1,000 Attend S'ide RCMP Band Concert Last Night

About 1,000 persons attended a concert by the (Ottawa) R.C.M.P. Band in Summerside Civic Stadium last evening. Filling some 700 seats on the main floor of the stadium, the crowd overflowed into the spectator seats on either side of the rink. The R.C.M.P. Band members and local R.C.M.P. officers were dressed in their colorful scarlet tunics which, along with the renowned police fame of the R.C.M.P., have won world wide recognition.

The Hereford and Angus cattle were shown and judged together. In the male sections H. Parker Jewell of York had the junior and the grand champion male with his Angus bull, Boyd Dixon, Clyde River, had the reserve junior male champion. Robert McLaurin and Son had the senior male champion and the reserve grand champion William Inman and Son had the reserve senior champion.

In the female classes Fulton Sanderson and Son of North River dominated the show with their Herefords. They won every section in which they showed. They had the junior champion female and reserve and the senior and grand champion females. H. Parker Jewell had the reserve senior and reserve grand females. Sterling Wood of Mt. Herbert topped the championship winners in Dual Purpose Shorthorns. His Watermead Air Pilot was junior and grand champion male. He also had the reserve junior male champion. His Molly K Wave was the junior female champion.

The North River Institute had the senior male champion and the reserve grand. Keith Dixon, Clyde River had the reserve senior male champion. Fred Hughes of Brockley had the reserve junior female champion. Arnold Barrett had the senior and grand female champions and Dan Jewell had the reserve senior and reserve grand.

A KEEN BATTLE There was a keen and interesting battle for supremacy in the Jersey sections. J.S. Vickerson and Sons, Warren Grove and Clark Brothers of North Wiltshire waged a stiff battle for supremacy in the female sections. Vickerson had the junior champion female and the reserve champion but the Clarks beat him out for the senior and grand female championships when their Keppoch Royal Ivy went to the top for both ribbons. She was reserve grand at Charlottetown. Vickerson had the reserve ribbons on both cases. They also had the reserve junior male champion. Vickerson had the most red ribbons, however. In the male sections Bruce MacDonald of North Wiltshire had the senior and grand champion. He had a really good day at the show and had three red ribbons among very strong competitors against experienced showmen. The reserve senior and reserve grand male ribbons went to Fred Coles of Milton. Albert Boswell of Marshfield had the junior male champion.

There were very large classes in many of the sections. There was a large showing of Guernseys and the honors were pretty well divided when Judge J. Eric Hurry of Winsloe finished placing the cattle. Owen Younker and Son, Kingston had the junior and grand champion male. They had the reserve senior male champion. They also took the reserve senior and reserve senior female champion. Harold Palmer and Sons, Kensington R.R. had the reserve junior male and the reserve grand male ribbons. They had the senior and grand champion cow with Brookline Patricia's Nancy. Owen Younker and Son had the reserve senior and reserve grand female champion. Tyrus Holmes of Kensington had the reserve junior female champion, the junior calf that won the same honor for him at Charlottetown two weeks ago. Alton Bell of Kensington had the reserve junior female champion. Mr. Bell also had the senior male champion. In the Ayrshires there was keen competition among Keith Boswell and Son, Victoria, Fred MacRae and Earle MacRae and Allan MacLeod and Son of Hartsville. CALF IS CHAMP The Boswells won the most of the championship ribbons although the competition was keen throughout. The Boswells were particularly proud of their win with Cherry Bank Royal Anchor, a young calf that Edward Boswell selected last in the herd of Allister MacArthur, Howick, Quebec. The youngster was junior champion and went on to take the grand male championship. They had the reserve junior with Leland's Treasurer's Prince, a son of Pineview Treasurer who was a son of Auchencrain Battleflame, a former grand champion at the Royal.

The Boswell's senior and grand female champion was Lealand's Dolly's Ida, a cow that has never been beaten in her class in the Maritimes and stood 3rd in a class of 35 at the Royal last year. They also had the junior female champion in Lealand's Treasurer's Flashy, and reserve junior champion in Lealand's Treasurer's Dream, two daughters of the son of the Royal Grand champion.

Earle MacRae of Brookfield whose Raeburn Trinket won several national awards last winter, had the reserve senior and reserve grand female champion in Raeburn Eunice, the first prize mature cow in milk. TOPS IN HOLSTEINS Oswald J. Newson and Son of Kingston emerged as the major winners in the Holstein ring. They had the reserve junior champion male and the reserve grand and the senior female champion and reserve and the grand female champion and reserve. They had the junior female champion and by far the greatest number of first place ribbons.

Max Thompson, president of the Exhibition association, had the junior and grand male champion. He is a joint owner, with A.W. Lea, of the senior champion male. The reserve champion junior female was shown by Eric Dixon. Some of the section winners—some of them winning more than one— included Hector MacNevin and Son, A.W. Jim Mundy judged the Hereford and Angus cattle, Dave Peacock placed the Dual Purpose Shorthorns, Athol Roberts placed the Scotch Shorthorns, Claude Lewis was Holstein Judge, Wallie Wood placed the Ayrshires, J. Eric Hurry was the Guernsey Judge and George MacMillan placed the Jerseys.

WINNERS IN SWINE Almon Boswell of Dunstaffnage emerged as the top winner in the Swine class. He had three place winners and had the grand champion female of the show. Other red ribbon winners were Earl Masey, S.C. Stewart and Son and Hudson Lowther. Fair visitors also saw a tractor-pull, with the strength of the pull measured by a mechanical device rather than against another tractor or a specific load. Ronnie Dawson won section one. George Nicholson was tops in section 2 and 3. Hudson Lowther took section four and Ray Wood won the section for diesel-powered machines. The top pull measured was 8,000 pounds.
