Canada's Population Reaches 19,272,000

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's population climbed to an estimated 19,272,000 at July 1, the bureau of statistics reported today.

This represents an increase of 344,000 in one year and a jump of 1,034,000 since the census of June 1, 1961.

Among the provinces, the largest numerical gain since July 1, 1963, was in Ontario—142,000 people. Quebec was next with an increase of 88,000, then British Columbia with a rise of 45,000.

The other numerical increases: Alberta, 25,000; Saskatchewan, 10,000; Newfoundland, 9,000; Manitoba, 8,000; New Brunswick, 3,000; Nova Scotia, 3,000; Yukon, 1,000.

The populations of Prince Edward Island and the Northwest Territories remained unchanged from July 1 of last year.

B.C. had the biggest percentage gain — 2.7 per cent—followed by Ontario with 2.2 per cent.

Newfoundland was third with a 1.3-per-cent increase.

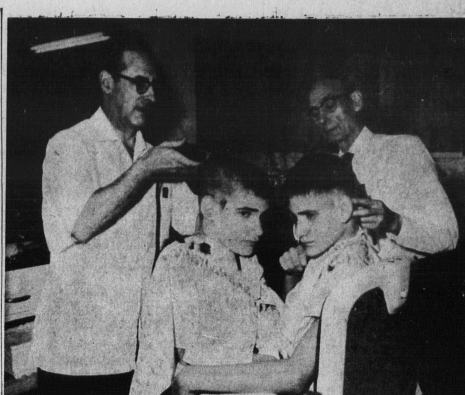
Other percentage increases: Quebec and Alberta both 1.8 per cent; Saskatchewan, 1.1; Manitoba, .8; New Brunswick, .5; Nova Scotia, .4.

Body Discovery Rumor Checked

SOURIS — RCMP here investigated two reports yesterday that the body of missing Souris fisherman Thomas Gill had turned up. Nothing came of the checks at Fortune and Big Pond, however, and RCMP are planning to continue the search today. Apparently the only hope of recovering the body rests in its rising to the surface and floating ashore, where searchers are constantly keeping their eyes open. Medical authorities have indicated that after a drowning a body will float to the surface within a week or so.

Apparently when the constable first went underwater in his diving gear he was unable to locate the car because the moving tide had moved it. Waters were muddy at the time.
