Tignish Co-Operative Reports Good Surplus

TIGNISH — A surplus of \$32,712.93 was reported at the annual meeting of the Tignish Co-operative Association held in the regional high school auditorium, with the president Wesley Gallant in the chair.

The minutes of the previous annual meeting was read by the secretary Ray Handrahan.

The financial statement, read and explained by the manager Gerald Handrahan, showed total assets at \$223,209.37; operation expenses were \$133,015.98. Surplus at the end of the year was \$32,712.93. A five per cent rebate was voted to the five-year revolving credit plan that was set up in 1962.

Lloyd Horton from Maritime Co-operative Services, Moncton addressed the meeting on the outlook planned for co-operative stores in the future.

Other speakers were Emile J. Gallant, Walter Christopher, Gregory McInnis, Fred Gaudet, Valmore Arsenault, Milton Keough, Rev. Clare MacDonald.

Fred Harper reporting for the board of directors, said nine regular meetings and three special meetings were held during the year. A new feed mill was set up and buildings formerly owned by Myrick and Macintosh Ltd. were purchased for the growth of the organization.

Members of the staff took part in educational courses held at Moncton during the year.

New directors appointed were Leo DesRoches, Lloyd Shea, Bernard Keefe. Other directors are Alfred McInnis, Fred Harper, Fidele J. Perry, John Clark, Gerard Bernard, Uldric Arsenault, Kenneth McRae and Philip Bernard.

Gerald Handrahan, manager of the Tignish Co-operative since it first formed 25 years ago, spoke on the efficient staff of young people who "are a credit to the community and are taking advanced training co-operative short courses at Moncton, N.B."

CONGRESS DELEGATE
A recent delegate to the co-operative Congress of Canada meeting held in Toronto, Mr. Handrahan, spoke on the work carried on by co-operative workers in the northern country with the Indians that has greatly improved living conditions among the people.

Through a co-operative effort, he said, co-operative people are working to better living conditions all across Canada. One Co-operative in Newfoundland, he said, is paying a large amount to help finance "the worthwhile project called Co-operatives Everywhere."

The board of directors was urged by the manager to look further into this matter of giving to this project "that not only pays off in dollars and cents, but in education of the people."

A question dealt with on closing the stores on Saturday afternoons, to keep in line with other businesses on the Island, met with favorable approval, more discussion will be held by the staff on this subject.

Remote-Controlled Girdle Designed For Astronauts

DAYTON, Ohio (AP)—A scientist has come up with an idea that would fulfill every woman's dream—a remote-controlled girdle.

The garment, however, is without foundation. It's for astronauts only.

Peter Van Schaik, a space maintenance project engineer at Wright-Patterson Air Force base near here, proposed the girdle Wednesday as a substitute for

Two devices now being developed for use by spacemen outside their vehicles.

The girdle, he told a space conference here can be operated with or without an astronaut inside. It also carries its own television camera.

"We have one unit that could do both jobs and cost less," Van Schaik told the gathering of engineers and scientists.

The device would replace two other pieces of equipment designed to perform missions the new gadget theoretically can do alone.

It wraps around an astronaut's waist, has two bulky arms and slim backpiece which contains its own propulsion system.

Town Council Wants Authority Over Gov't Liquor Outlet Site

SUMMERSIDE — Town council will ask the provincial government to obtain approval from the council before any site of sites of liquor outlets in the town are proposed.

The decision to contact the provincial secretary regarding a rumored relocation of the liquor store here was made Friday night at the monthly meeting of council.

The government will also be asked to consider locating the store elsewhere than the residential areas of town. Rumors have been circulating recently that the store is to be moved from Water Street to Upper Granville near the Health Centre.

It was noted that residents of the area have strongly opposed the rumored move and that zoning does not provide for such commercial establishments in a residential area.

Coun. George Key said he did not think the government would consider siting the store near the Health Centre, and added that there were many children living in the vicinity.

SAID DETRIMENTAL
Coun. Grant Mollison said a liquor store would be detrimental to the residential area. He said earlier last week a government representative had assured him the intention was to locate the store in a suitable area.

A by-law regulating and controlling traffic in the town was introduced. Under the by-law, fines collected for traffic offences will be the property of the town.

A number of by-laws to curtail littering of streets was introduced, and another by-law was passed prohibiting dumping of garbage in the town or along the shores of Bedeque Bay between the east and west boundaries of the town.

A recreation by-law was introduced establishing a recreation commission to be known as the Summerside Community Recreation Commission to implement and pursue a recreation program for the town.

COMMISSION NAMED
In conformity with the by-law a resolution was passed naming Councillor J. Ernest Morrison to the commission along with the following members: Charles Ballem, James Hogan, representing the Summerside School

Board — Chester S. MacDonald; the Canadian Legion — Dr. H.E. Clark; the Y's Mens Club — Robert Schurman; Kinsmen Club, Ronald McArthur; Lions Club, Layton Schurman.

A resolution concerning an agreement between the Town Fire Department and the RCAF Station Fire Department was read and approved.

The new resolution was brought forward as a result of a change in Department of National Defence regulations which necessitated negotiation of a new agreement between the town and the RCAF Fire Department.

In this new agreement, should the need arise, the RCAF Fire Department will provide the services of a fully manned fire fighting vehicle to the town at a cost of \$50 per hour. A vehicle with a driver only will come at a rate of \$25 per hour.

Councillor Schurman felt this was a good agreement and assured the town of adequate fire protection without the purchase of a new pumper.

Two other resolutions appointed Police Chief S.D.A. Wannamaker as traffic authority for the year and J.C. McKenna as town engineer.
