



**GUN SMUGGLING SUSPECTS**

Suspected gun smugglers Alfredo Gonzalez, 47, (left) a Cuban national, and Gil de Gibaja, 46, a naturalized Cuban-American, are shown after being freed on bond in Miami. The suspects, seized with a huge cache of arms and ammunition which officials believe was intended for the rebel forces in Cuba, were arrested at Gibaja's home. **Divorce Law In England Is 100 Years Old; Many Changes**

LONDON (Reuters) — Divorce is 100 years old in England today, Parliament on Aug. 28, 1857, passed the Matrimonial Causes Act which gave the common man or woman a practical way to achieve divorce. Before that, a special act of Parliament was required, a process so involved and expensive that only 244 divorces were granted in England from 1715 to 1850. Nowadays, twice that many divorces are granted in England each week. But when the Matrimonial Causes Law resulted in the divorce rate pushing up to 140 a year, Queen Victoria wrote an indignant letter to the lord chancellor: "These cases fill almost daily a large portion of the newspapers," she said. "None of the worst French novels can be as bad as what is daily brought and laid upon the breakfast table of every educated family in England. . . ."

It is difficult to imagine what the Queen would have thought in 1947 when the annual divorce rate reached 53,000. The rate subsided to 26,000 divorces granted last year, but even that figure is 4 1/2 times as great as the pre-war average. There were more than 1,000 marriages for every English divorce in 1872 but only 10 marriages for every divorce 80 years later.

One factor involved in the increase was a change in the reasons for divorce provided in the original act. The 1857 law gave adultery as the only grounds, and a woman could get a divorce only if her husband was guilty of "seriously aggravated adultery"—in other words if he also beat her or deserted her in 1837, cruelty, insanity, and desertion were added as grounds. Whatever its causes, the high divorce rate that followed the war caused great consternation in the Church of England. The Archbishop of Canterbury several times has stoutly defended a church conference decision to forbid its bishops to remarry a divorcee while the other party is still living. This was necessary, he said, to preserve church discipline. This ruling, passed in 1930, stiffened the terms of the original act, which allowed a religious remarriage for the "innocent" party in the divorce. The 100-year-old law still is undergoing modifications. Only this year women gained a victory when Parliament passed a law requiring employers to extract alimony from the salaries of delinquent ex-husbands.

**"My Fur Lady" Proves Popular**

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto's Royal Alexandra Theatre, the "Royal Alex" to two generations of Canadian theatre-goers, Monday night celebrated its 50th anniversary with a show written and acted by students—McGill University's annual review My Fur Lady. A capacity audience enthusiastically received the show, a musical satire on the Canadian way of life with the accent on the political scene. Toronto Mayor Nathan Phillips spoke briefly at the opening, congratulating the Alex on its anniversary. He said he was pleased the anniversary was marked with a Canadian show. Among the stars who have appeared behind the Alex's footlights were George Arliss, Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson, Ed Wynn, Marie Dressler, Sir Harry Lauder, Sir Cedric Hardwicke, Sir John Gielgud, Paul Muni, Cornelia Otis Skinner and a galaxy of others. During the Alex's 50 years more than 1,500 musical and dramatic plays have been presented.

**Memorial Plaque Unveiled At St. Paul's Church**

DeBlois, Charlotte-town, in honour of their father, a former active member of the church and for some time a vestryman. Rev. Canon E. Malone officiated at the unveiling.

potato starch and potato flour is not available on the Island. He expressed regret that these products had to be imported into Canada when there is a yearly surplus of potatoes.

**DIFFERENCE OF OPINION**

There was considerable difference of opinion among the growers regarding the quality of the pack put up in Prince Edward Island. Some felt that was very little the matter with it while others agreed that improvement could be made. It was generally conceded that the quantity of poor pack represented a very small percentage of the whole but nevertheless constituted a serious threat to the industry. The practice of using P.E.I. bags to sell inferior quality potatoes was one of the matters discussed at the meeting.
