SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
A board of trade committee to co-ordinate Summerside cargo assembly for shipment to Northern markets on the ship service promoted by APEC which will commence in June, was appointed last night at the regular meeting of the Summerside board held in Jenkins Bros. Ltd. Canning plant where some thirty members were present at a luncheon featuring Jenkins canned products, and other Island manufactured food items.

An active tourist promotion, the most extensive ever conducted by the board, was also approved at the meeting.

The committee which will direct the local interests in the Northern markets will be under the chairmanship of Lester Jenkins, assisted by F. L. Bingham, Elmer Waugh, Fred Davison, Francis MacQuarrie, and Harold Campbell.

In John Wright, Island vice-president of APEC, pointed out the importance of getting sufficient quantities of products from the Island to insure continuance of the shipping service to this area, and suggested that Island boards of trade support the project.

City, S'ide Students Are Invited To Ottawa

OTTAWA — (Special) — Colin MacMillan of Charlottetown has been invited by the Rotary Club of Ottawa to make a five-day trip here next week as part of the ninth annual adventure in citizenship. Also invited is Armand DesRoches of Misouche.

MacMillan and DesRoches, along with some 130 other senior high school students, will gather here May 10 and spend until May 14 visiting places of interest from the home of the Governor-General to the Supreme Court; attend group discussions and hear prominent Canadians speak at luncheons, dinner and banquets.

Colin is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Joseph MacMillan and Armand is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tilman S. DesRoches of Misouche.

The program to be followed: Visit the House of Commons while in session, also Government House, the Supreme Court, National Research Council, Royal Mint and the RCMP training centre.

Formal presentation of a certificate of Canadian citizenship to eligible students.

Addresses by prominent Canadian speakers, including Finance Minister Donald Fleming and Liberal Leader Lester B. Pearson.

Daily discussions in groups of 20 students led by university professors on subjects such as citizenship, parliamentary procedure, democratic government etc.

Study of the national capital plan which will reorganize and beautify Ottawa.

Motor trips to plants of historic interest in and around Ottawa.

Social programs under Rotary supervision, including a formal dance.

Students will stay wherever possible at the homes of Ottawa Rotarians.

The scheme was launched in 1951 with the approval of the board of directors of Rotary International and has expanded each year.

Students are selected by the Rotary clubs of each community which pay a percentage of the overall costs of the scheme.

Only obligation on the students is that when they return they must accept invitations to address groups on their visit to Ottawa.

P.E.I. Holstein Top Producer

"Crestline Blackford Hilda" a mature cow owned by R. A. Profit, Freetown was among the top Holstein producers for the month of April. In 305 days on 2X milk she produced 14,243 lbs. of milk 554 lbs. of butter with a test of 3.89. She has a BCA of 123 for milk and 131 for fat.

W. Buntain and Son, Rustico had two top ranking producers. They were "Seaside Vernon May" a two-year-old with 12,066 lbs. milk, 487 lbs. fat testing 4.03. Her BCA average for milk is 133 and for fat 146.

"Seaside Helen Centurion", another two year old owned by the Buntain family produced 11,963 lbs. milk, 471 lbs. fat testing 3.94. Her BCA for milk is 125 and for fat 134. Both cows were on the 305 day 2X test.

Listed among the certificate winners for six brood cows is "Hicome Pluto Byng" owned by George Lily, Marshfield. A star breed cow must be the dam of three or more progeny classified good plus or better and three or more with BCA indexes at least 100-100.

Defence Calls Six Witnesses As Possession Trial Continues

The defence called six witnesses as the trial of John Henry Reid, charged with possession of stolen goods, knowing them to be stolen, moved into its third day yesterday.

In the morning session the Crown withdrew an application for the appointment of a commissioner. The affidavit was submitted at Wednesday's session. Crown prosecutor J.P. Nicholson said the decision was made after consultation with the Attorney General and the withdrawal was made in view of the objections of defence counsel Allison Gillis and because of other technical difficulties involved.

The final Crown witnesses and the first of the defence witnesses were heard in the morning.

Joseph McNally of Charlottetown, a Gulf Potato Company truck driver, testified, he had left the truck loaded with potatoes at a Grafton Street service station overnight on the night of Dec. 3, 1958, and at 8 a.m. the next morning had the truck weighed - with and without the load of potatoes - at the city scale.

The witness said he obtained the weighing slip from the operator at the time.

WORKED FOR FIRM
John Francis MacDonald testified he had worked for the potato company in the fall but was not employed by them Dec. 3.

He said he met Donald C. MacDonald, who had a truck in a Queen Street restaurant. They proceeded to the company warehouse from Johnnie's restaurant. There, the witness said, they put on a load of potatoes and returning to the city they stopped in the vicinity of Reid's restaurant. The potatoes were unloaded into the basement of a building but the witness said he didn't know what building it was.

He said he and his partner returned to the warehouse for another load. On this trip they were accompanied by a third man whose name he later learned was Shepherd.

On return to the city the trucks

was again parked close to Reid's restaurant which was closed. After awhile they drove to a house where each had a bottle of beer and then had driven to a building which he didn't identify.

The witness said that he had done considerable drinking during the day and could not remember many of the details of the second trip.

Under cross examination he admitted he and Donald C. MacDonald had tried to get potatoes at the Railway Wharf at about 5:30 that afternoon.

WENT HOME
Still under cross examination he said the area where the potatoes were unloaded was very dark and he couldn't say what building it was. He said he hadn't seen the second cargo of potatoes unloaded but had gone directly home after trying to get into the restaurant to get something to eat.

The witness said he had not counted the number of bags taken nor had he received any money from the accused. The only cash he got, he said, was \$2 he had received from Donald MacDonald after the first trip.

John Darrach of Clyde River, the first defence witness, said he had done business with Reid and sold him potatoes a number of times.

He testified that on Oct. 15, 1958, he had delivered 196 75-pound bags of Sebago potatoes to Reid for \$1 per bag.

POTATOES WEIGHED
He said the potatoes had been weighed at the city scale and unloaded into Reid's basement through a hatch located on the north side of the building. He said the potatoes were dumped in a pile in the end of the cellar nearest Weymouth Street.

Under cross examination he said he had been doing business with (Continued on page 3)
