Jury Is Nailed In \$175,000 Death

NEW YORK (AP) - Studobaker Corp. reported Monday earnings of \$3,455,611, or 24 cents a share, in the first six months of this year compared with a loss of \$8,549,119 in the 1963 first half.

Sales fell to \$139,518,083 from \$205,342,065.

Earnings for the second quarter totalled \$2,299,431, or 16 cents a share, against a loss of \$1,554,078 a year earlier. Sales declined to \$72,195,318 from \$105,407,663.

OTTAWA (CP) - Canada's farm price index of agricultural products rose in June to 253.6 from 247.5 in May, the bureau of statistics reported Monday. The index, based on 1953-39 figures equalling 100, continued its upward trend since January of this year, due almost entirely to higher prices for potatoes and livestock.

OTTAWA (CP) - Department store sales in the week ended July 28 were valued 11.9 per cent above those in the corresponding period last year.

Exploration May Follow Moon Landing

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) - What comes after the first trip to the moon?

Officially nothing, but United States space officials are continually looking for ways to make the most of the manned spacecraft center here believe this is the next logical step into space.

Search For Fisherman Continues

No trace has been found of the body of 66-year-old Thomas Gilbert of Souris who disappeared when his fishing boat was swamped Saturday evening in high seas off Souris.

It was announced last night that the search will continue today.

William Carter of Souris who had been seen fishing in the boat most of the day reported that Gilbert and his boat had disappeared at about 6:30 p.m. Carter's last sighting was when he became tangled in the nets and when he looked up next, Gilbert was gone.

The search for Gilbert's body began Sunday with the RCMP patrol boat Blue Heron, the Coast Guard cutter "Rapid", three Souris dories, and several small boats participating.

Gilbert's swamped 35-foot boat was last seen at about 3:30 Sunday by Francis MacIntyre's dragger, North Bay.

U.K. Immigrant Dies At 70 Years

POLITICS IN ALBERTA PUZZLE ICELAND'S PM

BANFF, Alta. (CP) - Prime Minister Brian Beneditkisson of Iceland, holidaying here during the cross-Canada journey, says he is puzzled by the Alberta political situation.

"There's nobody against the government," he said. "It's rather an odd situation when you have a leftist government against only three opposition members - and so far I have discovered only one person who openly supports the Social Credit party."

Mr. Beneditkisson said there is little possibility Iceland will ever build strong trade agreements with Canada. His country of 190,000 trades largely with Russia to the west.

He described Iceland, treeless and mostly uninhabitable over its 62,500 miles, as almost self-sufficient in terms of foodstuffs.

Icelanders will eat fish five times a week for their main meal and mutton about twice weekly, he said.

Mr. Beneditkisson has been visiting Icelandic - Canadian communities during his tour.

Missionaries Held In Congo

NEW YORK (CP) - Four Methodist missionaries and their families are reported under house arrest in the Congo and a fifth missionary has been killed there by the Methodist board of missions announced.

A Canadian missionary, Dr. Nicholas Siksky and his wife and child, were reported among the others who are American, including the dead missionary.

The board identified the dead missionary as Rev. Burleigh A. Law Jr., 45, of Tallahassee, Fla. He was reported killed Tuesday at Wembo Nyama.

The board said the mission station at Wembo, Nyama is under control of rebel troops and the four missionary couples are under house arrest.

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
