Vehicle Collision Sends 2 To Hospital

An accident shortly after noon yesterday between a Volkswagen and a five-ton Chevrolet truck in Georgetown resulted in two men being admitted into the intensive care ward at the Char-

lottetown Hospital. The Volkswagen which was proceeding down the right side of the Railway Wharf collided with the rear end of the truck, reportedly owned by the Square K. Construction Company and registered in the province of Quebec.

The driver of the Volkswagen, Galdold Hache who is employed in Georgetown as chief engineer of the trawler Gulf Gallant and a resident of New Brunswick, suffered severe cuts and abrasions about the head and lost a considerable amount of blood.

The other party in the Volkswagen, Aldo Goinet also of New Brunswick, and working in Georgetown as second engineer on the Gulf Gallant, received cuts about the face and hands.

partment answered two calls here yesterday.

They were called to the workshop of Isaac Arsenault at about 3:30 p.m. Thursday afternoon and at 7:30 yesterday morning answered a call to a potato warehouse belonging to Russell Ching of Red Point. The warehouse is located on the main street in Souris.

The small workshop owned by Mr. Arsenault, a self employed harness mender was completely destroyed and all his equipment and stock was lost when it is believed that a small oil stove exploded. Besides Mr. Arsenault's personal loss harnesses which were being repaired were also destroyed.

There was no estimate of damage and it was not known if the building was insured.

The incident at 7:30 yesterday morning caused only slight damage to a potato bin within the warehouse. It was said that the blaze started from a light bulb which was left on all night and which was touching the side of the bin. There were no injuries reported from either fire.

The truck was unattended. It had its emergency brake on and the impact of the collision moved the five-ton truck a distance of 13 feet.

The Volkswagen is a total wreck with the hood sheared completely off.

Fraser's ambulance from Montague took the two injured men to hospital in Charlottetown. Georgetown policeman Allison Grover and members of the RCMP, Montague detachment, conducted an investigation.

Rejean Charlebois, representative of the Laborer's International Union told strikers at a protest meeting here yesterday morning "The employers are not kings and we are not their servants. He added, "this is 1966. We want to be respected by our employers."

Mr. Charlebois felt that the protest of the construction workers is being heard and upheld by a great number of persons. He said that he had been talking with members of the clergy and explaining the protest to them. "The clergy sympathize with our cause," he told the men.

He said that some people are "very narrow minded," when he referred to the few men who persist in going to their jobs while the rest of the men attend protest meetings. Mr. Charlebois encouraged the protesters to continue parading in front of these jobs and "repeat, repeat, repeat" the cause they are fighting for. "After you tell somebody something 50 or 100 times, they're going to get the idea," he said.

"The Summerside workers are behind us 100 per cent, he told the men yesterday. "Things are coming along great in Moncton, too" he added.

In regards to the coming election in this province, Mr. Charlebois said "we're not married to any political party. We will vote for the party which is going to do something for the worker."
