## NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

Preparing for Parliament.

BITTERLY COLD WEATHER.

No Such Ice in Sixty Years.

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—A large deputation, representing the nickel industry of Canada, interviewed the government yesterday to ask for the imposition of an export duty on nickel and copper ores. The speakers of both houses are here; but, owing doubtless to the storm few senators and members have arrived. All the trains are late. Bitterly cold weather is prevalent.

QUEBEC, Feb. 2.—The Montmorency Falls are frozen over in a solid wall of ice. An ice bridge is formed at St. Anne de Beaupre, the first time in sixty years.

## GREAT BRITAIN IN CHINA.

Attorney-General Webster on the Situation.

DOES NOT INTIMATE A BACKDOWN.

Quick and Glorious Death Preferable to Slow Starvation.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Sir Richard Webster, Attorney-General, speaking at Centre Isle of Wight, last night, on the Chinese matter, said that the United States was supporting the stand taken by Great Britain with unanimity. He declared that if Britain were compelled to fight for this cause and should lose, the British people would have a quick and glorious death instead of the slow starvation which the loss of trade would mean to the nation.

## THE BRITISH IN INDIA.

Particulars of Recent Disaster.

Spring Campaign Necessary.

BOMBAY, Feb. 2.—Later despatches give further details of the disaster which took place on Saturday last to the fourth brigade of British troops operating on the frontier near Shikamar. General Westmacott, who is visiting the scene of the fighting, has recovered 22 bodies of the British slain and inflicted heavy loss upon 300 of the enemy who opposed him. The British force lost one man killed and had eight men wounded in a later engagement.

General Sir William Lockhart has expressed the opinion that a spring campaign against the tribesmen will be necessary.
