LUMBER MILL DESTROYED SEATTLE (AP) — One of the worst fires witnessed by Seattle's fire chief in 47 years of duty Wednesday destroyed one of the world's largest cedar lumber mills. An army of more than 300 firemen and volunteers battled the blaze at the Seattle Cedar Lumber Manufacturing Company for more than four hours. Damage was estimated at more than \$1,500,000.

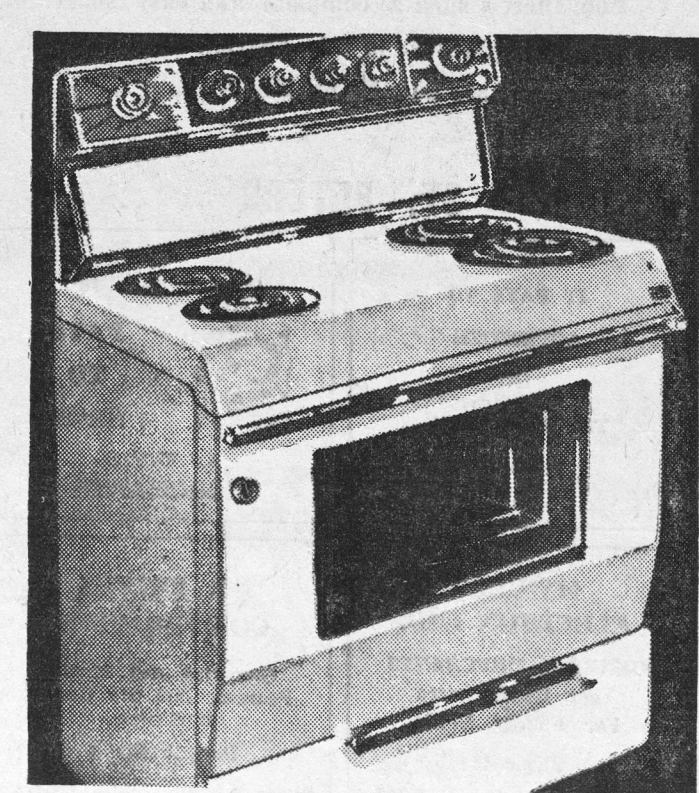
