/2 cups prepared fruit  
1/2 cup strained lemon juice  
7 cups sugar  
1/2 bottle liquid pectin  
Crush completely about 2 qts. washed, hulled strawberries. Measure 3 1/2 cups into large saucepan. Add lemon juice. Add sugar, mix well. Bring to full rolling boil, boil hard, 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add once, stir in liquid pectin. Then skim and stir by turns for 5 min-

### How Can I!!!

Q. How can I easily remove ink stains from the fingers?

A. Rub a little vinegar on the stains, then wash in soapy water.

Q. How can I prepare a molded salad if I have no molds?

A. The muffin tins often prove ideal for preparing a molded salad. They make just the size required for a small serving and take up less room in the refrigerator than individual molds. They prove particularly handy when serving a great number of guests, as one seldom has a very great many molds on hand.

Q. How can I rid a closet of moths?

A. If the closet is infested with moths, saturate a cloth with formaldehyde, hang it in the closet, and close tightly for 12 hours. The fumes will kill the moths and their eggs, and still leave no odor in the clothing.

#### Furniture

If there are bruised spots on your furniture, wet them with warm water. Soak a piece of brown paper of several thicknesses in warm water and lay over the bruise. Then apply a warm flat iron until the moisture is gone. Repeat the operation, if necessary, and the bruise will disappear.

#### Sewing

If it is necessary to hold material tightly while sewing it, use a brick covered with padding and pin the material to it.

#### Eggs

Hold a funnel over a dish and break the egg into it. The white will go through the funnel into the dish, and the yolk will remain in the funnel unless it is broken.

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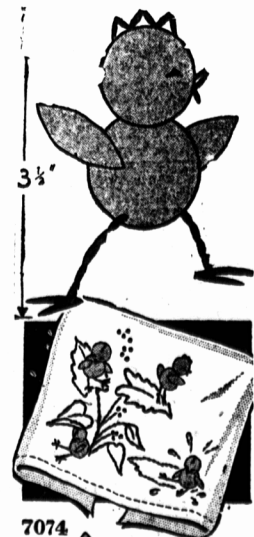

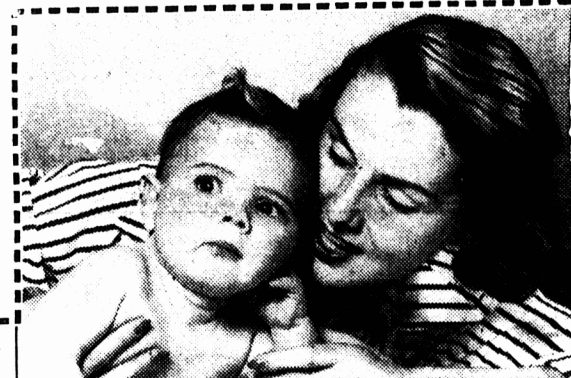

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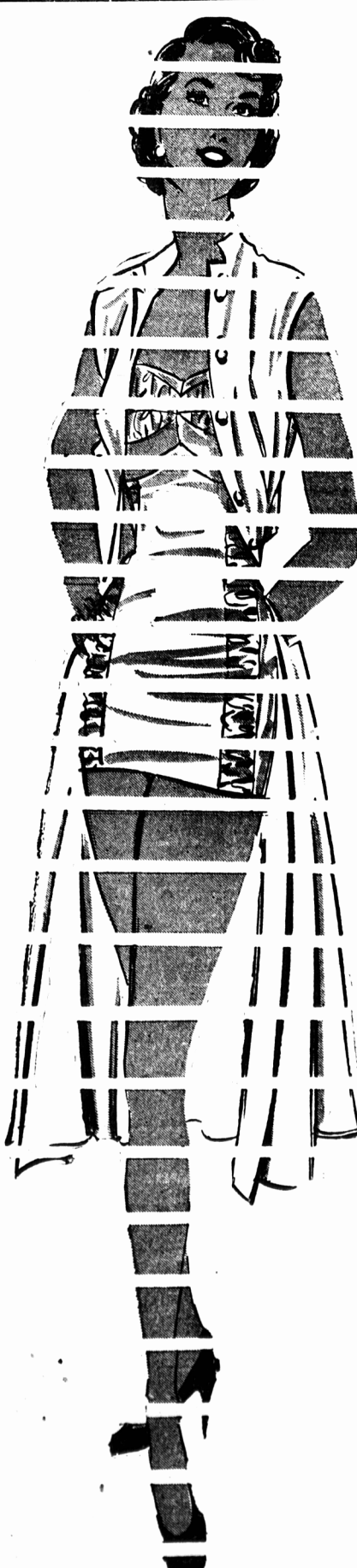
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
