

Richard Sparks Habs To 3-1 Win In Deciding Game Of Semi-finals

MONTREAL, April 8 (CP)—Maurice (The Rocket) Richard scored on a sensational length-of-the-dash tonight to spark Montreal Canadiens to a 3-1 victory over Boston Bruins in the seventh and deciding game of their semi-final round Stanley Cup playoff.

The teams were tied at 1-1, a deadlock that had lasted from little past the half-way mark of the first period, when Richard ended his dash with a flourish, his shot catching the low corner of the Boston net.

Canadiens' third goal was an anti-climax, coming after goalie Suzzar Jim Henry of Boston had been pulled from the nets while the Bruins sent six players storming into the Montreal arena.

Delirious Fans

A crowd of 14,598 broke into a delirious bedlam when the Montreal ace sniper practically alone wrote a dramatic finish to the game and series. Canadiens now met Detroit Red Wings in the best-of-seven cup final. The first two games will be played in Montreal Thursday and Saturday.

It was a bitterly fought game by the teams that had already battled to three victories apiece, and solid, thumping body-checks were the order of the night.

Eddie (Spider) Mazur, Canadiens' farmhand from Buffalo of the American Hockey League, scored Montreal's first goal at 4:25 of the opening period. The goal came from a wild scramble in which several cracks were taken at the puck. Henry saving on all until Mazur shot and the puck was deflected into the net off the glove of defenceman Bob Armstrong of the Bruins.

Ed Sanford, a tower of strength on left wing for the Bruins, evened the score eight minutes later. The play started inside the Boston zone. Bill Quackenbush sending a pass to Fleming Mackell who was chased to the right corner from where he passed out a goal-mouth pass to Sanford, and Big Ed hopped on the puck. Goalie Gerry McNeil of Canadiens had no chance on the blast, from just outside the goal crease.

Only Six Penalties

The slam-bang, all-out hockey brought only six penalties—three to each team—but two of them were majors. Billy Reay of Canadiens and Hal Laycoe of Bruins got into a high-sticking argument in the third period and each came out of it with blood running from head cuts. It was while they were off that Richard scored.

Richard himself was severely cut over the left eye in the second period and the cash required six stitches. The injury came when he went tumbling over Leo Labine

In the Boston zone, and it appeared as if Labine's stick caught Richard across the forehead.

Richard's amazing play caught both the crowd and the Bruins by surprise. Defenceman Butch Bouchard broke up a Boston attack, led by Porky Dumart, and shot up a short pass to Richard inside his own blue line.

The Rocket, blood seeping from the patch over his eye, came straight in toward the defence of Bill Quackenbush and Bob Armstrong. He swung outside Quackenbush as he reached the defence, and Quackenbush was pulled out of position as Richard swerved sharply the other way and let drive his low shot. The puck barely tipped the lower part of Henry's leg pad as he kicked desperately for it.

Del Ennis Quits Trying To Hit For Distance

WINSTON SALEM, N.C., April 8 (AP)—Del Ennis of Philadelphia Phillies remembered something Stan Musial told him a few years ago and as a result the Ennis bat is booming as of old.

"A couple of years ago," said Ennis, "when they said Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals was having a bad year because he was hitting only around .320, he said his average suffered because he was trying to hit home runs."

"In 1930, when I had a good year, it seemed easy to hit home runs. So I thought I'd have the same kind of season in 1951. But I didn't. This spring I remembered what Musial had said and decided I was suffering from the same ailment."

"So, instead of trying to hit for distance this year, I decided to just try meeting the ball."

So far this spring Ennis has hit safely 32 times for .95 times at bat, an average of .337. He has made five doubles, four homers and driven home 23 runs. Manager Eddie Egan is ready for a banner year.

Last season, troubled by a bad back and apparently affected by the team's general slump, the Phillies outfielder hit only .267. He had 15 homers and knocked home 73 runs, a poor year for him.

"We've seen a lot of good pitchers this spring and I've been pretty well satisfied the way my new system has been working out," Ennis said. "I think I've hit the good pitchers better than I have the rookies and the wild men."

With Ennis again smashing the ball to all fields, the Phillies' pennant stock is booming.

LaMotta Predicts Victory Tonight

DETROIT, April 8 (AP)—Jake LaMotta, back in his "lucky city," says he'll stop Norman Hayes tomorrow night in their 10-round battle at Olympia Stadium.

"And I'll get good and even with him," said Jake, the Bronx Bull who has lost only one fight in his 20 Detroit appearances.

Jake will weigh about 165. Hayes about 161.

Hayes decided LaMotta in January in Hayes' hometown of Boston. Despite that, the 21-year-old Negro is 7 to 5 underdog here.

Jake explains it: "This time we're boxing in Detroit, not Boston, and that means a great deal to me." His only Detroit conquerer was Sugar Ray Robinson.

McMaster To Enter Football League

TORONTO, April 8 (CP)—McMaster University will be allowed to enter the Intercollegiate Football Union next fall, the Telegram says today in a newspaper story.

The paper quotes an official of one of the senior colleges as saying:

"Three of the four schools in the league have already indicated (though not officially) that they're willing to go along with McMaster, and the fourth 'will come around when it sees the other have switched.'"

McMaster's application for admittance was referred at a meeting in Montreal last month to a special committee of the four universities—University of Toronto, Western, McGill and Queens.

Giants, Braves In Player Trade

NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—New York Giants announced today that they had acquired veteran third baseman Bob Elliott from Boston Braves in exchange for pitcher Sheldon Jones and cash.

Elliott, a holdout, has been working out with the San Diego team of the Pacific Coast League. The cash surrendered was estimated at \$50,000.

Elliott probably will play left field, a spot left vacant when Monte Irvin suffered a broken ankle in an exhibition game against Cleveland recently.
