Brewer Prepared To Sue Pro Hockey For Freedom

By JIM CRERAR TORONTO (CP) - Carl Brewer is prepared to sue for his freedom from professional hockey and two wealthy businessmen are ready to pay his legal expenses.

Alan Eagleson, Brewer's lawyer, said Thursday the former Toronto Maple Leaf defenceman will go to court if he has to break a suspension that could keep him from joining Canada's national team for the World Hockey Championships in Vienna next March.

Brewer, 27, a seven-year veteran with the Leafs, who quit the team a year ago, announced Tuesday he is seeking reinstatement as an amateur so he can join the Canadian team as a player and assistant manager and coach.
