FREDERICTON (CP) — Fredericton Capitals waltzed through Amherst Ramblers 10-4 here Thursday night to end their regular Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League schedule at home, and took over third place with two games to play.

Dr. MacDonald Rink Wins Island Curling Championship With 10-7 Win Over S' side

Will Compete In Dominion Finals At Regina, Sask.

A Charlottetown rink skipped by Dr. Wendell MacDonald won the Provincial Curling Championship at the Charlottetown Curling Club last night by defeating the Horace MacFarlane rink from Summerside 10-7.

The members of the Island Championship rink are Dr. MacDonald, skip; Johnny Squarebrigg's mate, Andy Likely, second stone; and Elmer MacDonald, lead.

Dr. MacDonald, Elmer MacDonald and Johnny Squarebrigg were members of the winning rink a year ago. The other member, Andy Likely, replaced Barry MacDonald who this year competed only in the Schoology Competitions.

Dr. MacDonald and his rink will represent the Province in the Dominion curling championships which will be held in Regina, Saskatchewan during the first week of March.

The new champions counted three rocks in the ninth end of last night's match to practically clinch the championship. The three-ender was the biggest of the night, played match and all but put the championship into the reach of the game Summerside rink as it gave the City curlers a 9-4 lead.

Boston Bruins In 4-2 Victory Over Black Hawks

BOSTON (AP) — Boston Bruins put their first two shots of the game past Chicago rookie goalie Hank Bassen Thursday night and went on to a 4-2 National Hockey League triumph over the last-place Black Hawks in Boston Garden.

Rookie Don McKenney and Fleming Mackell got those goals only 42 seconds apart early in the first period.

The victory put the fourth-place Bruins only six points behind Toronto's idle third-place Maple Leafs. The loss was only the third in nine games for the 22-year-old Bassen.
