Canada that a change at Ottawa would be desirable. Mr. Nowlan said, "The Liberal party has ceased to be a party and has become a political machine oiled by the fruits of office." He instanced the tremendous increases in ministerial travelling expenses and other controllable items, and said that the need for greater parliamentary control over expenditures, as emphasized by the Conservatives, is meeting with very general support.

Mr. Nowlan, who resides at Wollville, N.S., represents Annapolis-King's in the House of Commons. Last June he recaptured the seat which he held before the 1946 general election, in a sensational by-election in which he defeated the Liberal candidate, Mr. Angus Ederkin, who had been returned in 1946 by five votes. The election was subsequently voided, and in the next contest Mr. Nowlan romped home with a majority of nearly 2,600 votes.

It was his third election in eighteen months; his first, in 1946, being successful when he won the seat in a by-election following the resignation of the Rt. Hon. J. L. Halsey.

50th Anniversary Service At Central Christian Church

Large congregations met in special observance of the fiftieth anniversary of Central Christian Church yesterday. This year has marked the end of a half-century of building, for, in September 1900 the building was dedicated to the glory of God and to the service of mankind.

The Minister, Rev. M. D. Dunbar, was in charge of the services and presented the message. The morning topic "Central Christian Church: Her Right to Exist" included, among other more general reasons, basic beliefs of this people. The Minister suggested in his introductory remarks that "every person, every institution, in fact everything should have some good reason assignable for its existence. If we have none as good or better to impel us on in this last half-century, if we have not a good work to perform which will likely not be done without us, then we will likely be the cause of a useless and inexcusable disturbance in the religious world."

Continuing, the Minister said: "Essentially the purpose of the Church in Charlottetown has been to propound the Divine Pattern of sound words; the examination of which will reveal Jesus Christ the foundation, with Christ the chief corner stone; a pattern which can be read and understood, one that is workable and one that will stand every test. Dedicated to the highest loyalty this church has every right to exist. The propagation of truth compels us."

The evening message composed a frank and open delivery upon the subject of Christian unity. A great number of congratulatory letters were read from many Churches and friends across the United States and Canada. A large anniversary offering was received.

Special music was under the capable direction of Miss Thelma Burns, Organist and choir director. The choir sang two anthems: "Oye is the Lord" and "The Lord is my strength." Mr. Preston Beck sang the most fitting "Bless this House" while the Church quartette brought the number, "That Beautiful Land."

These services will long be remembered by members and the host of friends representing different city and country congregations.

Stubborn Red Pockets Delay Allied Advance

SEOUL, Oct. 30 - (Monday) - (CP) Commonwealth forces cracked the corner of the Communist mountain strongholds in North Korea as overwhelming United Nations forces ground relentlessly towards the Manchurian border Sunday.

The U.N. forces swelled by new amphibious landings on the east coast, outnumbered the stubborn Communist pockets of resistance more than three to one.

At least six South Korean divisions and three United States divisions as well as the Commonwealth brigades composed of British and Australian troops were taking part in the giant drive.

Their combined forces numbered more than 110,000 men. Farther back, if needed, the Allied command had an estimated 90,000 additional troops. A Tokyo headquarters spokesman estimated that the North Koreans had no more than 37,000 effectives left throughout Korea.

These Reds were making desperate rear-guard stands and behind-the-line escapes. They apparently were trying to slow the Allied advance in a fight for time, now that winter is near.

AP correspondent Ben Price reported from the east coast that it was reasonably certain now that the Communists are re-organizing cut-off units in hopes of major fighting next spring.

United Nations field forces, however, were making a strong effort to finish the war quickly and avoid protracted guerrilla fighting in Korea's bitter winter.

The 5th Regiment captured 80 prisoners Sunday including two Chinese privates.

One Chinese prisoner said he was a member of the 115th Division of the 35th Corps of the 13th Chinese Red Army. The other Chinese identified his unit as the 117th Division of the 39th Corps.

Intelligence officers in Tokyo, however, continued to insist there still was no indication of open intervention by the Chinese Communists.

Jaycees Meet At Moncton

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 29 - (CP) - Delegates from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island gathered here Saturday as the annual Maritime regional conference of the Junior Chamber of Commerce went into session.

The delegates were tendered a banquet after registration, and discussion on the constitution was carried out. The regional presidents, Les J. Archibald of Dartmouth, N. S., presided over the session. Walter LePage, vice president for P. E. I., handled the discussion and gave the opening remarks.

BRITISH WEST

Count of goods shipped annually in pre-war years. Through the 25-per-cent cut-back in dollar imports ordered by the British Government last year, and through other import curtailments, B. W. I. gradually clamped down on imports from Canada.

Thus, from a \$67,000,000 export business in the 1946-48 period, Canada found her shipments to B. W. I. dwindling to about \$30,000,000 in 1950. In addition, the West Indies, finding alternatives sources of supplies, was buying such Canadian items as sardines, apples, other fruits and some paper products.

Hit Maritime The move hit particularly at Maritime shippers. Consultations were held with the British Government and it was pointed out that the B. W. I. traditionally provided the biggest market among all the British crown colonies for Canadian goods.

The agreement does not guarantee any markets for Canadian goods, but stipulates that the B. W. I. governments must provide licences for a minimum of one-third and one-half of the value of the goods shipped during the peak years.

The minimum of one-third will apply on such items as canned fruits and vegetables, breakfast and prepared foods, leather, apples, rubber and metal products, as well as a host of other goods such as electrical apparatus, chemicals and liquor.

Licences amounting to one-half of the exporter's base-period shipments will be granted on meats,

Report Deer Begin Exploring Province

The Provincial Government imported deer have set about exploring the province, having been seen in the vicinity of Hunter River a few days ago.

The two deer were released on the farm of Mr. R. R. Bell at Clyde about a week and a half ago but only remained inside the boundary fence for a few days. Ordinary field fences prove little obstacle to the jumping deer and it is estimated that it would take a fence eight to ten feet high to contain them. No attempt is being made to keep them in a restricted area.

The deer, a buck with an antler spread and a doe, were imported from the Department of Lands and Forests, Ontario.
