The funeral was held this afternoon at half-past two, and was largely attended. The pallbearers were William Batt, John Caven, Theo. Moore, Alexander McDonald, Donald Nibholson and William Murray. The services in St. Dunstan's Cathedral and at the grave were conducted by Rev. Dr. Morrison. Among the floral offerings was a handsome wreath from the officials of the Charlottetown post office.
