U.K. Election Landslide 'Buries' Labor Party

LONDON (CP) - Britain's Conservatives buried the Labor party Friday in a massive election landslide that gave Prime Minister Macmillan an unqualified mandate for his projected programs at home and in the international sphere. The prime minister himself, who led his party into an almost unprecedented third term in power only 15 months after its popularity had reached a low ebb, told the British people in a television broadcast Friday night that he will use the authority of his re-elected government to promote world peace. In the domestic field, the results of Thursday's election had shown that "the class war is obsolete" in Britain today, and "this seems to me a great gain for the future."

Japanese Nation Is Winning Battle With Overpopulation

TOKYO (AP) - Cramped for living space, the Japanese are winning a struggle to control their explosively growing population. Birth control and legalized abortions are turning the tide. Abortions cost only 80 cents to \$3, or sometimes \$5. More than 1,000,000 are performed each year. Last year, for every three infants born, two wives had abortions. Many Japanese are not happy about the high abortion rate, says Minoru Tachi, director of the institute of population problems in the welfare ministry. It's hoped many abortions can be avoided through greater spread of birth control information. Today Japan is the only country in Asia - and one of the few anywhere - which has checked its fast-rising birth rate. Worldwide, population still is increasing by about 100,000 daily by the most conservative estimates. This has created particularly serious problems for Japan, a nation of already crowded islands hard hit by war devastation and unemployment. In 1945, Japan had 72,000,000 people. Today it has an estimated 92,000,000 - a 30-per-cent increase. RATE DECREASING Now Japan's population is growing at the rate of only one per cent a year, and Tachi thinks it soon will go even lower. Japan had a baby boom right after the war, as did other countries. Today it's 18 births per 1,000 population, compared with 25 in the United States. "With population rising so fast living standards were going down," Tachi says. "Now, many midwives are unemployed." In 1952, the Diet approved a eugenic protection law permitting abortions to safeguard a woman's life, to prevent transmission of serious hereditary diseases, but also for "health and economic reasons." "The interpretation of this is very elastic," Tachi remarks. Legal abortions are performed by gynecologists named by local medical societies.
