

# Angie Carroll Captures League Scoring Crown

Sandy's Royals' Angie Carroll captured this year's Island Senior Hockey League scoring title according to statistics released by league statistician Len Arsenault last night. Along with the scoring title goes the Medical Pharmacy trophy, emblematic of same.

Carroll finished the season with 32 goals and 28 assists for a 60-point total, ten better than playing coach and teammate Roy "Buck" Whitlock. Whitlock's total was made up of 24 goals and 26 assists.

The player finishing up with the most assists was Carroll's teammate Alfie Flanagan. The crew-cut puckster, who ended up third in the scoring race with 49 points, picked up a total of 20 assists over the season.

SEVENTEEN IN FOURTH

Seventeen points back of these three Parkdale sharpshooters in fourth spot with 32 points is Penguin sparkplug Billy Mulligan. The blond-haired speedster scored 15 goals and assist-

ed on seventeen others during the season.

Tied for fifth spot are two Royal players, forward Dick Carroll and rearguard Eustace Reeves. Carroll has 14 goals and 13 assists and Reeves scored twice while assisting on 25 others.

The Royals top place finishers in the league, ended up with 32 points, ten better than rival Old Spain Penguins, and Summerside Crystals who emerged with identical 10-2 records.

The most penalized player in the league was defenceman Ralph Josey of the Royals with a total of 91 minutes spent in the penalty box. Fiery Jack Kane of the Penguins spent 81 minutes in the cooler.

There are a total of five trophies up for grabs this season. Along with the Medical-Pharmacy trophy awarded to the top scorer there is the Garrison Sergeant's Mess trophy, awarded annually to the player rated most valuable to his team.

Others are the Main Braco trophy, going to the top goalie in the league, the Charlottetown and District Labor Council trophy awarded to the outstanding defenceman and the MCA trophy, emblematic of the league title.

## Snell Batters World Mark In Half Mile

CHRISTCHURCH, N.Z. (AP) Peter Snell, who bettered the world mile record last week, ran the fastest half-mile in track and field history today. The 22-year-old New Zealander was timed in one minute, 45.1 seconds — clipping 1.7 seconds off the world mark set by Tom Courtney of the United States.

In the process, Snell bettered the world 800-metre record with a time of 1:44.3.

Last Saturday Snell ran the mile on a grass track in 3:54.4 — one-tenth of a second under the world record of 3:54.5 set by Australia's Herb Elliott.

He ran on a composition track today at Lancaster Park, considered the fastest in New Zealand.

Snell won the 800-metre gold medal in the Rome Olympics but reached his peak this season.

Before the race, he said: "I feel if I am going to get the half-mile record, I should do it now. I am not sure how much the mile record took out of me, but I know I am definitely fitter than ever before."

Barry Robinson, New Zealand's Olympic quarter-mile and a late entry in the half-mile, led Snell around the first lap in a fantastic 50.5 seconds.

## Alberta Indian Captures Medal

LETHBRIDGE, Alta. (CP) — Homer Healy of the Blood Indian Reserve has won the Tom Longboat medal as the outstanding Indian athlete in Alberta for 1961.

Healy won the Canadian amateur bantamweight boxing championship at Drayton Valley in 1961.

Tom Longboat medals are presented each year to the outstanding Indian athlete in each province. The outstanding Indian athlete in Canada receives the Tom Longboat Trophy. The trophy was won in 1961 by Bruce Bruyere of the Fort Frances Agency in northern Ontario.

The medals and trophy are named after Canadian Indian Tom Longboat, outstanding long-distance runner who won the Boston marathon in 1907.

## Cleroux Ranked Seventh By NBA

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (CP) — Montreal's Bob Cleroux, Canadian heavyweight champ, is ranked seventh behind champion Floyd Patterson in the National Boxing Association's ratings for January announced Friday.

Bantamweight Eder Jofre of Brazil, rated by some as the ring's best fighter pound-for-pound, was named boxer-of-the-month.

The 25-year-old Jofre won the honor on the strength of his 10th round knockout of Ireland's Johnny Caldwell that gave him undisputed claim to the world bantam crown.

## Plenty For Canadiens

MONTREAL Canadiens could cop four individual awards this season.

The way things are shaping up, it could well be that the Montrealers will win top honors in four departments. If this happens, Montreal supporters will be delighted and those who holler for other teams will not find too much about which to argue.

Jacques Plante seems a shoe-in to run away with the Vezina trophy. The Masked Marvel, making a dramatic comeback after a trip to the minors in the 1960-61 season, is a heavy favorite to clinch this goaltender's prize. Only a complete collapse from here until the last Sunday in March could rob Jacques of this honour.

BUT THE award that Plante will really have to work on and one which we think he richly deserves thus far is the Hart trophy, emblematic as the most valuable player to his team in the National Hockey League.

Doug Harvey was out in front in the first voting which ended late in December but unless Doug sets his Rangers into these playoffs, we can't see how he can pick up many votes in the final balloting. However, Plante, second to Doug in the first voting, continues his amazing feat. If the selectors thought him good before the New Year, then they have no reason to change their opinion now. Everything Plante has done since the first counting should make him a better favorite of the wise ones.

FROM here Bobby Rousseau has the Calder trophy (outstanding rookie) all wrapped up. His playing appears to improve with each game and the youngster is a delight to watch. Last Saturday he was particularly effective against the New York Rangers and we see no one around who will cause him too much worry.

It should be Rousseau by a wide margin.

THE LADY Bing trophy goes to the player adjudged to have the best combination of sportsmanship and ability.

Claude Provost, leading goaltender in the NHL, was leading at the halfway mark.

If Claude can keep up his work of potting goals they'll have trouble taking the honour from him.

Of course, he will have stern competition from the likes of Boston's Don McKenney and Toronto's Red Kelly. Any of the three will prove popular selections but only one can emerge triumphant.

In our book Provost has a fight on his hands but his chances of maintaining his slight edge are good. Kelly, however, showed plenty of ability last Saturday when Leafs rallied to beat Detroit Red Wings 4-2 before a packed Maple Leaf Gardens.

## Mikita Overlooked?

Montreal sportswriters and sportscasters didn't seem too alarmed about the all-star selection. Most of them agreed it was a mighty formidable team and were ready to let it go at that.

However, when prodded, they expressed an opinion that Red Kelly hadn't exactly earned the right to be centre on the big squad. We weren't annoyed at all because there was considerable logic in their expressions.

We hope that those who were insisting that Henri 'The Pecker' Richard was robbed of an all-star berth took note of these expert opinions. Not one of them felt the younger Richard had a right to the team. Rather, it was their unanimous opinion that Chicago's Stan Mikita was the gentleman who was deserving of all-star rating.

Mikita will likely make the grade in the season's final balloting. He's quite a performer and seems to improve as the season progresses.

Yes, we agree that Canadiens are in a fair way of collecting four individual awards this year but we do not think Henri's chances of making the all-star squad are very good.

However, we have the feeling that Canadiens will be glad to settle for such awards as we have indicated they are likely to receive.

What team wouldn't be pleased?
