The steamer "M. A. Starr" arrived from Halifax to-day, with a cargo of merchandise and four passengers.

There was no business at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. A drunk was admitted on bail to stand trial to-morrow morning.

The schooner "Ameha," of Arichat, while on her passage from Boston to Halifax, went ashore on Cape Sable on the 3rd inst., and is now a total wreck.

Four young ladies were drowned while bathing at Pembroke on Monday. Pembroke is one hundred miles from Ottawa, on the river of that name.

A large picnicking party left for West River in the steam tug "Henry Aitken" this forenoon. As the day is fine, they will, no doubt, spend a pleasant time.

The bell buoy for St. Peter's bar was, yesterday, removed from its hitherto improper position, and properly situated at the bar, by the steam tug "Henry Aitken."

The *Former* says: The tide was level with the top of the sunken part of the Summerside Railway Wharf, on Monday last. The worms appear to be settling it as fast as the Railway men build it up.

The *Alberton Pioneer* reports that the fishing last week has been a complete failure; a few mackerel were taken on Friday last, but nothing to speak of. The fishermen are about giving up all hope and talking of abandoning the sealy pursuit for this season.

MR. MATTHEW DUNN, of this town, feeling that his boat his capable of beating any second-class boats that took part in the Charlottetown Regatta, issues a challenge to them, to sail him in Summerside Harbor on the day of the Provincial Exhibition.—*S. side Former.*

WILLIAM PALMER and Chas. Eagar sailed from Wolfville on Friday last in a small boat. A squall struck the boat, overturned it, and both the young men were drowned. Their bodies were found the next day caught in the weeds near Cornwallis.—*Hc. Chronicle.*

The steamer "Worcester" sailed for Boston this evening, with a cargo consisting of 1,142 barrels of mackerel, 419 cases of eggs and 42 empty oil casks. She has on board the following passengers:—Mary Ann Stewart, Mr. McDonald, Mary McCormack, Christy Gillis, Mrs. G. S. Davison, Mrs. M. F. Garra and Miss Margaret Mellish.

The *Alberton Pioneer* has quit the political field. It does not even look over the fence. In the last issue we find the following:—"We will likely have lively times among our local politicians for the next two weeks. For our part we may use the words of a great and good man,—'But none of these things move us.' Let those who subsist by Government crumbs and bone-picking hoe right in and sling dirt and garbage at each other."

The meeting called by Messrs. Pope and Brecken at Rustico, yesterday evening, was attended by over four hundred electors. The Opposition and Government candidates spoke at some length. At the close a resolution favoring the "National Policy" and supporting the Opposition candidates was passed all but unanimously. Messrs. Pope and Brecken will address the electors of New Glasgow this evening.

In discussing the Chinese question, on the 13th, the *Toronto Globe* says:—"If every one who is comparatively ignorant, with rather demoralized religious ideas, and a spirit that is content with little, is to be excluded from Canada for instance, where shall we begin and where shall we end? Levy a prohibitory tax upon the Chinese, is the same thing to be done with the Negro or the East Indian, with the Italian or the Irishman?" Upon which the *Toronto Mail* remarks:—"Poor Irishman, there is always a hot corner for you in the *Globe* office."

In its account of Dr. Tupper's reception in Summerside, the *Patriot* says:—"But after all Mr. McDonald didn't come. He ran away, as he found that the speech he made in the Rink was very ill-received by the leaders of the canvass of deception." "Ran away" is a good one, and "ill-received" is better. Our readers are well acquainted with the facts, and considering the source from whence the above statement emanates, a contradiction would be idle. A "canvass of deception" comes with good grace from the person who penned the above lines for a Grit organ. "Wonderful is the depravity of human nature." We may state that Mr. McDonald was—owing to previous engagements—compelled to return to Pictou on Wednesday morning. He never intended to speak in Summerside at all; and the welcome prepared for him by the Liberal-Conservatives of Summerside, was prepared under a misapprehension. This the *Patriot* well knows.

**Patullo's Forecast.**

Mr. Patullo, the political agent of the Grit Party, possesses a wonderful imagination, when he tells people that Prince Edward Island is going "solid for the Government." The Government won't get one supporter from the Island. That is generally admitted, though some more sanguine Grits think possibly one may be returned. Judging Mr. Patullo's prophecy from what he says about the Maritime Provinces he will be included among the false prophets after the 17th, for the Government cannot possibly secure a majority in the Maritime Provinces. The majority will be greatly against them.

The game of "big" will not save the Government this time.

In Ontario the Government claim even a larger majority than they got last general election. The absurdity of their claim is seen in the fact that a very large and influential body—the Baldwin Reformers—have split off from the Grits, and have openly cast in their lot with Sir John, as more truly Reform than George Brown. Why, at one meeting in the Amphitheatre in Toronto, where some five thousand people attended, four out of the six speakers had always been Reformers till this election. The Chairman was a Reformer. So was the Secretary and another officer. This we have upon the authority of a citizen of Halifax who recently visited Toronto, and when asked where he had been during the evening, wittily replied, "At a meeting of Reformers, viz., at the Amphitheatre." With the Conservative party of 1874 compact, strong and lively; with the great addition to their numbers caused by the defection of the Baldwin Reformers; with the serious defection from the Grit ranks of the Catholic Association, it is simply playing the clown with bell and cap for Mr. Patullo to tell the people that the Grit Party will do better in Ontario than last time. Take the known facts in Ontario and in P. E. Island, and judge Mr. P's forecast by them, and you will see he is simply fooling his party.—*Hc. Reporter.*

**The Great Grit Boor.**

The people of British Columbia are also dissatisfied with Mr. McKenzie's rule. They don't want him any more. He has not done right by that Province, as the Assembly, by a vote of 14 to 9, have affirmed. The man seems to have one talent wonderfully developed. He has managed to disgust more people, more great bodies of men, in all the Provinces, than any other Premier that ever existed. He disgusted Mr. O'Brien by his boorishness. He disgusted the railway contractors. He disgusted the members of the Catholic Association of Ontario. He disgusted the manufacturers of the Dominion by his unmannerly action towards them when the Depression Committee was sitting. He offended the Irishmen of Halifax by his sneers at them as "shillalah" men. He has alienated the people of British Columbia. Is there anybody supporting him from belief in him—from love of him? We think not. Certainly, if you find an active partizan of Mr. McKenzie down here you will, on enquiry, find out that he has some axe to grind—either he has some claim against the Government he wants to get settled up, or he is looking for some billet, or he has a road commission from the Local Government in his pocket, or something of that sort. Take out the grabbers and seekers and you will find a very small knot of men who support Mr. McKenzie because they believe him honest and capable, and a statesman. All that kind of faith has gone clear out of the people. They know now that Mr. McKenzie is prodigal of truth, is grasping for money, is greedy of gain for his relatives, and cares nothing whatever as to whom he offends, providing he can carry out his chief object—secure a good salary for himself at the rate of \$25 a day, while he reduces the Labor of the country, 75 cents a day.—*Hc. Reporter.*
