Steel Worker Kills Wife And Six Children

INDIANA HARBOR, Ind., July 10—(A.P.)—Celestino Gonzalez, 36, apparently maddened by jealousy and ill health, police said, hacked his wife and six children to death with an axe yesterday, then shot and killed Jose Aro, a roomer in their home, and himself. Gonzalez killed Aro in the locker room of the Inland Steel Company, where both were employed, as work shifts were changing and in the presence of several other employees. No words were exchanged as Gonzalez walked up to Aro, fired four shots in his body and then turned the gun on himself. Both died instantly. Police had some trouble identifying the two men and then learning their address. Finally they went to the Gonzales home but found the doors locked and left. Late this afternoon they returned to the home, found it still locked and battered in a door. On the floor and in the beds of the small house were the body of Mrs. Gonzalez and their six children, all dead, all hacked and mutilated with a bloody axe which lay nearby. The children, which lay ages from two to 17 years, were four boys and two girls. There was no particular evidence of struggle and police surmised that Mrs. Gonzalez and the older children had been hacked to death as they slept.

U.S. President's Mother Visits Summer Home

LUBEC, Me., July 8.—Bearing a huge Chinese lily, Mrs. Sarah Delano Roosevelt, mother of the President, arrived here late today by motor from Rockland. The lily, gift of a Boston friend will be planted in her summer garden at Campobello Island, N. B. she said. Accompanied by her chauffeur and Mrs. Bradford G. Weeks, of Oyster Bay, L.I., Mrs. Roosevelt left immediately aboard the Campobello-Lubec ferry for her summer home on the Canadian Island. The President's mother talked informally of her son before leaving Rockland. She described him "utterly satisfactory" to her. "I feel no differently than when he was a little boy," she said, "only I do not see so much of him." She said she hoped he would stay at the Roosevelt home at Hyde Park if he failed to be re-elected, because she could "see more of him than I
