Mr. Angus McInnis is expected home from Halifax this evening. While in Halifax Mr. McInnis took a course in sanitary plumbing and obtained a diploma. The Halifax Herald says he passed a first-class examination.

The Fogg Art Museum at Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass., was crowded to overflowing last Wednesday evening when Prof. S. M. McVane, professor of international law at the university, lectured on "England and the Transvaal." His lecture consisted of a graphic sketch of the South African States and a recital of the complications which led to the present war. The only time he expressed any personal opinion was in regard to some concessions which were extended by the Boer government, and which were refused by Mr. Chamberlain. "The Boers did wrong," said Prof. McVane, "in making these concessions at the time, and the English did wrong in not accepting them." These concessions were the offers of the Boers to add several members to the national Road and decrease the years of provisional citizenship. Prof. McVane is a native of Bobwell, P. E. I., and a brother of Messrs Joseph and Elijah McVane of that place.

WORD FROM QUEBEC.—Pte. Nelson Brace, of "G" Company, Canadian Contingent, writing from Quebec to a friend in Charlottetown under date of October, 28, says: "We arrived here all right on Thursday night. We had a good trip up; but we made slow time on account of the sends off we got at every town we passed. We sail from here on Tuesday next. I saw William Duncan, Bert Ward and Louis Crockett. They are all in the Artillery and like it. Crockett has one stripe. Duncan is coming with the contingent. Billy Ware is also coming. He belongs to the Fredericton regulars."
