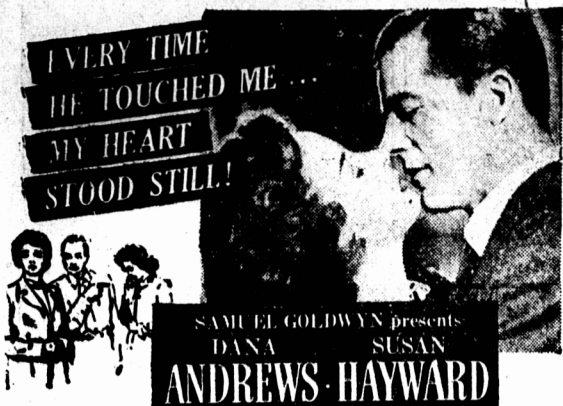

Montague Town Council Meeting

The regular meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last night at the Council rooms with Councillor Leroy White presiding in the absence of His Worship, Mayor W. H. Lane. All members of the Council were present. The secretary, Mr. B. N. Hooley, read the minutes of the last meeting which were approved. The minutes reported that two small fire extinguishers had been purchased during the past month, also that a catch basin had been placed at a point below MacDonald Avenue to catch the flood water from the hills in that vicinity.

Third reading of the by-law re the tax rates had also been given, setting the rates for real estate at .80, and for personal property at .20. The secretary then read the bills, and it was moved that they be paid. Several matters dealing with the correspondence then arose, and after discussion were disposed of. Councillor Coffin, chairman of the fire committee, brought in some estimates and prices on fire hose couplings, and nozzles, and it was recommended that the next Council, which is to be elected in February, take under consideration the procuring of additional hose.

The secretary then read the financial statement in brief, which is to be presented at a later date after the auditor's have completed their work. The Council appointed Mr. Percy Pope as auditor to complete the books for the year. With respect to the coming election on the first week of February for a new Council, it was decided that election procedure be left in the hands of the clerk, and that nominations for mayor and councillors are to be taken before the secretary.

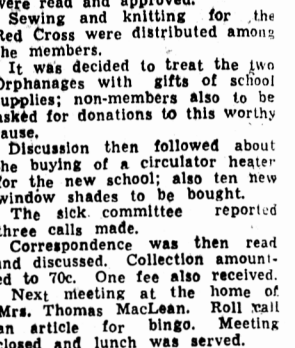
