

whole House, without amendment, and ordered to be engrossed. The Bill provides that the said £500 per annum, shall be paid into the Treasury for the use of the Government, as the Legislature may hereafter direct.

Several Road Petitions were then presented, and ordered to be laid on the Table.

Bill to regulate the working of Mills, read the second time, and committed to a committee of the whole House. The Committee, having sat some time, rose, and the chairman, Mr Longworth reported progress, asked and obtained leave to sit again.

THURSDAY, APRIL 17.
(Morning Sitting.)

On motion by Mr. WARBURTON, a Committee was appointed to wait upon His Excellency and deliver a Message from the House, praying His Excellency to cause the usual Custom House Returns to be laid before the House. Committee—Messrs. Warburton, Clark and Pope.

The Bill to alter the Appropriation of £500 per annum, granted from the Land Assessment, as a Salary to the late Lieut. Governor, Sir Donald Campbell; and directing the same to be paid into the Treasury of this Island, for the use of the Government, as may, hereafter, be directed by the Legislature, was read a third time and passed.

Dr. Gesner's Petition.—Mr. POPE gave notice, with reference to a Petition from Dr. Gesner, Halifax, N.S. presented to the House by him (Mr. Pope) last Session, praying for Letters Patent for the Island, for the manufacture of Illuminating Gas from Bitumen, that he would, on an early day, introduce a Bill in conformity with the said Petition.

Post Office Report.—Mr. COLES from the Committee appointed to examine and report concerning the stoppage of the Mails, presented a Report, which was received and read. It was then ordered, that the Report, &c. &c., be printed in all the Island Newspapers.

Post Office.—On motion of Mr. COLES—Mr. Coles, Mr. Pope, and Mr. Davies were appointed a Committee to prepare an Address to His Excellency, in accordance with the Post Office Report; the principal object being to pray His Excellency to order the resumption of the Inland Mails' Service.

Bill Relating to Stray Cattle.—This Bill was reported agreed to without amendment in Committee of whole House, and ordered to be engrossed.

Inland Mails.—Mr. Coles, from the Committee appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency on the subject of the Post Office Service, reported an Address which will be found under the head of Post Office Inquiry on our 6th page.

On motion by Mr. COLES, Resolved that a Supply be granted to Her Majesty.

TUESDAY, April 22.
(Morning Sitting.)

The Bill to oblige Husbands and other relatives to contribute to the maintenance of their families and other indigent Relatives, was read a third time, passed, and sent up to the Council by Mr FRASER.

Illuminating Gas.—Mr. POPE, according to notice, asked and obtained leave to bring in a Bill to enable A. Gesner, of Halifax, N.S., to obtain Letters Patent for the Invention of a new and improved mode of manufacturing Illuminating Gas; which Bill was read a first time. It was then ordered that the Bill be referred to the Private Bills Committee to report thereon.

The Emigrants Bill was read a third time, passed, and sent up to the Council by Mr LOUD.

Sheriff's Bill.—This Bill was sent down, as passed by the Council with amendments. The amendments was read a first time, and ordered for second reading tomorrow. The Bill, as amended by the Legislative Council, restores them to their original form, as it was introduced by Mr WHELAN; except that the exemption in favor of Members of the House of Assembly, is extended to Members of the Legislative Council; and, as the Bill now stands, no member of either House is liable to a fine for refusing to serve when nominated a Sheriff.

Boards of Health Bill.—This Bill was read a third time, passed, and sent up to the Council by Mr LOUD.

The Bill relating to Stray Cattle was read a third time, passed; and sent up to the Council by Mr FRASER.

Petition of John Wright, Coroner of Prince County, Mr POPE presented a Petition from J. Wright, Coroner of Prince County, setting forth, That in the month of October, 1849, the Petitioner submitted to the Lieut. Governor and Council, an account of services performed by him, since the month of July, 1846, as Coroner for Prince County, and solicited remuneration for Inquests held on the bodies of individuals who left no effects at their decease. That the Lieut. Governor and Council did not entertain the Petitioner's accounts, and consequently, granted no allowance as a remuneration for the services performed. The Petitioner, therefore, prays a grant of a sum of money equal in amount to that represented in the accounts of the Inquests, or as much thereof as the House may deem just and meet. The Petition is accompanied by a statement of Accounts from 15th July, 1845 to 12th Sept., 1849, total amount £177 5½—and a Letter marked on the superscription, "On Service." "Secretary's Office," to the effect that the Colonial Secretary thinks every item in the Inquest Accounts objectionable, and, therefore, declines to submit them to the Council." This letter bears the Signature of "Peter Macgowan;" this gentleman having it appears been employed to deliver in the accounts at the Office of the Colonial Secretary. The Petition was received and read, and then ordered to be referred to a Special Committee.

