Liberty Flames Burn As War Dead Honored

"To you from falling hands we throw the torch". But those hands had not fallen nor have the ones to whom they threw the torch and yesterday the flames of liberty still burned brightly as all over the world people gathered on Remembrance Day as they did at the monument here in Queen Square to honor those who have gone. And memories came crowding in on the large throng which gathered because "we shall remember them" to watch in quietness and shed its silent tears for those who will never again come home. Rev. G.E. Ball reminded the crowd that global conflicts are not a matter of glory and companionship but that "War is hell" and people have short memories. Standing at the four corners of the monument, with downcast eyes and hands folded over grandly, were the representatives of the Navy, Army, Air Force and RCMP. Nearby a Legion member stood on guard.

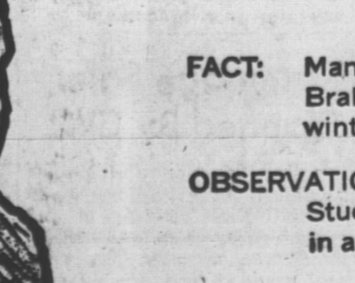
Young Mother Is Found Afire

Patrolman Edward Friend said two burned books of paper matches were found on the steps of Mrs. Celene Jankowski's house. Henry Wozniak, a neighbor, heard her screaming and smothered her burning clothing with a blanket. She was reported in fair condition today with third degree burns. Richard Jankowski, the husband, said his wife said she had been deeply worried about the Viet Nam situation and her mental disturbance increased after their three-month-old child, Michelle Theresa, suffocated in her crib Oct. 28. They have two other children, Jeffrey, 3, and Lisa, 2.

TORONTO (CP) — Chemicals used on icy roads can lead to brake failure during a sudden stop. Deputy Chief John Murray of the Metropolitan Toronto Police Department said yesterday. 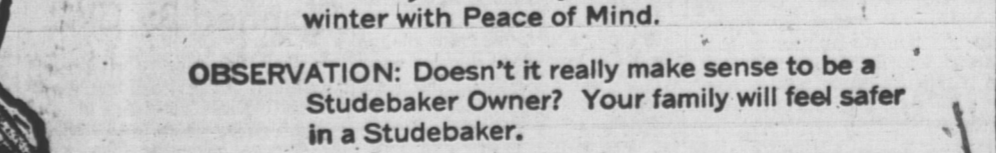
