

BYC Stops Parkdale Streak At 7 With 5-1 Win

Penalties Prove Costly To Flyers

The Basella Youth Club pulled within 2 points of first place and stopped the Parkdale Flyers winning streak of 7 games when they handed the Flyers a 5-1 licking in an Island Senior League clash last night at the Sports Arena.

Nearly 300 hardy souls braved a raging snowstorm to sit in on the club throw in 3 goals while Parkdale defenseman Paul Josey was sitting out two penalties in the first period.

The Flyers made it 3-1 at the end of the period but after playing through a scoreless second the B.Y.C. pumped in 2 more in the last ten minutes of the third to rack up the win.

Brian Lewis shot two goals within the space of 20 seconds in the first period to lead the youth club scores. Stu MacLure, Jack Ready and Wally Shepherd tallied the other three goals.

Junior MacLeod fell while carrying the puck near the B.Y.C. blue line and when Jack Ready picked it up they were on their way to the fifth goal. Ready sailed in and slipped a pass to Merrill Pineau.

When Roper turned aside Pineau backhand Ready drove home the rebound.

MELBOURNE (AP)—World mile record holder Johnny Landy of Australia said Tuesday night he will refuse an invitation from the United States Amateur Athletic Union to compete in the national indoor championships in New York Feb. 18 and in several other U. S. meets.
"I am concentrating on the Australian mile championship March 10," Landy said.
"I have to take up a teaching post and don't expect to compete outside Victoria at all this year."

Killed Two In Rage Over Nagging
NEW ORLEANS (AP)—A 22-year-old North Dakota odd-jobs worker admitted to FBI agents early today that he killed a Seattle, Wash., couple Sunday because he "got tired of the guy nagging me about my driving."
Donald Wyciskala of Bismarck, N.D., was arrested by FBI agents as he stepped aboard a bus here shortly before midnight. He made no attempt, agents said, to conceal his identity or his connection with the double murder near McFarland, Calif., early Sunday.
FBI agents said Wyciskala still had the bloody hatchet with which he said he killed James B. Askew and his wife.
Coroner Stanley Newman said earlier at Bakersfield, Calif., that the couple had been struck several times on the head with the blunt end of a hatchet and their throats cut. They also had been run over by an automobile.
The FBI said Wyciskala had answered a newspaper advertisement of two people who wanted someone to drive them to Los Angeles.

Canadian Players Ruled Ineligible
ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—The Big Ten Tuesday ruled two Michigan hockey players from Canada ineligible for accepting expense money in high school while competing with professional clubs.
Michigan coach Vic Heyliger said he would appeal the case to Big Ten faculty representatives in March.
The decision of the conference eligibility committee bars wings Wally Maxwell, a sophomore from Toronto, and defenseman Mike Buchanan, a junior from Ottawa, from further intercollegiate athletic competition.

Waterman Gets Unpopular Decision Over Former Champ
LONDON (AP)—Peter Waterman, unbeaten British youngster, won a widely booed decision over former welterweight champion Kid Gavilan of Cuba Tuesday night as 11,000 Britons roared their disapproval of the verdict. Gavilan weighed 147½, Waterman 147¼ pounds.
The 21-year-old Briton who reads Homer, paints landscapes and likes to dance at the ballet, had his arm lifted in triumph by referee Ben Green amid a storm of protests. The booing and catcalls lasted for 10 minutes.
The Associated Press score card gave Gavilan a 6-2 edge in rounds. In Britain, the referee is the sole official and his scoring is not disclosed.
It was Waterman's 32nd pro fight. He has been held to one draw while winning the others. This was his first 10-round test. Waterman's face was cut to a crimson mask at the final bell. The Cuban kept was completely unexcused. Gavilan did setting up exercises in his corner between rounds.
The 30-year-old Cuban, making his first appearance in a British ring, drew blood from Waterman's nose in the first round.
Gavilan appeared to be in complete control until the last round when Waterman came back with strong flurries.

Loses Titles
BELGRADE (AP)—Mira Tucca, Yugoslav woman's track champion, has been deprived of all her titles "as she has changed her sex" after an operation.
Belgrade's daily paper, Politika, reported that a successful operation has been performed which turned Miss Tucca into a man.

Dick Irvin's Observations Are Not So Humorous Now

In the vicinity of December 1954, Dick Irvin proposed an Allan Cup team from the National Hockey League to represent Canada in the 1955 world championships. As we all know the CAHA decided on the Allan Cup champs the Penicillin V's and the V's justified the 'a' in put in them by walking through the game without a loss and soundly trouncing the Russian entry in the process.

When our Dick made his statement he also added jokingly that he would be a little wary of taking the ferry Richard to the games for fear of provoking an international incident. Possibly because Irvin ended his observation on a light note his remarks were taken by most of the Canadian public and hockey experts - of which there are almost as many as there are Canadians - in that without a loss and only a minority really serious thought.