Committee appointed—Mr Yeo, hon. Sol. General and Mr Coles.

Assault and Battery Bill.—This Bill was read a second time and committed to a Committee of the whole House. The House being resumed, the Chairman, Mr WIGHTMAN, reported the Bill agreed to with an amendment.

Small Debts Bill.—Mr MOONEY, by leave, presented a Bill to alter and amend the Act relating to the recovery of Small Debts, with a view to the reduction of the Fees allowed under the same. The Bill was read a first time; and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

Petitions.—In the course of the day several Petitions were presented by different hon. members.

WEDNESDAY, April 23rd
(Afternoon Sitting.)

By MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY, the House being summoned to the Bar of the Legislative Council went up; and, after His Excellency had assented to the following Bills in the Queen's name—

Act to consolidate and amend the Laws for the relief of Insolvent Debtors.

Act to regulate the laying out and altering of Highways.

Act for the better prevention of Saw-logging.

Act to alter and amend the Militia Laws.

Act for shortening the Language and in Acts of the General Assembly.

Act to consolidate Boards of Health.

Act to oblige Husbands and Natural Relatives of Indigent and Impotent Persons to contribute to their support.

After His Excellency had given his assent, in the Queen's name, to the foregoing, the hon. SPEAKER, addressing His Excellency, said, he begged leave to present, to His Excellency, in the name of the Assembly, a Bill, entitled An Act to commute the Crown Revenues and to provide for the Civil List and for other purposes, and to pray that His Excellency would be pleased to assent to the same in the name of Her Majesty. The Bill was then handed to His Excellency, who signed and assented to it in the usual manner.

The House being returned, the hon. Speaker informed the House that His Excellency had been pleased to give his assent in the Queen's name to the Civil List Bill.

On motion by Mr COLES the House was then then adjourned.

Mr COLES then rose, and, addressing the hon. Speaker, said, "As the Civil List Bill, to which His Excellency has just given his assent in the name of the Queen, is the most important that has ever been passed in this Colony; and as it is to be hoped that it will settle all political differences and terminate all party animosities, I propose that we give three cheers, as an expression of our satisfaction at the event."

To this appeal, the hon. Members in the majority, as well as several other gentlemen present, not members of the Legislature, standing up, responded by three hearty and good humored cheers.

THURSDAY, April 26.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.—Mr. CLARK, from a Committee of the whole House having had under their consideration certain matters connected with the Road Service, reported the three following Resolutions, which were severally adopted by the House:—

1. *Resolved,* As the opinion of this Committee, That all contracts entered into for the repairs of Bridges and Wharfs, up to this date, be provided for a special Appropriation; and that the sum of Four thousand five hundred pounds to be divided according to the following scale for the present year:

Queen's County	£1,7000
Prince County	1,400
King's County	1,400

£4,500

2. *Resolved,* That the sum of One hundred and forty pounds be granted to defray the contingent expenses of the Roads, Bridges, and Wharfs, the same to be equally appropriated among the three Counties.

3. *Resolved,* That the sum of Three hundred pounds be granted and placed at the disposal of the Lieut. Governor in Council, to be expended, if necessary in the laying out and altering the Highways under the Road Compensation Act.

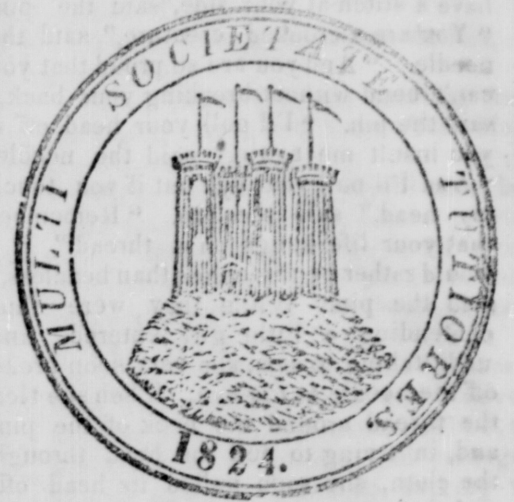
