LETTER FROM MR. A. P. PROWSE.

SIR.—Through your columns I wish to
correct certain statements that I am
credited with making at the public meet-
ing held at Murray Harbor South on the
16th ult. I regret to say, Mr. Editor,
that your correspondent who sent in the
report of that meeting, which report ap-
peared in THE EXAMINER of October 20th,
did not grasp the financial situation of this
province as I presented it, and he has, I
am quite sure, unintentionally mis-
reported me. I did not state that the debt of
this province was \$604,245.47 on Decem-
ber 31st, 1898. I gave the indebtedness
of the province on December 31st, 1898, as
it appears in the public accounts. I then
calculated the business that has transpired
since December 31st, 1898, and although
we cannot get the exact figures enough is
known when we take into account the un-
finished contracts, debentures issued, loans,
&c., to warrant us in assuming that the
present indebtedness or liabilities of the
province must be over \$600,000.

I hardly considered it worth while, at
first, to notice the Patriot's slurs; but as
that journal appears anxious for a quarrel
I feel I am in duty bound to correct the
misrepresentations it is making against
me. As far as keeping of books is con-
cerned we have so far been able to pay one
hundred cents to the dollar. I would not
relish taking lessons in this line from the
editor or manager of the Patriot news-
paper, if one may judge from the manner
and style that that journal takes in hand-
ling the public questions and in my
opinion attempting to blindfold and delude
the intelligent electors of Prince Edward
Island.

It is quite unnecessary for me to say
anything further or go into details and
make comparisons. I am perfectly will-
ing to let the unprejudiced public look in-
to these matters for themselves and judge
accordingly. I know, Mr. Editor, you are
quite capable of meeting the statements or
arguments of The Patriot and I would
respectfully suggest that you keep a close
eye on that journal, as, in justice to the
public, is very much needed. I am
