

ITALIAN ACTRESS SAYS SHE'LL DEFY CONVENTION

LONDON (AP)—Italian actress Sophia Loren intends to defy convention and become an unmarried mother, says British movie writer Jack Bentley.

He quoted her as saying during an interview: "I can't see any signs of being able to marry Carlo (Ponti), so I can't wait any longer for that piece of paper that gives me permission to have a child."

The piece of paper to which she refers is a marriage certificate to show she is legally married to Italian film producer Carlo Ponti. They were married by proxy in Mexico in 1957 and Ponti obtained a divorce from his Italian wife in France in December.

The divorce is not recognized in Italy, where Ponti and Miss Loren still face proceedings for bigamy.

The dark-haired, hazel-eyed beauty is at present in London, filming opposite American actor Marlon Brando in A Countess from Hong Kong, veteran movie-maker Charlie Chaplin's first film in a decade.

Writing in The Sunday Mirror, Bentley said he told Miss Loren he had read of her being seen in a Paris shop buying a trousseau and saying she would be getting married soon. He asked if it were true. She said the 31-year-old actress replied: "I wish it were true. But there doesn't seem to be a chance."

"I haven't even asked Carlo how much money he has spent on lawyers' fees trying to make it possible, but whatever form of marriage we went through, it would never be recognized by the Catholic Church and in Italy it would amount to bigamy."

"Yet, unmarried, I could have a baby without the fear of going to prison. . . . Yes, I think that now is the time."

"The world has grown up and although there are bound to be some people who will look badly on me, I am assured that millions who know the circumstances will be sympathetic."

"But whether they are or not, I will always love Carlo. I must have his children."

Asked if she would give up making movies if she had a baby, Miss Loren replied: "Oh no, there will never be a chance of that. I would always take my children with me, but not to act again would be only half living."

Splitting Viet Cong, Saigon Suggested In Peace Efforts

WASHINGTON (AP)—An authority on Viet Nam said here the United States should treat the Communist National Liberation Front in the south as a separate entity from the Hanoi regime in the north.

"It is in the interests of the United States to consider the NLF as the second combatant in this war," said Professor Bernard Fall, a Frenchman on the faculty of Howard University here who is regarded as an expert on the history of the Viet Cong guerrillas and NFL, the Viet Cong's political arm.

"Splitting off the opposition" in this way would tend to divide and weaken the enemy, added Fall, who is cited in a Johnson administration memorandum on Viet Nam and the NLF.

He also said in an interview that the U.S. "attitude towards dealing with the NLF as a separate entity" requires further clarification.

HAS RESISTED IDEA
Washington has resisted suggestions that it recognize the NLF, which it terms a Hanoi-created facade rather than a genuine political group truly representing South Vietnamese. President Johnson says the Front's views can be discussed at a conference table, but he has

China Depending On West For Expansion Of Economy

TOKYO (AP)—China is depending more and more on Western countries, except the United States, in expanding her economy.

Statistics compiled from the United Nations, Japan and Communist reports show more than half of China's trade has depended on non-Communist countries since 1963.

In 1964, the ratio favoring the non-Communist world increased to 64-36.

Japanese experts predict China's trade with non-Communist countries—including Canada, Japan, Australia, Argentina, and Western Europe—might increase to about 70 per cent this year.

This is a marked reverse of the situation a decade ago. In 1955, China's trade with Communist countries amounted to 72.5 per cent, with 27.5 per cent going to other nations.

The figures for Soviet-Chinese trade dramatically emphasize the Moscow-Peking dispute. In 1955, China exported \$643,600,000 worth of goods to the U.S.S.R. and bought \$748,300,000. In 1964, exports had dropped to \$314,100,000, imports to \$135,100,000.

Student Cruise Is Cancelled

GLASGOW (CP)—A plan to send 1,100 Glasgow school children to Canada for an educational cruise next year has been shelved because they could not get free accommodation while there, the chairman of the Glasgow Education Committee said here.

George Moore said in an interview the children will go to the Mediterranean instead.

Moore said he had been trying to make arrangements since last August to have the children accommodated for a week in Canada, with the understanding Canadian children would be similarly taken care of on a trip to Scotland at some future date.

But, he said, the Canadian government had made no offer of shore accommodation. To make the cruise economical for the ship owners, British India Steam Navigation Company, the cruise ship Nevasa would have had to be used for commercial work for a week during its visit to Canada and during that period the children would have had to be on shore.

Glasgow has been operating a system of foreign cruises for children for several years. The cruises take place during the school year, with teachers on board to give regular class work between ports.

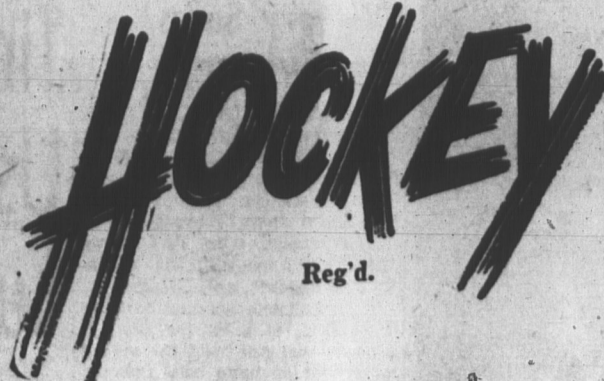