However, it is beginning to appear that whether Irvin knew what he was talking about or not, he was right - or at least partly right. Canada didn't need Beliveau in '55 but they could have used him Saturday. Of course Beliveau wouldn't be allowed to play in the Olympics. He isn't an amateur. An "amateur" - in the hockey sense of the word - being a fellow who plays for less money than a professional. And as is well known by one and all the Les Gross Bill is a \$20,000-a-year man.

Admittedly this is a problem. But nothing that the CAHA President couldn't change with a wave of his magic "amateurizing" wand. This is a trick that would stomp the acute detecting powers of Houdini. Although there is an amazingly simple solution it is most mysterious in its simplicity. Collectively the CAHA is like a fairy godmother to 24 Canadian hockey players. These players need only ask for amateur status and it is granted for, if they haven't been naughty boys, every hockey player wish is the CAHA's command.

But here is something we must remember. Beliveau still won't be eligible for the Olympics for even a "re-instated amateur" is banned from participation in these impure events. Look at what happened to Barbara Ann Scott, the city of Ottawa had some hastily presented her with a car. Old Avery Brundage cast a scornful eye in her direction and said: "Give it back or else." Or for example take Jim Thorpe. Probably one of the greatest all-round athletes of all-time in any country Thorpe represented the U.S. as a man track team some years ago and won a bucketful of medals and trophies. When it was discovered that he had once played baseball as a semi-pro, he had to give them all back.

So Beliveau and his N.H.L. friends can't be used in the Oly.

Howe Only Third Player To Reach 300-Goal Level

DETROIT (AP)—Gordie Howe, rightwinger for Detroit Red Wings, scored his 300th National Hockey League goal Tuesday night and became the third player in league history to reach that level.

Howe, with an assist by Captain Ted Lindsay, drilled the counter at 9:40 of the first period in a game with Chicago Black Hawks at Detroit. Olympia stars made in 301 a little more than 23 minutes later when he scored again at 12:55 of the second.

Howe, 28, is in his 10th season with the Red Wings.
W. L. Stewart and Maurice Rockett Richard are the two other players to pass the 300 mark.
Stewart had 323 when he retired after 15 years with the Montreal Maroons, Boston Bruins and New York Americans. Richard broke the record in 1952 and has run his total over 400 in 14 seasons, all with the Montreal Canadiens.

Howe's 300th and 301st goals came against goalie Al Rollins, who has been nicked for 37 other goals by Howe.

SYDNEY (CP)—Four teams were tied for first place in the Nova Scotia curling championship Tuesday evening with two wins and no losses after four rounds of double-knockout competition.

Bridgewater topped Wolfville 10-3 and Greenwood 15-4. Truro followed Halifax Curling Club 9-7 and Liverpool 9-6; Kentville downed River Hebert 19-3 and Dartmouth 12-10, while New Glasgow defeated Sydney 9-6 and Westville 16-6.

Amherst and Halifax Mayflowers are tied for second spot with one win and no losses.
Dartmouth took third place with one win and one defeat after Halifax Curling Club, Dartmouth, Westville, Liverpool, Sydney Mines and Oxford.

Sydney, Windsor, Halifax Garrison and Red Greenwood have won two and no victories.
Eliminated from competition by losing two rounds were Wolfville, Halifax Navy and River Hebert.

Dean, a former University of Maryland lineman, went to Edmonton in 1954 and during that season had a perfect convert-kicking record—42 in 42 tries. Last season he tied the Western Inter-provincial Football Union record when he booted four field goals in a single game.

Dutton Suggests Ritchie Appointed To Select Team

BROOKS, Alta. (CP)—Mervyn Red Dutton, former president of the National Hockey League, says Al Ritchie of Regina should be appointed now to select an all-star team from across Canada to represent Canada in the 1957 world hockey championships.

"There is no time to waste," Dutton told a sportsman's dinner here in commenting on Canada's loss of the Olympic hockey championship to Russia. "Al Ritchie is the man to do the job. Let him select the best players from across this great country of ours and assemble a powerful machine for 1957."

"I would suggest that Al do the selecting and the team commence training immediately. We must redeem the prestige we have lost."

Ritchie, 64, is a former coach of several Regina hockey squads, both senior and junior. In 1921 he led Regina Vics to the Allan Cup and coached the Junior Pats to national titles in 1923 and 1930. He led the Regina Roughriders football team from 1928 to 1936.

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Soviet Athletes Masters of Sport Reports Moscow

LONDON (AP)—Seven Soviet athletes who took part in the winter Olympics at Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy, have been made "Meritorious Masters of Sport," Moscow radio said Tuesday night.

