Memorial Services

In the churches throughout the United Kingdom, memorial services were held today for the King. The Archbishop of York delivered the sermon at Westminster Abbey.

"Our prayers for a long reign for King George were not granted, but the prayer that he might faithfully discharge his great responsibilities had been abundantly answered," the Archbishop said.

"And now we have comforted one another with the sure and certain hope that... from the King of Kings, he had heard the words: 'Well done thou good and faithful servant.'"

On the King's own estate in Scotland, the people gathered in the little church of Crathie near the entrance to Balmoral Castle and listened to the wail of the bagpipes played by two of the King's pipers.

"There is weeping in the glens," Rev. John Lamb said in his sermon. "Life seems strangely hushed and shadowed in these last few days, for our King is dead."

The service closed with the sad wail of the bagpipes.

Memorial Services Held In Montague

Memorial services in honor of the late King George the Sixth were held in several churches yesterday in Montague. It is understood that services will also be held on Friday, the national day of mourning in churches in the community.

Special services were held yesterday at the St. Andrews Presbyterian Church conducted by the minister, Rev. F. N. Young. Mrs. Elsie Waterworth presided at the organ. Appropriate hymns were sung, and in the evening a favorite hymn of the late Sovereign "The King Of Love, My Shepherd Is," was sung. At both services Rev. Mr. Young delivered inspiring sermons paying glowing tribute to the memory of the late King. The large congregation joined in singing "God Save The Queen."

already outside Westminster to await arrival of the coffin.

The court is to come out of mourning June 1, an announcement said Saturday night. The period is shorter than had been generally expected.

Full mourning for the King's father, George V, lasted six months. That was followed by three months of half mourning.

Observers noted that, by custom, a coronation is not held in the mourning period but is held in the months of good weather. Thus the end of the period, May 31 would not rule out coronation for Elizabeth either this summer or in early autumn. It had been generally assumed, however, that the coronation will come next spring.

Private Service

Today at Sandringham, the Royal Family assembled alone and said their prayers in private in the little parish church where the King's body lay.

But tomorrow the privacy ends. At 11 a. m. (6 a. m. EST) a military guard will lift the plain oak coffin from the

church, and the solemn but colorful journey to London will get under way.

The coffin will be borne to near-by Wolverton railroad station. The Duke of Gloucester, the late King's brother, and the Duke of Edinburgh, his son-in-law, will follow on foot over the crowded two-mile route.

The new Queen, Elizabeth II, will come by car with her widowed mother and her sister, Princess Margaret, and join the royal train for the slow 130-mile ride to the capital.

The train will consist of 10 coaches with the coffin to be carried in the same teakwood hearse car that bore the body of King George V back from Sandringham 16 years ago.

The new Queen and her family will ride in a coach directly in front of the hearse car. It also is made of polished teak fitted with blue and silver upholstery.

At King's Cross station in London, a military guard of 243 men will escort the coffin to the gun-carriage for the last portion of the journey to Westminster Hall. The Dukes of Gloucester and Edinburgh again will accompany the coffin on foot on the three-mile march while the Queen, the Queen Mother and the Princess will go by car to join another Queen, Mary—the grandmother of the new Queen—and await the arrival of the slow procession at Westminster Hall.

Passage of the cortege through London will take an hour, arriving at Westminster Hall at 3:45 p. m. (10:45 a. m. EST). The King's coffin will be received there by the Archbishop of York, Dr. Cyril Garbett, who will deputize for the ailing Archbishop of Canterbury.

The coffin will be carried to a catafalque, erected on the same spot where he and his brothers mounted guard over their father, George V, when he lay in state there 16 years ago.

The guard will be mounted by four army officers; one at each corner of the coffin, each with his sword bowed and the point of his sword touching the ground.

The coffin itself will be closed. On it will rest a purple cushion holding the imperial crown. Lying on the coffin will be the King's sceptre, the baton the monarch carries as a symbol of authority and in the head of which is fixed the world's largest cut diamond, the Cullinan diamond, presented to King Edward VII in 1907.

Also placed over the coffin will be the orb, the sphere which signifies kingly power and justice and the king's state sword.

In the presence of the new Queen and her family, other members of the nobility and of the Houses of Parliament, the Archbishop of York will conduct a short service.

On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, hundreds of thousands of ordinary Britons are expected to file past the catafalque in a last gesture of respect.

Friday morning, at 9:30 a. m. the state funeral procession, through the streets of London by Paddington Station, will begin and the body will be taken to Windsor Castle for burial. The final rites are expected to begin at 2 p. m.
