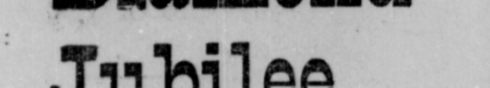

# TELEGRAPHIC.

## JUBILATION IN GREECE.

### War Now Seems to be Inevitable.

Fighting on the Frontier and Troops Hurry-  
ing to the Scene.

LONDON, April 12.—The Times correspond-  
ent at Athens says: News of the  
incursion into Turkish territory on Satur-  
day was received here with jubilation. One  
newspaper says: "The die is now cast;  
it is all over with diplomacy. The eloquent  
voice of the rifle has spoken at last."  
Greek bands are crossing the frontier at  
various points, and war seems to be in-  
evitable.

LONDON, April 9.—The correspondent of  
the Times at Grevena says that at 5 o'clock  
this morning 1500 Greek bandits crossed  
the frontier, where they encountered the  
Turkish troops. The fighting lasted  
throughout the day, with some loss of life  
and a number of minor casualties. It is  
thought probable that fighting will now  
break out along the entire frontier. A  
Turkish council of war was held today.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 9.—The war  
preparations throughout the Turkish em-  
pire continue to be steadily pressed, al-  
though there is not much change in the  
eastern situation. A very pessimistic  
feeling prevails here at the failure of the  
attempts to coerce Greece.

LONDON, April 9.—A despatch to the  
Times from its Crete correspondent says  
the Cretans are now massing around  
Kissam. They have mounted four guns  
and intend to attack the fort, which is  
held by 150 Turks. Yesterday they wrote  
to the captain of the Austrian warship  
anchored in the bay, saying they would  
repel forcibly any attempt of the warships  
to interfere with their designs.

## NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

### Getting Rid of the Tory Officials.

Superannuations Freely Distributed and  
Positions Made for Liberal Friends.

OTTAWA, April 12.—Sir Richard Cart-  
wright stated on Saturday that the time  
had not arrived for an official announce-  
ment regarding the fast line negotiations.  
Four men were retired from the Privy  
Council office on Saturday. Three were  
superannuated and one retired with a  
gratuity. The superannuations in this  
case call for an annual payment of over  
two thousand dollars. One of the retired  
is the chief clerk. He receives a superan-  
nuation of \$1,200 a year, and is under sixty  
years of age.

## SOUTH AFRICA.

### British Government Determined to Maintain Supremacy.

LONDON, April 12.—Speaking at a ban-  
quet on Saturday, Mr. Goschen, First  
Lord of the Admiralty, declared that Eng-  
land is determined to maintain its supre-  
macy in South Africa, and would back its  
High Commissioner with the power of the  
British Empire.

## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, April 9.—In the House of Com-  
mons yesterday Sir Richard Webster, the  
Attorney-General, moved the second read-  
ing of the law of evidence bill enabling  
prisoners in criminal cases to testify in  
their own behalf. The bill passed its  
second reading.

Winnipeg, Man., April 10.—On the C.  
P. R. special settlers' excursions a large  
number of excellent settlers have reached  
Manitoba and the Northwest this season, a  
good proportion being young men who  
intend taking up homesteads. It is esti-  
mated by experts of the grain trade that  
there is of last season's wheat crop still in  
the hands of the Manitoba dealers and  
farmers between seven and eight million  
bushels. It is rather a startling fact that  
on this wheat still held there is a loss of  
perhaps two million of dollars. The dealers  
having paid for it a price  
twenty-five cents a bushel in excess of the  
market value to-day. However, seventy-  
five per cent. of this great loss, as far as  
the dealers' holdings are concerned, has  
been covered by what is known as "hedg-  
ing," that is, selling against the holding.  
Of course, as far as the wheat yet in the  
hands of farmers is concerned, it is dead  
loss. That was the chance a farmer took  
when he decided to hold his wheat on the  
prospect of higher prices.

LONDON, April 10.—In the house of  
common yesterday a secretary of state  
for the colonies, Joseph Chamberlain,  
answering a question on the subject, an-  
nounced that a contract had been signed  
between Canada and the Peterson of New-  
castle for a fast steamship service between  
Canada and Great Britain. But, Mr.  
Chamberlain added, the contract still re-  
quires the sanction of the imperial govern-  
ment, which is considering the matter.

LONDON, April 9.—A crowd of people  
gathered at Charing cross railroad station  
yesterday to witness the departure of Mrs.  
Orniston Chant, the Social reformer, and  
the six nurses who are going with her to  
the island of Crete. All members of the  
party were dressed in a smart, nursing  
uniform of gray and crimson. They wore  
a maltese cross. Lady Henry Somerset,  
who with Mr. B. F. Keith, of Boston, Mass.,  
is financing the mission, presented Mrs.  
Chant with a splendid bouquet of white  
roses.

Bombay, April 10.—There has been a  
marked decrease in plague cases. Last  
week's total was 360 deaths from the  
plague and 323 new cases of that disease,  
against 528 deaths and 591 new cases  
during the previous week.

The grand total of the plague in this  
city is 10,943 deaths, and 9,299 not fatal  
cases, and throughout Bombay presidency  
up to April 2, there has been 22,678  
deaths from the plague, and 18,361 cases  
of that disease which were not fatal.

LONDON, April 10.—A despatch to the  
Times from Capetown says that advices  
received there from Delagoa Bay on Sat-  
urday that the country bordering on and  
across the Limpopo river, forming for many  
miles the northwest and northern limit of  
the Transvaal, is in open revolt. Des-  
patches yesterday announced that the  
whole of Gazaland is in open revolt.  
Twenty-five thousand natives have rebelled  
against the Portuguese government.
