# increase in bilingual reports

MONTREAL (CP) — Greater French-Canadian participation in business and industry in the last decade has sparked an increase in the number of companies publishing bilingual annual reports on the verge of collapse. Large corporations recognize the value of these reports, and are taking steps to bring them into the market. For most companies, bilingual annual reports are relatively new, though Canadian Pacific Railways started 20 years ago. Some 150 companies who do not publish their report in both languages, may be considering it. The number of companies who hold in the extra cost, does not warrant the same cost of printing and distribution. One corporation reported that a French shareholder sent back his proxy statement with a letter, saying he would not exercise it unless the annual report were written in a language he can read. Some companies have even gone so far as to have their letters patent altered, to give them a bilingual nature. One executive said: "A French report looks darn funny with an English name like the French. Dominion Tar and Chemical produces simultaneous translation facilities for annual meetings. D. M. Matheson, executive director of employee and public relations, said recently: "We are taking steps to implement a policy whereby our executive groups become bilingual. We are and are endeavoring to introduce the use of the appropriate language where possible. The general tone of the replies to the survey indicated that business is aware of the French-Canadian investors and plans are being taken to bring these new investors into the market."

# Can Co. Seeks Kentville Site

TORONTO (CP) — Continental Can Company of Canada Ltd. has announced it has optioned property in Kentville, N.S., as the site for the company's new Maritime plant. The company, which operates sales and service offices in Kentville and Halifax, announced early last month it would build a canning plant in Nova Scotia. E. E. Fry, vice-president of Continental, said engineering surveys on the property will begin immediately. The plant will be a 40,000-sq-ft facility. Production of glassy building is scheduled to begin in 1969.

# Plane Wreckage Reported Found

EDMONTON (CP) — The RCAF has reported it has discovered the plane missing since last fall with four men aboard. The wreckage was found Monday by a crew of topographical surveyors, 145 miles west of Fort Simpson, N.W.T. The site is accessible only by helicopter. The RCMP report from the scene said there were no survivors. Comment on the plane when it disappeared Sept. 29 were northern photographer Henry Buss, 66, and miners Gunther Getz and Victor Hudon. The pilot was Kenneth Stockall, 34, of Yellowknife. The man was on a photographic flight in the float-equipped Cessna 185.

# Quebec Inquest Delayed 12 Days

QUEBEC (CP) — A coroner's inquest into the death of four boys believed to have been the victims of a sedition is expected to be resumed in about 12 days. Provincial police Inspector J. Alphonse Matte said here Tuesday he had asked for the police to complete their investigation into the affair.

# Poison Gas Claims Bring Probe By UN

LONDON (AP) — United Nations Secretary-General U Thant ordered an inquiry into claims that Egyptian bombers dropped poison gas on royalist troops in Yemen's civil war. Britain and the United States are reported launching independent investigations. That told reporters in Geneva Tuesday he had asked for the UN inquiry before he was officially notified of the allegations by the British government's chief delegate at UN offices in Geneva, Charles P. Scott. The UN probe will be conducted by Gen. Carl von Horn, head of the UN observer team in Yemen.
