

Yanks Sweep Twin Bill; Redlegs Halt Card Streak

New York Yankees won a doubleheader from Washington Senators Sunday as the Yankees took over their usual first-place slot in the American League and Senators remained in their accustomed last-place position.

In the National League, Cincinnati Reds rebounded from a 16-3 beating at the hands of St. Louis Cardinals in the opener to halt a St. Louis winning streak at four games by winning the nightcap 4-3 and drop the Cardinals out of first place.

In other American League action, Detroit Tigers bombed Los Angeles Angels 13-6; Chicago White Sox took a doubleheader from Boston Red Sox, winning the first 2-1 and the second 5-1; Baltimore Orioles defeated Kansas City Athletics 9-3; and Minnesota Twins topped Cleveland Indians twice, 6-4 and 7-3.

In other senior circuit action, New York Mets moved up to ninth place as they split a doubleheader with Philadelphia Phillies, winning the opener 8-0 and dropping the nightcap 10-2; Houston Colts were edged by Milwaukee Braves 3-2; and San Francisco Giants shut out Chicago Cubs twice, 7-0 and 6-0.

Pittsburgh Pirates won the first game of a doubleheader at

Los Angeles, defeating the Dodgers 6-1.

FORD IN GOOD FORM
The Yankees bounded past Cleveland into the league lead on the strength of Whitey Ford's tight pitching in the opener for a 3-2 win and a display of their vaulted power in the second game as they knocked off Washington with homers by Clete Boyer and Bill Skowron.

Sensors were losing their 12th and 13th consecutive games during the day. Roger Maris homered for New York in the first game.

Chicago's doubleheader win over the Red Sox also moved them ahead of the now third-place Indians, as White Sox jumped to within one-half game of New York, one-half game ahead of Cleveland.

Johnny Buzhardt pitched his way to the first-game Chicago defeat of Boston and veteran Early Wynn received credit for the nightcap win.

Fourth-place Detroit Tigers were bolstered in the win over ninth-place Los Angeles by homers from Jake Wood, Billy Brutto, Al Kaline and Dick Brown. Lee Thomas and Bob Rodgers each homered for the Angels.

Phil Regan was the winner and Dean Chance suffered the loss.

Baltimore Orioles, in fifth place, slammed four home runs

two by Jim Gentile, to defeat seventh-place Kansas City. Starter and winner Milt Pappas and Russ Snyder also homered for Orioles and Baltimore scored six runs in the seventh to break open the game.

Sixth-place Minnesota also went on a home-run binge as they humbled Cleveland. Twins slammed six solo homers in the nightcap off starter and loser Gary Bell and reliever Barry Latman with blasts from Lenny Green, Don Mincher, Zorro Versalles, Bill Tuttle and two from John Goryl.

Fight Welcomed In Canada Says Federation Prexy

QUEBEC (CP)—The Canadian Boxing Federation, reacting to the New York State Athletic Commission's denial of a boxing licence to Sonny Liston, said Saturday the Philadelphia heavyweight can fight in Canada anytime.

"We won't stop it," said national commissioner Gene Letourneau, expressing surprise at the New York move.

"Liston has paid his debt to society," he said. "Cutting him off completely is not the way to rehabilitate him. He'll get back to crime."

Letourneau is governor of the Quebec provincial jail.
