A few days ago, this column gave space to some trout fishing tales which came within the ken of the writer and some of his friends.

It is not intended to attempt such a serial, but there is one fisherman whose all-around record, maintained over a space of years, ranks high among Islanders.

Islanders have roamed far and climbed high. They have become big business figures in the U. S. A. as well as in Canada.

Thirty-three years ago on April 9th, Easter Monday morning in 1917 at dawn, in sheet and rain, the Canadian Corps of four divisions stormed the strongly fortified and naturally formidable position of Vimy Ridge.

It was an exultant day despite the casualties, and it was the payoff after long winter months spent under the shadow of the Ridge.

Robert Louis Stevenson in his "Apology for Idlers" puts in a plea for idleness: He says that it is by no means certain that a man's business is the most important thing he has to do; there is a sort of dead-alive, hackneyed people about, who are scarcely conscious of living except in the exercise of some conventional occupation.

In thinking of reading, Carlyle is of help in one place, he says, "If we think of it all that a university or final high school can do for us, it is but what the first school began doing—teach us to read. But the place where we are to get knowledge, even theoretic knowledge, is the books themselves! It depends on what we read, after all manner of professors have done their best for us. The true university of these days is a collection of books."

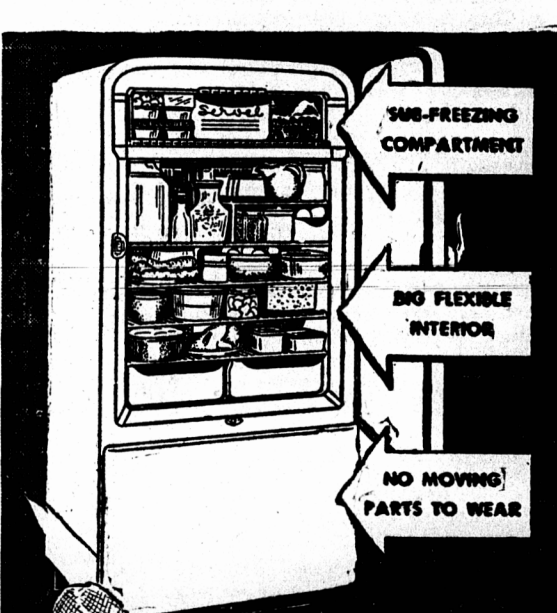
