SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

Interesting Excursion and Researches.

The session of the Summer School of Science is nearing its termination; but the interest continues unabated. Sunday's services were of an interesting character; able and scholarly sermons were preached by Rev. Dr. Read, of Kalamazoo College, Michigan; Rev. Mr. Turner, Jersey City; Rev. Dr. Andrews, Sackville; Rev. T. H. Siddall, Port Medway.

On Monday evening, H. N. Shaw, of Toronto College of Music, gave a Recital and Tableau entertainment where selections from Shakespeare's Henry VIII, Macbeth and Romeo and Juliet were given, also from Richelieu by Bulwer Lytton. The recitations were illustrated by seventeen tableaux exquisitely costumed and arranged.

The lecture on Tuesday evening by Rev. Dr. Andrews was one of the best of the course of evening lectures. His subject was entitled "The wonderful aspect of life." Life, he said, occupied but a fringe of space in this great universe, extending only a short distance below the surface of the earth and a short distance into the air above us, leaving the vast depths beneath and heights above dead. It also has existed for a very limited time; and its duration is short. The living matter in all bodies is a cell, a bioplast which he described as to size, composition and properties. Coming to the body of a human being the lecturer said that four-fifths of our bodies are dead, one-fifth alone lives. The life history of the cells was given—method of propagation and differentiation, how that starting from a common parentage the different forms of life are simply different branchings in the course of evolution. Man is not an evolution from the lower orders, but is the highest development that has accrued from the parent stock. The lecture was clearly illustrated by blackboard drawings and was to all who heard it a rich literary and scientific treat.

Tuesday was spent on an excursion to the historical "Annapolis Royal". Leaving Bear River by the Marina, the excursionists reached Annapolis at 11 o'clock. Proceeding under the guidance of several citizens, the old fort was visited and points of interest described. The remains of the oldest French wharf on the continent was shown, the Black Hole, the dungeon of the fort was entered. It is wonderfully well preserved. The magazine constructed in 1642 is still intact. The keeper of the fort being somewhat of a ventriloquist entertained our party to a conversation between himself and *La Tour*. Fortunately the celebrated Frenchman had forgotten his native tongue, and carried on his conversation in understandable English. The walls of the magazine are 7 1/2 feet thick built of Caen stone brought from France. The plan of construction of the fort was explained. The area of the fort is thirty-one acres. Many points of interest outside the fort were visited, including the grave yard and the old summer house of the French governors, that we were told was 345 years old. This was a very enjoyable excursion, and those of us who are teachers will be able in the future to teach the history of Port Royal with a vividness before impossible, having stood on the ground and in imagination seen the struggle for supremacy between the two great powers for the possession of the continent.

EXCURSION.—A full moon and an unclouded sky made the excursion on the Princess last night a very enjoyable affair. About two hundred persons were on the boat. The route of the excursion was out to Point Prim, back to the harbor and around to the Point again. The Princess arrived at the dock about half-past twelve. The music of the 4th Regt., C. A., band added greatly to the night's enjoyment.

CHEESE SALE.—A record price was achieved at the meeting of the Cheese Board held this morning, when 1078 and 1013-16cets was offered for the first half of August cheese. Kensington sold at 1078 cents to Mr. Horace Haszard. Fourteen factories sold to Mr. A. J. Biffin at 1013-16 cents and three to Mr. H. Haszard at the same price. Six factories were unsold when the meeting closed. Altogether 1,290 boxes white and 2,926 boxes colored were on the board.
