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Joey To Buy Iron Mine

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The Bell Island iron operation being vacated by Dosco Industries Ltd. at the end of June will be bought from the company by provincial government, Premier Smallwood has announced.

However, he told a press conference, the government "is not going into the mining business." It would seek a concern interested in operating the mine.

Mr. Smallwood said the province will get "the entire mine" for one dollar and all the buildings, property and equipment connected with it for another \$100,000 under a "generous settlement" made with province by the company.

"We will try, very hard indeed, to find someone who will come in and operate that mine," the premier said.

Dosco announced last month it would close its Wabana operations in June. Spokesman said the Wabana ore was too poor to sell or upgrade for competitive markets.

WON'T TAKE POWER

The company will be relieved of its commitment to take electric power from the Newfoundland Light and Power Company to the middle of 1970.

"The property we are acquiring for this nominal sum would take a great many millions of dollars to replace, perhaps as much as \$30,000,000," Mr. Smallwood said.

"If our efforts to get new operators come to nothing we will carry on a salvage operation and this operation should bring in a very substantial sum that we will be able to devote to the welfare of the people of Bell Island," he said.

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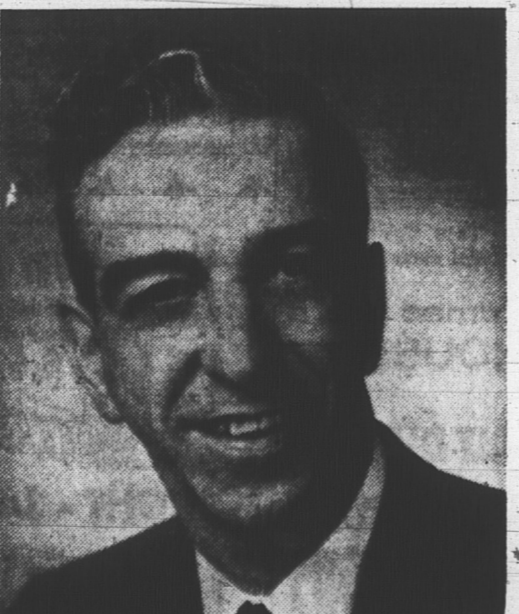
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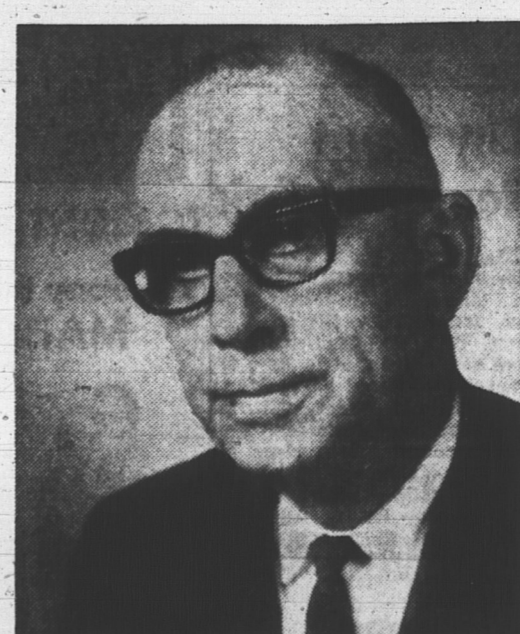
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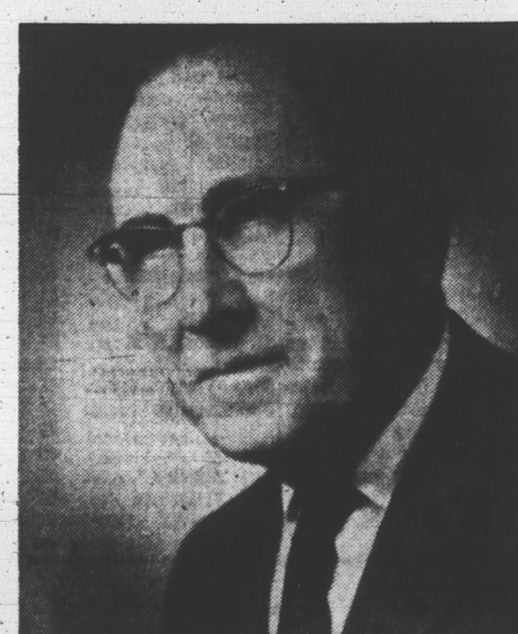