The radio said four members of the team which won the ice hockey gold medal—Nikolai Sologubov, Ivan Tregubov, Gintikh Sidorenko and Yuri Pantyukhov—and skiers Pavel Kolchin, Nikolai Ankin and Fedor Terentyev have been honored.

The skiers were in the team which won the relay race. The fourth team member, Vladimir Kuzin, was granted the title, in 1954. The radio added that most of the ice hockey team players already held the title.

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Chuck Spieser Award Winner

CHICAGO (AP)—Light heavyweight Chuck Spieser of Detroit Tuesday was named winner of the Chicago Boxing Writers' and Broadcasters' Association award as the most improved fighter of 1955.

Spieser, who fought a 10-round draw with Willie Pastrano, a high-ranking heavyweight, in his last bout, has an over-all record of 18 victories, four defeats and one draw. He has scored 13 knockouts.

Spieser and others will receive awards at the association's annual banquet Feb. 14.
Julius Helfand, New York boxing commissioner, will receive the Packey McFarland Trophy for his contribution to boxing and Suga Ray Robinson will be honored for the comeback of the year in regaining his middle-weight crown.

Howe Nets 300th In Wing Victory

DETROIT (CP)—Gordie Howe scored the 300th and 301st goals of his National Hockey League career in leading Detroit Red Wings to a 3-2 victory over Chicago Black Hawks Tuesday night. The victory boosted Detroit into a second-place tie with New York Rangers.

The Detroit rightwinger became the third player in NHL history to crack the 300 barrier when he scored on a pass from Ted Lindsay at 9:40 of the first period.
He made it 301 at 12:55 of the second period with help from Dutch Reibel and Larry Hillman. Howe joins Maurice (Rockett) Richard of the league-leading Montreal Canadiens, and Neil Stewart in the select 300 circle. Richard has 450 goals in 14 NHL seasons.

Stewart had scored 323 when he retired after 15 years with the Montreal Maroons, Boston Bruins and New York Americans.
Howe has scored 300 times this season.
Detroit and New York each have 58 points, 15 fewer than the Canadiens.

Howe's first period goal was matched for the Black Hawks by Tony Leswick. The Detroit ace countered again in the second and Lorne Ferguson made it 3-1 for Detroit in the third before George (Red) Sullivan shot the final goal for Chicago.

Only Canadian Titlist Was A Real Fighting Champion

Sir-Only 5 ft. 7 ins. tall and weighing a trifle less than 170 lbs. Tommy Burns was the most active heavyweight champion of the world. Noah Brusso was his real name and he was born at Hanover, Ontario on June 17, 1881. He was the only Canadian ever to hold the world heavyweight title.

He was discussing the heavyweight champions past and present. Burns is often overlooked. Yet the records show that he did more hard milling while in possession of the heavyweight crown than any of the others from John L. Sullivan to James J. Braddock.

Burns began fighting as a welterweight weighing 141 lbs. He met with great success from the very outset winning most of his bouts by knockouts. As he kept fighting Tommy began to put on weight and within five years he had built up to 170 lbs. and was fighting lightheavies and heavies.

Burns was one of the few fighters who never had a manager. He did a shrewd bargain and worked himself into several big money fights.
After Jim Jefferies had retired in 1902 heavyweight competitors didn't attract much attention. Left heavy of the experts was the champion that it seemed impossible to produce his equal to revive title fights in the heavyweight division.

Jefferies handed the championship to Marvin Hart as a suitable reward for whipping Jack Root, of Chicago, who had nearly put Burns down. Jefferies had no right or any justification whatever to take it upon himself to select two men to fight for his scrapped crown.

However Hart was generally recognized by many as the best fighter that nearly put Burns down. Jefferies had given some opportunity to fit into the picture.
Tommy found a friend and sponsor in California promoter Tom McCavey who admired the little fellow's courage and wanted to make sure he got the chance to fight. He began to send out feelers and met with immediate success when he found Hart more than willing if he could get the right price. The promoter met his demand and a match between Hart and Burns was set for Los Angeles on February 23, 1906. McCavey paid the Canadian challenger \$11,550 and in order to add weight to the bout Jim Jefferies was engaged as referee.

The fight was a thrilling affair with both men on their feet at the first round on a technicality, there will certainly be a riot."
It was a tough situation and MacIntosh asked Burns if he would go on. Burns, who was determined and confident of beating Johnson, said he would. The fight went on until the 14th round when the police jumped in and stopped it.

MacIntosh afterwards said that it was his belief that Burns never recovered from that early punch to the chin and he had no chance with Johnson it was gone at that moment.
Johnson cut Burns to bits in a vicious manner but he himself was never keen on taking punishment and could never be lured into the ring in a title bout against the great Sam Langford.
