Top CNR Suggestion

Never Won, Officials Say

Montreal (CP) - The \$100,000 award offered by the CNR as the top prize for suggestions to improve the Crown-owned company's operations has never been won by an employee, but 330 employee suggestions were accepted last Friday, Nov. 6.

Meanwhile, at the CNR, 660 suggestions came in, the best being rewarded with sums sometimes reaching \$50,000 in equipment.

Ronald Atkins, superintendent of the CNR's suggestions bureau, said a report of maximum return to the employee with the brainwave. At CNR the intangible value returns of \$1 to \$50.

The intangibles involve savings impossible to calculate in dollars. A similar maximum winning employee might have suggested that an excellent idea would go well over a particular station-der.

Atkins said CNR makes between six and 12 awards a month. The prize-winners in the intangible category are selected on the basis of the originality of the idea, the effort that went into it and similar factors.

Teen-Age Smoking Reviewed

OTTAWA (CP) - More than 27 in every 100 Canadian teenagers from 15 to 19 years old are regular cigarette smokers, health Minister Judy LaMarsh said.

This was one of the basic findings of the health department's survey of the habit of cigarette smoking, carried out by the bureau of Statistics Canada in August survey is under preparation.

Forty-four per cent of all Canadians 20 years and older - or 56 per cent of the men and 52 per cent of the women - have smoked the cigarette smoking habit, defined as "usually smoking cigarettes."

Cigarette smoking was found to be most common between the ages of 20 and 44, where approximately one in every two Canadians use every day.

Cigarette smoking decreased to 43 per cent for Canadians between 45 and 64 years, while it increased to 48 per cent for those in the teen-ager group - for Canadians 15 and over.

Releasing the basic findings of the survey, now before parliament, Mr. LaMarsh said she felt they would be immediately useful in the design of health programs. Canadians are receiving an impression the habit is more prevalent than it is.

She also said the 27 per cent figure for smoking teen-agers is a concern because the survey also shows that 27 per cent of parents questioned for survey are "not always aware of their children's smoking habits."

The survey is part of a \$600,000 national study on health and disease, which combines both health education and the promotion of research. The extent and nature of the smoking habit in Canada.

SAIGON (AP) - A military draft scandal has showed up on flood relief political and economic news.
